

DEMOCRATS EXPECT PROHIBITION FIGHT

Someone Held Certain to Go Against Bryan.

LEAGUE ACTION WAITS

Discussion of Plank Is Held Up Pending Arrival of Senator Glass of Virginia.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—With the opening of the democratic national convention a week away, a stir of activity was noticeable about hotel headquarters in addition to preliminary work at the auditorium where the delegates will gather. It took the form of informal discussion between national committee members and state leaders already on the ground, devoted chiefly to anticipated struggles with platform-building. There was virtually no talk as to presidential candidates.

A plain intimation ran through this undercurrent of platform talk that proposals to modify the federal prohibition enforcement act were expected by some of the democrats to have war horses to share honors with if not to eclipse the league of nations issue when the framing of this plank is undertaken.

Fierce Battle Expected.
Nobody had any direct statement to make or was talking for publication. Some of the men who will have a hand in shaping the party's declaration of principles, however, talked much more privately and demanded that the doctrine of state's rights should apply to beer restrictions.

Taken in connection with the announced purpose of W. J. Bryan to resist any weakening of prohibition enforcement measures, the talk brought to the surface the feeling of prominent democrats already here that a fierce battle on the point in the resolutions committee was not to be avoided. They believed also that ultimately the question would be fought out on the convention floor.

Discussion of the league plank apparently awaited the arrival of Senator Glass of Virginia, slated to head the resolutions committee and who is coming direct from a conference with President Wilson. The contest over the league issue already has been sharply in the conflicting views of the president and Mr. Bryan, and talk about the hotel lobbies today did not disclose great immediate interest in the questions involved.

Walsh Eyed for Chairman.
The name of Senator Walsh of Montana was mentioned in the discussion today of the probable permanent chairman of the convention. The Montana senator was mentioned by a number of leaders in tentative way, although others said they believed Secretary Colby of the state department would be the man urged by administration forces, despite his statement that he was not a candidate for the convention floor.

No delegations have yet put in an appearance except for a state leader here and there, coming in to arrange accommodations for his delegates and also to look over the ground and pick up ideas from men from other sections of the country.

There is little about the city as yet to indicate that it is to play host to its first national political convention next week. The wires were busy during the day, however, with reports of delegations getting under way from the eastern seaboard and every arriving train added to the group of well-known figures in democratic circles slowly assembling about headquarters of the national committee.

LEWIS OFFERS PLATFORM
Ex-Senator From Illinois Sees Other Issues Than League.

CHICAGO, June 21.—James Hamilton Lewis, ex-United States senator from Illinois and candidate for the democratic vice-presidential nomination, announced today that he will urge "in my own behalf, as well as upon the convention for the democracy" he will leave tonight for San Francisco.

"At San Francisco we must do things for our people at home," he said. "If the democracy will not do things for the people, the people will do things for the democracy."

Mr. Lewis' platform declared in favor of the government taking the railways, waterways, telegraph lines, oil and coal lands from private monopoly and assuming control for the people, leaving the method of operation by private or public agency to the condition of each concern may warrant.

Other planks demanded announcement of "the new doctrine of an American foreign policy; that every American in any land carries the protection of his whole country to his life or his property, wherever located; that we should express sympathy with the people of any nation, giving Ireland the fullest aid our institutions permit"; that "we must provide that complaints of high prices should have a hearing before a tribunal, with power to declare a fair price, then punish as criminals those who violate the decision of the fair price."

In asserting that the league of nations cannot be the only issue in the coming campaign, Mr. Lewis said: "We now owe something at home. We must propose measures for the relief of the United States. We must make an issue of the deliberate refusal of the republicans to propose any one measure to remove the high

cost of living, or to provide homes for the homeless—the refusal to deny that it was their intention to repeal the present federal reserve bank and the farm loan law."

"The democracy must make a platform at San Francisco that is affirmative, constructive and promises the continuance of the policies of enrichment of this land and the protection of the American citizen, leaving Europe and foreign questions to be taken up where such can be done without the abandonment of the rights of American citizens," the senator's platform concluded.

COLBY FOR INTACT LEAGUE

Wilson's Spokesman Is Ready to Leave for Convention.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Secretary Bainbridge Colby on leaving tonight for the democratic national convention, where he will act as one of President Wilson's spokesmen, declared he favored endorsement by the convention of the league of nations, "certainly without any reservations that are nullifying."

Secretary Colby, who is a delegate from the District of Columbia, and who has been mentioned in connection with the permanent chairmanship, held a lengthy conference with the president's cabinet members today.

"I don't believe," said Mr. Colby, "that the Versailles treaty with its league of nations covenant requires any interpretative reservations. The document is so clear that interpretative resolutions can hardly be urged. It is necessary, however, of reservation of paraphrases will clarify, there is no objection, but reservations of the covenant are things which no man, solicitous about America's honor, can take into his reckoning."

Four other cabinet officers will be present at San Francisco. They are Postmaster General Burleson, who goes as a delegate from Texas; Secretary Daniels, Attorney-General Palmer and Secretary Meredith.

President Wilson plans to keep in direct touch with the leaders at the convention by means of the long-distance telephone. Secretary Colby, acting for the president, talked with Chairman Cummings of the democratic national committee on the telephone for some time today.

HARDING CHOICE DOUBTED

There is indifference and even resentment. That newspaper which in all the territory west of the Mississippi has for nearly a generation had a larger political following than any other paper and which followed Roosevelt in 1912 and Hughes in 1916 is now in a mood of distaste, which is able to maintain silence only through self-restraint. Its management has informed the republican leaders that the paper will refrain from taking a stand until after the democratic nomination. The inference of its attitude is unmistakably to the effect that if the democrats should name a candidate with a progressive record and a progressive promise the paper would feel inclined to support him.

California Papers Displeased.
In California two of the most important progressive republican papers are outspokenly displeased with the prospect of a republican nomination. They are even seeking to persuade the democrats to make a nomination satisfactory to them.

In the same direction a republican leader in this territory who has had long experience with the league as a party manager and as a successful candidate for high office himself expressed to your correspondent his judgment that the democrats should name what is from the point of view of progressives a good nomination, then the republican party would be inclined to support him.

Kansas Taken for Example.
In Kansas, for example, although your correspondent has not been in the state, he is informed that there is civil war among the republicans because of what is regarded as the disloyalty of Governor Allen, who had made the speech nominating Wood. Wood to Harding in the recent convention. In several of the other states there are not merely threats but well organized movements in the direction of the non-partisan league.

The fact is that at best the republican party is in a bad way in this trans-Mississippi country. In 1916 the republicans lost every state west of the Mississippi except Iowa, Minnesota, Oregon and South Dakota. Of these four they carried Minnesota by 5000, Iowa by the only state which on the performance of 1916 can be looked upon as a dependable republican state. And even if the republicans should carry Iowa, while losing all the other trans-Mississippi states, they would lose the country.

Of course, no one can make a prediction for the present year based upon analogy to 1916. On the other hand, can anyone doubt that it is at least within the possibilities for the democrats to name this year a man who is as much more acceptable to the west than Harding as Wilson was more acceptable than Hughes in 1916? The truth is it is not commonly realized to what an extent the west has come to hold the balance of power. Neither is it realized how far this same west has got away from anything like permanent political moorings and has become a variable and independent quantity with a tendency toward the democrats.

The democrats will carry the solid south, of course. If, in addition, they should carry all, or nearly all, of the trans-Mississippi states, they wouldn't need anything else. One could well imagine the democrats adopting a slogan and a policy of "the solid south and the solid west, and let the rest go hang."

In nominating Harding the republicans have done nothing for the west. In nominating Coolidge they have done nothing for the west geographically. The two openings combined are almost too big for the democrats to miss.

All of this is subject to the qualification that the attitude of the west toward the republican ticket is not one of active hostility. Far from that, it is rather the attitude of "watchful waiting," watchful waiting for two things: First, to see what the democrats do; and, second, to see what kind of campaign Harding makes. And always it should be said that however the independently inclined voter may feel about it, the regular party worker, the man who leads and gets the vote out on election day, is more pleased with Harding than with any other nomination the republicans have made for a long time.

DATES TO NOTIFY NOMINEES ARE SET

Harding Ceremony July 22; Coolidge July 27.

CONFERENCE LASTS DAY

Executive Committee Also Is Decided—Hays to Announce Personnel Today.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Senator Harding will be formally notified of his nomination as the republican presidential candidate July 22 at his home in Marion, O.

Governor Coolidge of Massachusetts will be notified of his nomination as vice-president on July 27 at his Northampton home.

The dates for the notification ceremonies were decided on today at a conference here in which Senator Harding, Chairman Hays and a subcommittee of the republican national committee participated.

The conference, which lasted all day and into the early night, also agreed on an executive committee to have general charge of the campaign, but it was not until tomorrow, to permit Chairman Hays to communicate with the party members and ascertain whether they will serve.

Committee to Be Increased.
It was understood, however, that among members appointed was Harry M. Eganberry of Columbus, O., previous campaign manager for Senator Harding. Under a rule adopted by the Chicago convention the committee is to be increased to 15 members, the five new members to be women.

The conference was the first formal meeting between the republican presidential nominee and members of the national committee.

Mr. Hays issued a statement today praising Senator Harding and Governor Coolidge, the vice-presidential nominee, as men measuring "up to every requirement of a presidential candidate."

"I'm strong for Senator Harding on the front-porch campaign plan," he said, adding that Governor Coolidge held a similar attitude. Such a method, he asserted, "is the only proper way to maintain silence only through self-restraint."

Chicago to Be Center.
Mr. Hays told newspaper men that the center of activity for the campaign would be Chicago. He said, however, that the New York office would be no less important than in the past. Headquarters also will continue to be maintained in Washington and San Francisco, with a branch in Denver. Mr. Hays said he felt compelled to decline until after Mr. Harding had made his speech of acceptance.

The chairman said he expected Mr. Daugherty to take more than an advisory part in the campaign.

Chairman Hays in his formal statement said: "Senator Harding possesses just those vital qualities of mind and heart necessary today and in the time just ahead, his firmness of mind, his soundness of judgment, his hold on fundamentals, his appreciation of the needs of today and of tomorrow, his love of the people from whom he came and of whom he is one, and his faith in them; his magnificent grasp of large affairs, his great natural ability, his leadership in state and national affairs, his sense of responsibility, his regard for the opinion of others, his experience and success in the handling of men, his proper appreciation of his country's position as a responsible factor in the world's future, but with the fullest realization of the absolute importance of our own supreme nationalism, his sterling Americanism, his righteous sense of duty, his thoroughness, and with all his thoroughness, his ability to see the most exceptional degree for the tremendous responsibilities which soon will be his. He will make a splendid candidate and a great president. The country will love him, honor him, trust him and follow him, just as all who know him love and trust him, and the world will honor him."

"Too, in Governor Coolidge we have a candidate for vice-president that measures up to every requirement of a presidential candidate. Fortunately indeed is the country."

Senator Harding is expected to remain here until a few days before his notification.

It was learned that for perhaps the first time in the party's history, the executive committee would be confined to members of the national committee. Instead, Mr. Hays said, seven members would be women while the men would include a number from outside the national committee.

BRANDING CHILD CHARGED

Warrant Issued for Arrest of Kindergarten Principal.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 21.—A charge that she branded the arm of a 4-year-old child, Kent Cooper, one of her pupils, with a fork to punish him for stealing matches, was made the basis here today of a misdemeanor warrant against Mrs. Louise Q. Lyle, principal of a kindergarten. The warrant was sworn to by the child's mother.

Officials of the California society for the prevention of cruelty to children announced their intention of prosecuting the charge.

The principal was said by the boy's mother to have taken the child into the kitchen of the kindergarten and to have heated a fork which she applied to his wrist.

THREE ARE SHOT IN RIOT

Suspicion of Strike-Breakers Is Cause of Attack.

WATERBURY, Conn., June 21.—Three men were shot in a riot near the Scovill Manufacturing company's plant today. The wounded are Lieutenant Richard Leroy Lee of the police department; J. J. Bergin of the company's protective force; and an Italian striker.

The trouble began with a gathering of strikers at the police station, which was broken up by police. The police believe, by reports that the Scovill company was to use strike breakers.
