

CORNERSTONE LAID FOR NEW NURSERY

Mrs. Olcott Places Stone for
Albertina Kerr Home.

MAYOR GIVES ADDRESS

Building to Cost About \$70,000;
When Completed Will Accom-
modate 90 Babies.

The cornerstone of the new Albertina Kerr nursery at the southeast corner of Twenty-second street and Sandy boulevard yesterday afternoon was laid with ceremony attended by 700 persons. The stone was placed in position by Mrs. Ben W. Olcott, wife of the governor of Oregon, and the principal address was delivered by Mayor Baker.

The new home of the nursery when completed will cost approximately \$70,000 and will accommodate 90 babies. The building will be of three-story brick construction, and modern in every detail.

The mayor, who acted as chairman and speaker of the day, was introduced by Mrs. R. E. Bondurant, president of the Albertina Kerr nursery board. Mrs. Bondurant headed the Oregon drive for funds to aid in the construction of the home.

Preceding the laying of the cornerstone, a program was given. Mayor Baker in his address dwelt principally upon Portland's need for such an institution. He commended the work done by the nursery as a benefit to the community. He discussed the nursery plans for the future and predicted that there would be greater need for it as it became more widely known.

Principles Are Outlined

W. D. Wheelwright, general treasurer of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective society, outlined the principles of the new home and declared that its influence upon the better life of any city is remarkable. Prayer was offered by Dr. D. C. McCulloch and the general benediction was spoken by W. G. McClaren, general superintendent of the rescue and protective organization.

At the conclusion of Mayor Baker's address, he handed a silver trowel to Mrs. Olcott who then placed the cornerstone.

"With this trowel," she said, "I now place the mortar on the cornerstone of the Albertina Kerr nursery."

The site of the new nursery was donated by Alexander Kerr, who also was responsible for the founding of the old home at Fourteenth and Washington streets. It was named in memory of his wife, Albertina.

Funds Raised in Campaign

Funds for the erection of the new home were raised in a campaign inaugurated by charity workers. The drive was carried on throughout Portland and the state and ended last fall.

The nursery is operated under the auspices of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective society, which also has aided in the establishment of the Louise home, the Portland Commons and the Elizabeth cottage. The society was incorporated in 1907 under the laws of Oregon.

The musical programme given yesterday was under the direction of Walter Jenkins, assisted by two members of the Hill Military bugle corps—Russell Page and Harold Dagg.

AMAZING TALE DOUBTED

DETECTIVES ANALYZE STORY
OF ATTACK BY ROBBERS.

How Victim Freed One Arm if Tied
to Railway Track With Barbed
Wire Puzzles Sleuths.

EXCELSIOR SPRINGS, Mo., June 20.

(Special.)—Place by place, sentence by sentence, police and private detectives are analyzing the amazing story of George M. Underwood, who asserts he was made captive by two robbers in a motor car Wednesday night, then wired to a railroad track. Underwood was found lying on the track after a train had crushed his left hand and left foot. The maimed man said he had been robbed of \$70 and a watch. Near the spot where the train wheels maimed Underwood, his watch and pocketbook were found. The pocketbook was empty except for a few small coins. Detectives employed by an insurance company said to have issued an accident policy for \$30,000 recently, are wondering how the man could have been robbed of \$70 when he borrowed \$4. It has been learned, from a young woman living at the Palace hotel, Kansas City, only a few hours before.

Underwood's right wrist contained no bruises or cuts after his experience on the railroad track and the fact is another case for speculation by detectives. Underwood said the bandits took barbed wire and tied both hands to one of the track rails and that as he heard the approaching train he jerked loose his right arm, then tore the gag from his mouth and rolled his body from the rail. He said the train crushed his left foot and left hand before he could completely free himself.

Detectives are puzzled by Underwood's statement. He exercised a superhuman effort and released his right arm from the binding strands of barbed wire. The struggle left no marks on the man's right arm, such as might have been expected. Underwood remained too weak today to be questioned about his accident insurance policy.

GOX SEEKS FIRST PLACE

OHIOAN NOT IN RACE FOR
VICE-PRESIDENCY.

State Executive Gives Departing
Delegation Benediction in Com-
munity Demonstration.

DATTON, O., June 20.—Governor J. M. Cox of Ohio is not a candidate for the democratic nomination for vice president. He made this emphatic declaration here Saturday in responding to a declaration of the States Senator Pomerene and others at a big community demonstration tendered him prior to departure of Ohio's delegation and boosters for San Francisco.

"I urge upon you, pilgrims, that I am not a candidate for the place," the governor declared. His announcement was greeted with yells of approval by several thousand per-

sons who had journeyed to his home to pay their respects. "Further, I might say," he added, "that I am not fitted for the duties devolving upon a vice-president."

Governor Cox also took occasion to voice his opposition to what he termed "domination of the government by a senate oligarchy."

Whether I am a candidate or not, my strength, my voice and the very impulse of my soul will assert my opposition to any senate oligarchy," he declared.

Diverging for a moment to pay a tribute to the soldiers who died in France, the governor declared that he intended to ask the people of the nation from now until "the idea of November to keep faith with the boys in our promise that they shall not have died in vain."

Whether he is nominated for the presidency by his party at San Francisco or not, the governor declared he would meet the returning delegates with a smile. "When you come back, whether you bring back the bacon or not, I will meet and greet you with a smile," he said. Senator Pomerene, who is a delegate-at-large, said he intended to go to the convention to do all in his power to nominate Governor Cox. The senator criticized the republicans, saying that when they complain about the administration not reducing the cost of living they are only indicting themselves.

The Ohio delegation and several hundred boosters left for San Francisco tonight in two special trains.

The demonstration was a prelude to the departure of Ohio's delegation to the San Francisco convention, every one of which is pledged to vote for the governor.

BOY HURT IN COLLISION

ANTOMOBILE AND MOTOR-
CYCLE CRASH HEAD ON.

Six, Thrown From Car When
Driver Attempts to Avoid Acci-
dent, and Suffer Bruises.

William Stanfill, 2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Stanfill, 7212 Eighty-second street southeast, sustained serious injuries and Mrs. Stanfill an injured shoulder when Mr. Stanfill, driver of an automobile in which they were riding, averted quickly in an effort to avoid a collision with Deputy Sheriff Murnane, who was riding a motorcycle, and the machine overturned at east Fifty-fifth and Division streets, yesterday afternoon.

Six other persons who were riding in the automobile at the time, were thrown out and received minor bruises. The little boy received a bad rash on the right leg, thought to have been from a jagged portion of the windshield, and narrowly escaped bleeding to death. Dr. W. U. Scott, 403 East Fifty-fifth street, administered first aid and he was then rushed to the Good Samaritan hospital, where he remained last night. He believed he would recover. The automobile was badly damaged.

Persons riding in the machine at the time of the accident included, besides the injured boy, the five other children of Mr. and Mrs. Stanfill, and Mrs. Stanfill's sister. Deputy Sheriff Murnane's motorcycle struck the automobile but he was uninjured. Motorcycle Patrolmen Anderson, Tully, Wilson and Skoglund made an investigation of the accident.

EL MAIDA PARTY ON WAY

El Paso Delegation Is Entertained
by Isis Club.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 20.—

(Special.)—The El Maida temple delegation of El Paso, Tex., composed of

Leavell, illustrious potentate; Wyatt, Evans and Mason, past potentates, and other nobles and their wives, and the El Maida patrol, composed of 32 nobles, commanded by Captain F. M. Johnson, stopped at Daltier, where the delegation was entertained by the Isis club of that place. The party then proceeded to Pueblo and Colorado Springs, giving demonstrations at each place.

The delegation was joined out of Colorado Springs by Oleika temple, of Lexington, Ky., and Baitut Abyad temple of Albuquerque. The delegation arrived in Salt Lake last night.

El Maida, patrol headquarters in Portland will be at the St. Paul hotel, and that of the delegates at the Multnomah hotel. The party will arrive in Portland Monday at 3 P. M. Upon arrival the patrol, headed by the band of the Wichita Falls, Tex., Shrine club and by Noble Charles Kline, will march to the Perkins hotel to participate in the all-Texas parade.

SOLDIERS WANT "SWANK"

100,000 American Troops Meas-
ured for New Uniforms.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—In an effort to obtain better fitting uniforms for American soldiers, more than 100,000 men in the army have had their measurements taken, the war department announced today. The measurements were made to form the most comprehensive survey ever made for tailoring purposes and will be made available to the clothing trade.

The survey has shown what proportion of sizes should be carried for troops, according to the war department, and will enable reduction in the stock of surplus clothing kept on hand to fill requisitions.

Measurements showed that the biggest chested soldiers come from western states, while the smallest chested men were from the eastern department.

17 DIE IN RAID LED BY SEATTLE RED

Force Loots Store at Anadyr,
Siberia.

MIKOFF HEADS RAIDERS

Man From Washington City Is Re-
ported Leading Party Im-
personating Bolsheviks.

NOME, Alaska, June 19.—Seventeen persons, including the Kolchak governor, were killed at Anadyr, Siberia, last January in a clash between anti-bolshevik natives and alleged representatives of the soviet government, and an American merchant ship was looted, according to information brought here today by L. M. McGirk and Corbett Bland, Americans, who were among the passengers arriving on the Russian schooner Flyer and Bering.

McGirk and Bland said they were told of the clash by Captain Hansen, commander of Road Amundsen's steamship Maude, who stopped at their camp on his return trip, from Anadyr to the Maude in January, and who was robbed by the alleged bolsheviks.

The men who posed as soviet representatives were led by a man named Mikoff, who, according to the report, came to Anadyr from Seattle last summer in the employ of a trading company, the officials of which claim they were unaware of his political views.

American Provisions Seized

Mikoff soon obtained a following, according to the story told by Captain Hansen to McGirk and Bland, and shortly took forcible possession of the American-owned stock provisions at the trading post of Swenson and Hibbard, in the name of the soviet government, making John Lampe, the custodian, a prisoner.

After looting the store, Mikoff and his followers ran amuck in Anadyr, killing the Kolchak governor when he resisted and slaying the radio operator and both married men. The women were not molested.

For a time the alleged bolsheviks had things their own way. Late in January they raided the last store from which the natives were able to obtain supplies, whereupon the natives rebelled. In the clash, which resulted in the downfall of the Mikoff group, six or seven of the latter were killed and their bodies dragged far out on the ice and left as animal prey.

Story Told on Visit

McGirk and Bland were members of the schooner Casco party, left on the Siberian coast near Kolyukia bay last summer. While making his trip from the Maude, anchored in Chuan bay, 150 miles east of life Kolyukia river, last December, to Anadyr and on his return in January, Captain Hansen stopped at the camp of McGirk and Bland. On his return call he told them of the trouble in Anadyr and his own unpleasant experience there.

Emmanuel Tonnese, Hansen's companion on the trip to Anadyr, remained at the trading post and was among the passengers who arrived in Nome today. Beyond intimating that Amundsen would in all likelihood reach Nome this summer, Tonnese had nothing to say about the expedition.

The exact location of "Anadyr" is uncertain. It is the name of a river which empties into Anadyr bay, an arm of the gulf of Anadyr which opens on Bering sea. Some 300 miles up this river is the Russian trading post of Amudirskol, but whether it is this settlement to which Hansen is reported to have gone or another nearer Bering sea, is not clear. Amudirskol apparently would have been on the route from Chuan bay where Amundsen's steamer was, to Nome, where dispatches last April said Amundsen was sending Hansen and a companion with mail.

NON-PARTISANS TO MEET

Convention in Pasco Today to Be
Held in Two Sections.

PASCO, Wash., June 20.—(Special.)—Non-partisan league conventions will be held in Pasco tomorrow. The convention will be held in two sections—the farmers' section and the workers' section. Considerable interest is being manifested in just what the convention will do in the matter of candidates for various offices.

Whether it will put a non-partisan ticket in the field for county offices, or select men to file on the old party tickets at the primaries is not yet known.

Astoria Caravan on Way

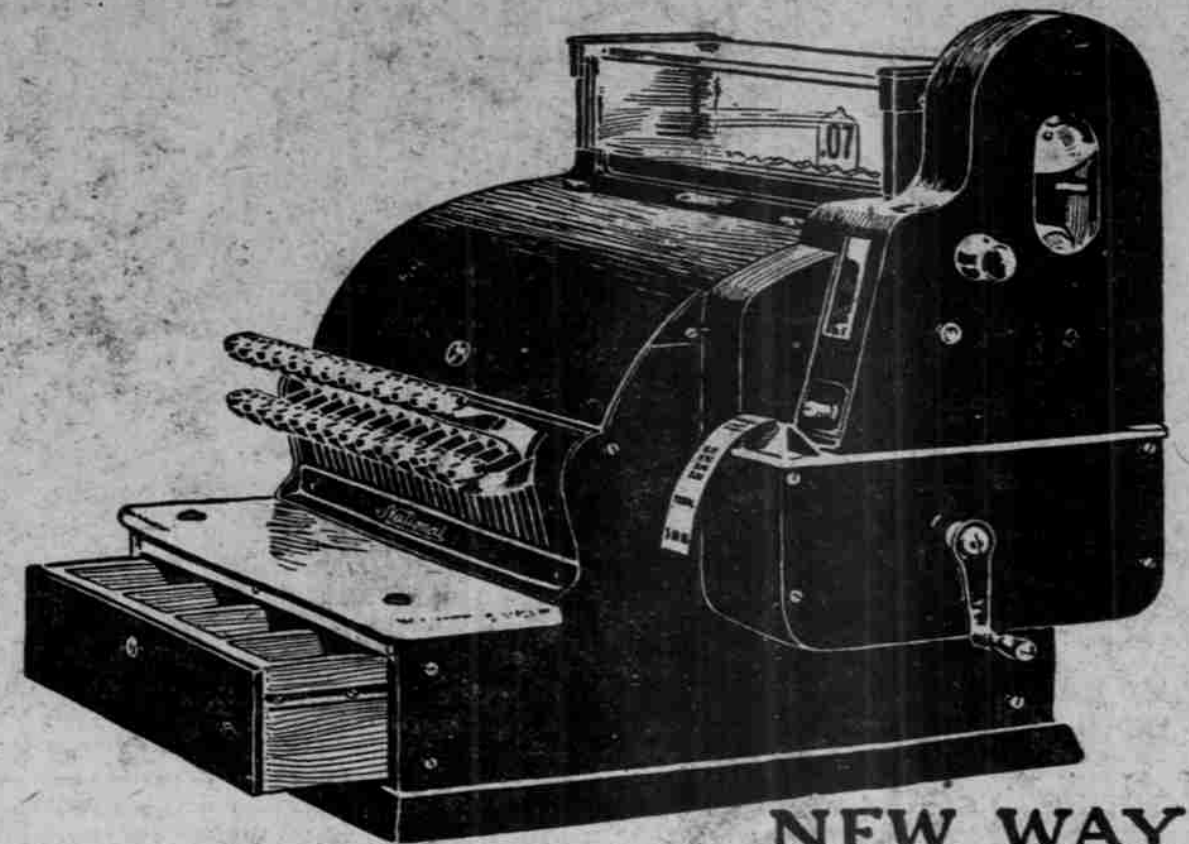
