SEATTLE, Wash., June 21.—(Special.)—By a unanimous vote of the seven members present the city council this afternoon passed an ordinance increasing the city light and power rates by approximately 25 percent over Mayor Hugh M. Caldwell's recent veto. By the new ordinance the minimum monthly charge for lighting in residences will be raised from 50 to 75 cents, and commercial light rates will be raised from 1.13 cents to 1.35 a kilowatt hour as a minimum to 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 cents a kilowatt hour as a maximum. William Hickman Moore presided as president of the council.

PIERRE, S. D., June 21.—The special session of the state legislature convened this morning after having been postponed from May 24 on account of flood conditions at that time. The general sentiment of the legislators is that they will put a close limit on legislative work and take up only matters of an emergency character, allowing other matters to go over until the regular session in January.

In his message to the legislators, Governor Norbeck declared that a special session necessary because state institutions needed funds. 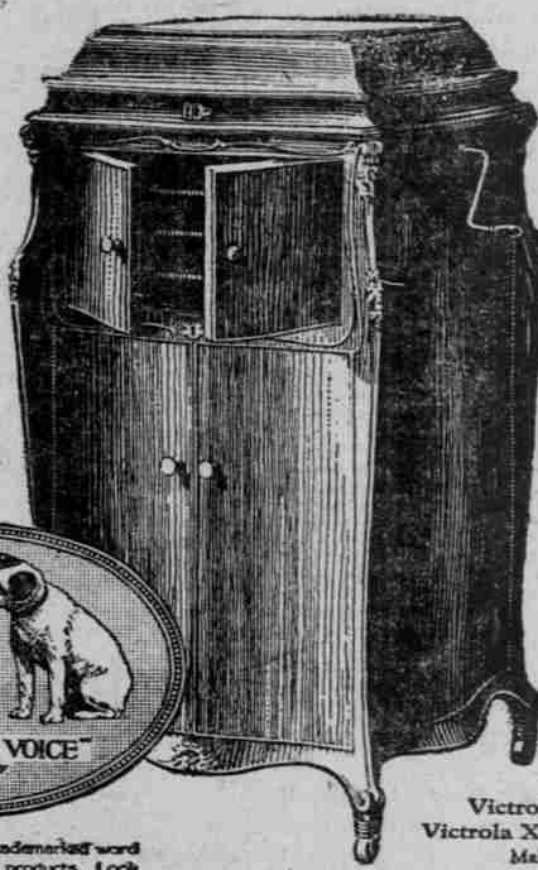

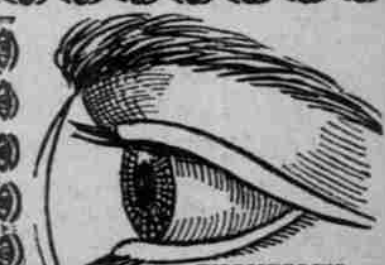
