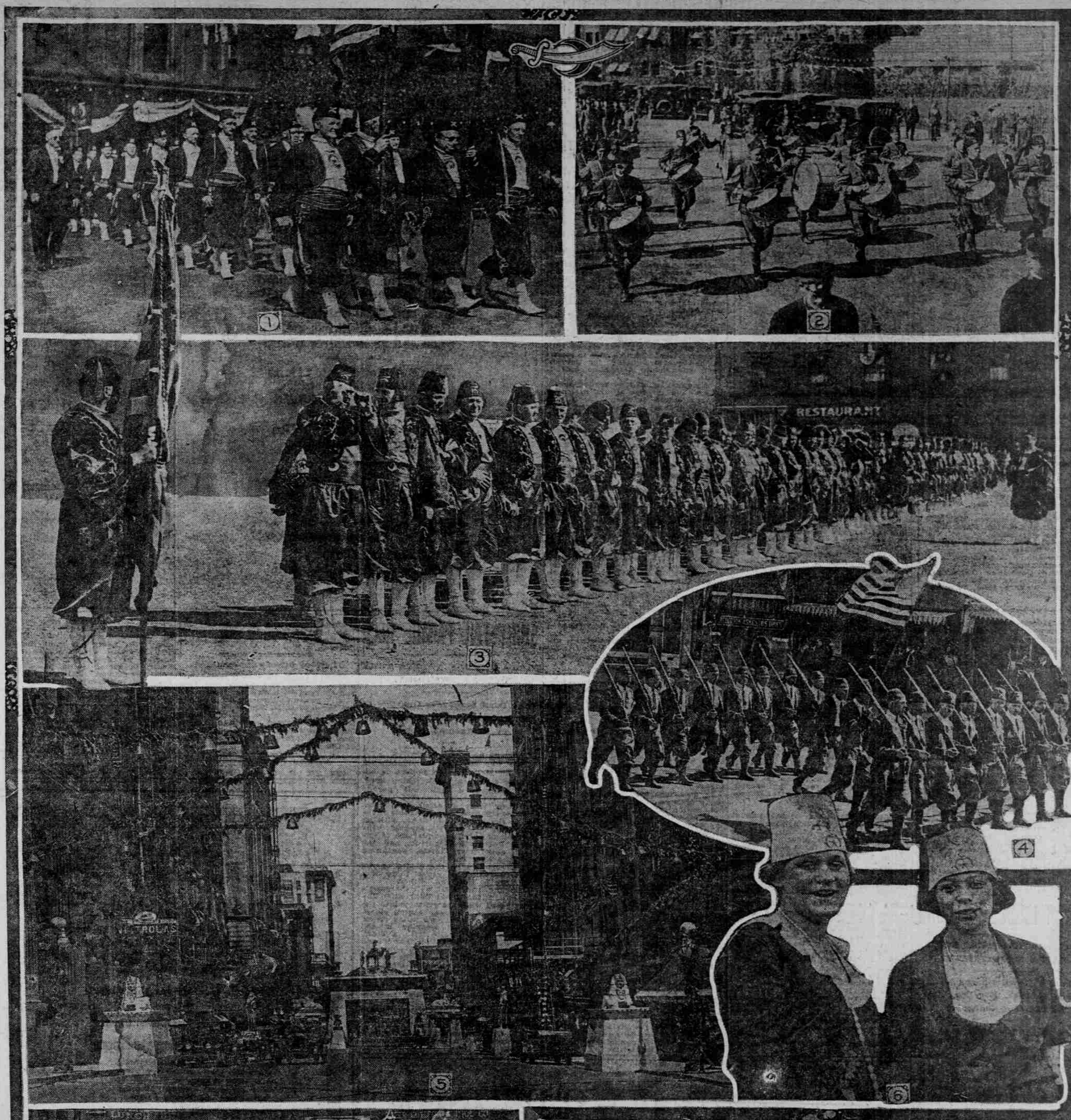
Rose to Be Christened.

ROOMS FOR ALL SHRINERS

NOBLES REGISTER AS FAST AS TRAINS ARRIVE.

Big Drive for Quarters in Private Dwellings Begins Early This Morning.

"Where do we go from here, boys, where do we go from here?" This is the favorite chant of newly-arrived Shriners as they disembark from official automobiles either at general headquarters or housing and hotel headquarters on Broadway. And their musical plea is soon answered. As each special arrives at the Union station, the visitors are taken first to registration headquarters to register, and are then accom-

panied to the housing and hotel headquarters a few steps south. As soon as they are assigned to their rooms, be it hotel or private dwelling, visitors are bundled into waiting automobiles and whisked away to their temporary homes.

The detailed work of the housing committee was carried on all day yesterday without the slightest hitch. Al Kader nobles, assisted by a corps of clerks and stenographers, were very much on the job, and attended to the housing wants of the visitors without confusion.

Assignments of hotel rooms were made many weeks in advance, thus making the allotment of rooms for many of the temples simply a matter of routine.

According to J. P. Jaeger, general chairman of this committee, a sufficient number of rooms have been registered with the committee to take care of every visiting Shriners and guest for the week. Those arriving early will be accommodated in the business section.

So far there has been no complaint of northern Idaho and a Shriners.

of any kind about the nature of the accommodations, and the committee is making a determined effort to select the most desirable of the rooms listed.

The big drive for quarters in private dwellings will not start until today and every committee automobile will be compelled to go at top speed from morning to night taking care of the visitors.

MANY AUTOISTS ON WAY

HOOD RIVER COUNTS 500 MACHINES WITH SHRINERS.

Gasoline Supply Is Plentiful—Columbia River Highway Travel Is Heavy.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 20.—(Special.)—With a few exceptions, automobiles in record numbers for the season have been traveling westward over the Columbia river highway laden with Shriners and their families headed for the great Portland oasis. Cars bearing Montana, Idaho, Wyoming and Washington license tags have been interspersed with numerous ones from eastern Oregon.

It is estimated that fully 500 have passed through to the west today. All nature has smiled a greeting. Recent rains have left hillside pleasantly verdant. While the sun has shone brilliantly, a west wind has prevented an unpleasant rise in temperature. Hood River folk, meeting without this slight hitch, have distributed roses.

Gasoline is plentiful. The Standard Oil has assured garages a full supply throughout the week. Lack of signs, however, has caused much inconvenience to motorists.

SEATTLE HOST TO 5500

'SMILE WITH NILE' PASSWORD, AND EVERYONE SMILES.

Guests Are Taken on Auto Trips and Visits to Bremerton; Competitive Drill Held.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 20.—(Special.)—Seattle resembled today a little bit of old Egypt. Five thousand five hundred red-fessed Shriners descended on the town, and the townsmen smilingly surrendered. "Smile with Nile" was the password and everybody smiled. Even old Sol himself put aside trespassing clouds and did his share with the broadest smile of all.

Twenty-five thousand persons turned out at Woodland park this afternoon to view the Shriners' competitive drill and hear the band contest. Chartered steamers plied the bay with guests of Nile temple, automobiles toured the boulevards and went into the country with the visitors, other steamers went to the islands in the sound and Bremerton, and all day long a reception was held at the depot and at the tent headquarters in City Hall park.

Yaarab temple of Atlanta won the first prize in the patrol drills with Aladdin temple of Columbus, O., taking second prize. The Columbus patrol is headed by Captain H. R. Allen, a direct lineal descendant of General Ethan Allen of revolutionary fame. The Aladdin temple band took first prize in the band contest, with second prize going to the Zorah temple band of Terre Haute, Ind.

SHRINE LAUNCHING SET FOR TUESDAY

Vancouver Invites Visitors to See New Ship.

IMPERIAL SPONSOR FOUND

9600-Ton Freighter Antinous to Kiss Waters Under Most Favorable Auspices.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 20.—(Special.)—Tuesday will be a gala holiday in Vancouver, all places of business, including banks, will close that everyone may assist in entertaining the thousands of Shriners who will be here for the launching of the Antinous. Mrs. Ellis Lewis Garrison, wife of the deputy imperial potentate, will be the sponsor of the 9600-ton steel ship being built for the Green Star Line of New York by the G. M. Standifer Construction corporation.

The entire county has been called upon to assist in transporting the visitors from Portland to Vancouver and return by automobile. There will be special street cars marked VC leaving Portland on Broadway and a train will leave the Union depot at 1 o'clock. Another train will leave Vancouver at 4:30 after tea launching, which will take place at 3:30 o'clock.

Sponsor to Have Suite.

Mrs. Garrison and party will be at Hotel St. Elmo and the line of march will be from there. A full band of 40 pieces and Affili patrol, the Vancouver Shrine club patrol, and the Prunarians, all in uniform will proceed to the shipyard at 2:30 P. M. All Shriners and visitors will fall in line, and the automobiles will take the ladies to the yard.

The ship will be especially decorated in honor of the Shriners and special platforms have been built for the distinguished guests at the bow. The Affili and Prunarian bands will furnish music.

The sheriff's office and the Vancouver police force will keep the streets clear for the parade and the Prunarians will assist in routing the automobiles arriving and departing with guests from Portland.

Visitors Receive Invitations.

Invitations have been printed and are being placed in the hands of as many visitors as possible and all will be welcome to attend the launching. To better facilitate handling the crowd, the Standifer plant will close at noon, Tuesday, and will not open until Wednesday morning. The whole plant will be turned over to the visiting Shriners and their friends. The shipyard was built at a cost of over \$5,000,000, and is now building 12,000-ton tankers for the Standard Oil company in addition to the 9600-ton freighters for the Green Star line.

The city limits of Vancouver and Portland are only five miles apart and Vancouver is in Washington, U. S. A., not B. C.

The automobile drive from Portland to Vancouver is over the Columbia river interstate bridge, which, to build row, would cost in excess of \$5,000,000. Automobiles take about 15 to 20 minutes to make the trip.

Vancouver barracks are located in Vancouver and there are many historic and interesting points to be seen. There is the oldest apple tree growing in the United States in the barracks. It is almost 100 years old and is yet bearing fruit. The building used as post headquarters when General Grant was here is now the officers' club house.

SCOUTS TO AID SHRINERS

2100 LADS RECRUITED FOR DUTIES DURING WEEK.

Rest Station Provided and Ice Water to Be Served to Paraders and Pedestrians.

The Boy Scouts are giving a demonstration of their slogan, "Be Prepared," in plans perfected for their duties as hosts to the visiting Shriners.

Everyone of Oregon's 2100 Scouts has been recruited for a variety of duties throughout the week. Troop 49, comprising 25 boys in charge of Marion Stroup, have erected a tent 30x50 feet directly back of the Heilig theater, at the corner of Taylor and Park streets, which will be open to all visitors for the purpose of providing ice water and easy chairs and couches, stationery and a first-aid outfit with competent persons in charge. No charge will be made for any service rendered. All visitors will be welcome any hour of the day or night.

Barrels of ice water will be placed at ten stations on the line of march with six Scouts in charge of each. At each station trays will be filled with paper cups and carried out to the Shriners who are marching. When parades are not passing through the streets, boys will be in charge of the barrels to pass out ice water to pedestrians, thousands of cups having been provided for this service.

Scores of Scouts already are doing work for the housing committee in escorting visiting Shriners to their temporary homes as soon as they are assigned. Another large corps of Scouts is going errands for the general headquarters. Beginning today an additional corps will be placed at the disposal of the traffic policemen to assist in preventing accidents at the street intersections by warning people and helping old people and children across crowded streets.
