LOGGERS IS KILLED.—J. F. Stanek, 22, of 210 Morrison street, Portland, was killed in an accident at the Silver Falls Logging company near Silverton, Or., Saturday afternoon, according to word received in Portland yesterday. Details of the accident were not received. Mr. Stanek was a member of local Timber Workers of Portland, and a member of the Oddfellows at Kalama, Wash. Philip Holden, organizer for the timber workers, 315 Lumber Exchange building, is making an effort to get in touch with the man's relatives.

Ten-Year-Old Boy Drowns.—Lester Webb, 10-year-old son of Harry Webb, of Whitcomb court, was drowned in a bathtub at the foot of Baltimore street, St. Johns, yesterday morning. The boy accidentally slipped from a raft on which he was playing with some companions, and went down in ten feet of water. Jewel Chor, a man who was swimming near the scene of the drowning, dove in and recovered the body.

Boy Held on Open Charge.—Halterford Martin, student 17 years of age, is being held by the police for investigation following his arrest by Inspectors Howard and Moran at Second and Couch streets. The boy was discovered by the inspectors trying to sell a bicycle for \$10, and, according to a confession he is alleged to have made, he stole the wheel in Salem, Or. The inspectors wired the Salem authorities and if Martin is wanted by them he will be sent back.

EAST SIDE WITHOUT TRUCK.—As the result of the accident to fire truck 4, which crashed into a building while responding to an alarm at East Water and Alder streets Saturday, the entire east side of the city is left without truck company, as the other three fire trucks are in the business section of the city. Fire chief H. H. Hays announced that an ordinary auto truck would be fitted up with a few ladders and placed in service until the truck could be repaired.

FIRE DAMAGES RESIDENCE.—Fire caused by a defective chimney broke out about noon yesterday in the home of Mrs. R. P. Rankin, 524 Clifton street, and caused damage estimated at \$1000. Members of engine companies 4 and 15 extinguished the flames after 30 minutes of fighting. Both chemicals and water were used. The fire spread from the chimney to the roof and burned downward into the attic.

Editor Now So Well.—Roe Fulkerson of Washington, D. C., editor of the Kiwanis magazine, who is ill at his room in the Multnomah hotel, was reported yesterday to be apparently not so well as on the preceding day. Mr. Fulkerson had been ordered to keep to his bed in the effort to rest up for the return trip to Washington. It is feared that he will have to undergo a major operation, but he hopes to postpone it until his arrival home.
