REGATTA MIEN IS TAME

NEW LONDON CALM ON EVE OF YALE-HARVARD RACE.

Blue Crews Triumph in Two Impromptu Races Held Over Thames Course.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 24.—In marked contrast to the gay scenes of previous years, New London maintained a dignified mien tonight on the eve of the annual Yale-Harvard regatta.

The air of sedateness, however, did not obtain at the rival crew quarters several miles up the Thames, for during the afternoon there were two impromptu races in which Yale was twice victorious.

In the race for combination eights composed of substitutes and others who will not compete in the events of the regular regatta, the Yale crew defeated the Harvard oarsmen close to two lengths over a one-mile course.

The regatta day programme, consisting of three races, opens with the contest for freshmen eights and will be two miles down stream starting at 10:45 A. M. (eastern standard time).

The junior varsity eight-oar crews will match oarsmen over the same course at 11:15 o'clock.

The varsity eights will row four miles upstream at 5 o'clock.

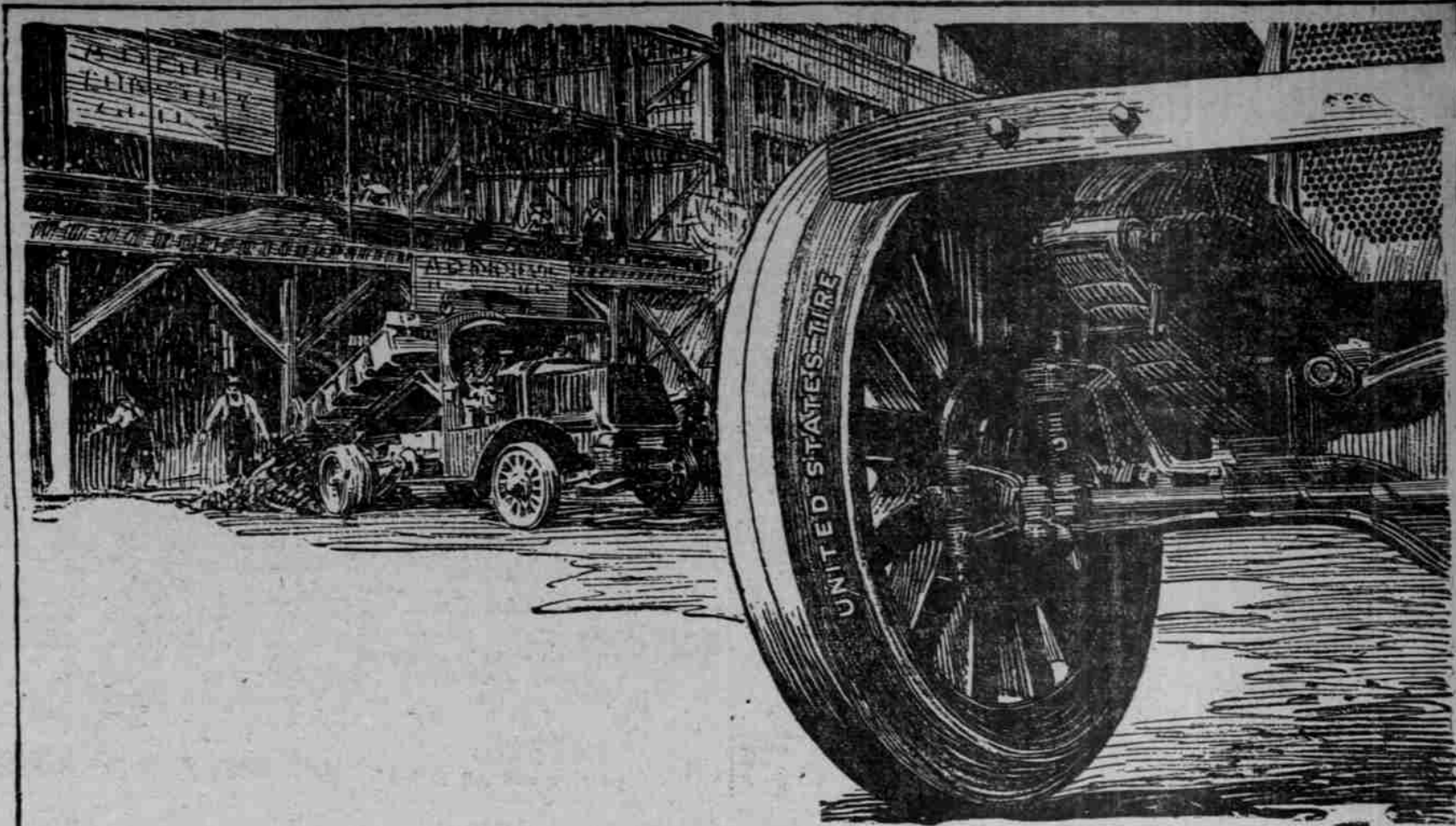
