

SENDING DEGENERATE
TO OREGON REPRESENTEDArrest of Annoyer of Little
Girls Ordered.

NEW YORK IS CRITICISED

Governor Olcott Declares State Is
No Dumping Ground—San-
ity Hearing Planned.

SALEM, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—Should Milton Schwartz, recently arrested in New York City on a charge of attacking little girls and later released on the promise that relatives would take him to Oregon, attempt to enter this state he will be arrested and examined as to his sanity, according to a letter prepared today by Governor Olcott and sent to Walter Evans, district attorney of Multnomah county.

Schwartz had resided in New York City for some time. Recently it was alleged he attacked several little girls in that city and was examined before a supreme court justice, in the city of New York. The court was about to commit him to an insane hospital, when the mother and an uncle of the man promised that they would take him to Oregon if he were released.

Man Reported Dangerous.

The justice permitted his release on their promise. Authorities at the examination in New York, were reported to have stated that Schwartz was dangerous to be at large.

"I have written to Mr. Evans requesting that he take immediate action against Schwartz in the event Schwartz comes into his jurisdiction," said the governor today, "but through the press I wish to ask that in event Schwartz goes into any other county of Oregon the same action be taken. Immediate steps there to have him examined as to his sanity. I consider it an outrage on the part of the officials in New York state to permit a man of this caliber to be foisted on our state. The little girls in Oregon are as fully entitled to protection as the little children in New York state, and whenever this man enters our state I trust that prompt action will be taken to see that our children are protected."

Letter Sent to Mr. Evans.

The letter which the governor addressed to District Attorney Evans follows:

"My attention has been called, through the press and other sources, to the case of Milton Schwartz, an alleged degenerate and assaulter of little girls, who was declared in a court in New York to be insane and dangerous to be at large. He was, nevertheless, released upon representations of his relatives, who promised to take him to Oregon. I understand he left New York in company with his relatives for Portland a few days since. In the event that this man arrives in Portland I am requesting that you see that he is apprehended immediately and examined as to his mental condition.

"I am informed that the justice who sat on his case in New York was about to commit him to an insane hospital, when his relatives interposed the plea that he be allowed to accompany them to Portland. I understand that they represented that he is watched by an attendant, but I further understand that he has eluded this attendant on occasions and pursued his fancy for little girls.

"I consider that gross injustice has been worked against the state of Oregon in permitting this man to come here, and there should be no delay in seeing that he is examined by the proper authorities for such disposition as the examination may warrant. I am trying to ascertain by telephone with which relatives he is connected, when his relatives interposed the plea that he be allowed to accompany them to Portland. I understand that they represented that he is watched by an attendant, but I further understand that he has eluded this attendant on occasions and pursued his fancy for little girls.

minute the first section came to rest under the trees, its famed Philadelphia "Millionaire band" came into action with a blast of trumpets that started the crowds running for blocks.

10,000 See Columbia.

Ten thousand Shriners and their wives were taken out to the Columbia highway in 2500 donated cars.

But an additional 10,000 were disappointed, some so bitterly that they wept.

Ira P. Powers worked like a Trojan. "We shall have the cars tomorrow," he pledged. Then he said: "The salvation of Portland's reputation for hospitality depends on the auto owners of Portland."

"All over the city are to be seen cars with visitors' cards running without passengers. All today we have been impressing passing cars on the street and sending them out. Portland auto owners, I appeal to you to do our city justice."

Thousands saw the city from the vantage of street cars. Perhaps 5000 went over the "arrow route." Two thousand, at least visited the Eastern and Western sawmills, and were amazed as they saw the giant logs entering the mill and the finished product leaving it.

Women Ride on River.

Some hundreds of women were taken on river trips.

W. Freeland Kendrick, imperial potentate, was the honor guest on the highway and as many of the 700 imperial representatives as could be rounded up were driven over Portland's wonder boulevard.

Two handsomely-gowned women marched by their sides, but it was whispered they were Julian Eitings in disguise.

Then 150 white-clad nobles, bearing white umbrellas, with the words in red, "Lu Lu" on their tops.

Gorgeously-clad chanters sang whenever the band took a rest.

Money Raised for Charity.
The band was directed by Dr. H. Howard Thomas. It is composed of former professional musicians and has a money-raising record for charities that perhaps has never been surpassed.

On the start of its cross-country trip it played for an ice and milk charity for half an hour. Net results: \$10,000. During the Chicago convention the band serenaded Governor Spruille.

Then Za-Ga-Zig. The Za-Ga-Ziggers hail from Des Moines, Ia. They brought with them a snappy band.

parade, they said. And parade it was. They organized one of their own, martialled their patrol into line, commandeered a few auto trucks and loaded the women members of their party onto them and, presto! they were off.

And oh, the girls from Stella of Dallas. Hella did not mind band playing, patrolling, chanting or doing anything like that, but those Texas beauties were treated like queens. Palatial autos and trucks were chartered for them and they visited the city escorted by the band and patrol. You should have heard the cheers. But perhaps you did, or were one of those who cheered.

Southern Songs Appeal.
Tangier of Omaha did the same, while at the same time Tangier nobles were welcoming Portlanders to their magnificent headquarters in the Multnomah hotel.

Then Kosair. Kosair only arrived last night in his big Louisville special with over 200 nobles and their wives.

But a few minutes later the big Kosair band was heading its own little—relatively speaking—parade.

And everytime they stopped the band would be subdued and the Kosair chanters, handsome as Arab chiefs, in white with dark purple cloaks, sang the songs of the south. And the crowd cheered. It cheered from sheer delight and happiness.

There was Afrit of Tacoma, which has already unloaded two specials in Portland and has a third on the way. They chartered trucks and bore its cheering nobles and women and its bully band all over the city.

Canadians on Hand.

From far-away Al Hazar, Calgary, Alta., came its band with its snappy killed patrol. And when they started their wanderings over the streets, Gizeh, from Victoria, B. C., joined in, from a fellow feeling that Canucka is a real comedian, and the Murat lads borrowed him from a roadshow to bring to Portland.

The leader of the band is W. S. Mitchell.

Nile swung into line, headed by Harvey J. Woods, and they "smiled with Nile." So did the crowd. And so it was. Perhaps there were a score of others, but who could see them all? They swung into line, they disbanded, but they did their best to have a good time and to let everyone who heard them have the best time possible.

OAKS ENTERTAINS 14,600

Audience Sees "Hogan in Egypt,"
Written for Event.

Camels and Shrine emblems outlined in fire formed part of the spectacular aerial programme put on last night by Manager Cordray of the Oaks, who was host to 14,600 visitors during the day. The park was crowded with nobles, all of whom were admitted free, to take part in the Shrine entertainment.

A portion of the fireworks, especially the bombs and rockets, had been designed especially for the San Francisco exhibition and this was the first time they had been shown here. NORTHWEST TO HAVE
RECLAMATION BODYFour-State Organization Is
Planned at Boise.

PROJECT IS WELL BACKED

Another Meeting to Further Enter-
prise Will Be Called to Be
Held in Seattle Soon.

BOISE, Idaho, June 21.—(Special.)—Plans were perfected at a conference held in Boise today by representatives from Idaho, Washington, Oregon and Montana for the formation of what will be known as the Northwest Reclamation association. The plans were outlined by a delegation of Spokane business men, who appeared before the conference. The purpose is to meet the competition that is expected from an organization perfected in southern states.

Governor Davis of Idaho opposed the plan on the ground that the Western States Reclamation association had been organized and could take up the same work as the proposed northwestern association. He was supported by Major Reed, secretary of the Idaho Reclamation association; ex-Governor Spuy of Utah and others. Frank R. Gooding, former governor of the state, spoke in favor of the plan. The opposition was modified when it was explained that the purpose was to supplement the Western States Reclamation association and assist it in its work.

Meeting to Be Called.
The governors of the four states will issue a proclamation calling for a more general conference, to be held in Seattle September 16 and 17. The representatives and senators of the four states will also endorse the call. The Spokane delegation, which presented the plan, included: President Gilbert of the Spokane chamber of Commerce; N. W. Durham, chairman of the Columbia river basin project committee of the Spokane chamber; W. H. Linney, of the board of trustees, Spokane chamber; J. A. Ford, executive secretary of the Spokane chamber; R. R. Rogers, prominent business man of Spokane, and R. D. Kelly, of the Spokane Advertising club.

President Gilbert was introduced to the meeting by W. N. Sweet, president of the Boise chamber of Commerce, and in his short talk emphasized the fact that reclamation needs the united efforts of all the states of the northwest and southwest in order to be recognized in the east. He paid a compliment to the work the state of Idaho has been doing along the lines of reclamation in developing a trail to be followed by the other states. He also told of the promise of cooperation by Portland, Spokane and Tacoma toward the development of their hinterland.

League Held Necessary.
Mr. Gilbert introduced N. W. Durham, chairman of the Columbia basin project committee of the Spokane chamber, who made the principal talk of the morning. Mr. Durham went into the matter of what could be done for reclamation thoroughly and asked that the state of Idaho help in the organization of a league in the four northwestern states, so that the development on this section will receive recognition in the eyes of congress and the east.

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HOUSEBOAT IS BURNED

Firemen Find \$100 in Gold in

Fire, believed to have started from a defective flue, totally destroyed a houseboat belonging to Frank Shaffer in the Willamette river near Guild lake yesterday.

Fireboat 2 responded to the alarm, but by the time it arrived the houseboat was practically destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$100.

The firemen recovered \$100 in gold from the ruins and turned them over to Mr. Shaffer.
