

AMERICAN SWIMMER BUT INVER DOUBLES

Johnston and Tilden Beat
French Davis Cup Team.

R. NORRIS WILLIAMS WINS

Garland and Molla Bjurstedt Are
Defeated by Australian and
French Woman Player.

WIMBLEDON, June 25.—American tennis players with the exception of those who participated in the doubles, won all their matches in today's play for the British lawn tennis championships.

The American Davis cup player, William M. Johnston of California, who is out of the running for the singles and William T. Tilden of Philadelphia who won yesterday from the British expert, J. C. Parke, combined their skill in the doubles play today and in a brilliant match defeated Andre Gobert and William M. Laurentz of the French Davis cup team. The score was 6-2, 6-0, 4-6, 9-7.

Royalty Attends Matches.
King George, Queen Mary, the duke of York and Princess Mary, again were interested spectators. King Manuel of Portugal and Arthur J. Balfour also were in the stands.

R. Norris Williams of Boston, by defeating the brilliant young French player, J. Brugnon and Charles A. Givaudan of Philadelphia, by his victory over A. S. Drew, the English player, have won their way into the last eight for the singles championships.

In the second round of mixed doubles, Garland, paired with Mrs. Franklin Mallory (Molla Bjurstedt) lost to the Australian, Gerald L. Patterson and Mademoiselle Suzanne Lenglen of France.

Interest High in Doubles.

The greatest interest centered today in the doubles match as it was regarded as an index to the Davis cup to be played off at Eastbourne by the French and American teams.

Johnston and Tilden, who had in the first four games the American pair overwhelmed their opponents with drives of outstanding brilliance. The Gobert came to the front and was chiefly instrumental in taking the next two games for the French pair. The Americans, however, came back, the overseas pair winning the set, 6-2.

Johnston and Tilden showed even better in the second set. There were some rapid exchanges at the net, but either Johnston or Tilden would invariably finish and the set went to them, 6-0.

In the third set, the French pair caused a sensation by rapidly carrying the score in games to 3-0 and ultimately winning the set, 6-4.

Frenchmen Stand Up Well.

The Frenchmen in this period of the match were playing as well as the fiercest hitting. They took the lead in the fourth set, four games to two. Then the Americans came back and Johnston and Tilden killing returns across the court at shoulder height until the games reached four all. In the 15th game, the set stood eight games to seven in favor of the Americans. Johnston and Tilden then won the match by capturing Laurence's service.

There was general agreement among the experts that the French pair, most magnificent spectacle ever seen at Wimbledon. Gobert and Laurentz declared after the match that they had never stood up to such fierce hitting. The verdict of the tennis sharps was that the ordeal was the greatest ever experienced on a tennis court anywhere in the world.

In the third round of the women's singles Miss Bryan of Santa Monica, Cal., beat Mrs. Beulah of England, 9-7, 6-4.

FOOTBALL STAR IS KILLED

"DUTCH" MOLTEN DIES IN FALL OF AIRPLANE.

Former Marine and Montana Athlete With Brother Filers as Machine Suddenly Drops.

SAVANNAH, Ga., June 25.—Three marine corps aviators, Captain Gustav Karov of Savannah and Lieutenants Frederick Moltzen of Butte, Mont., and S. E. St. George of Quantico, Va., were killed today in the fall of an airplane at the Paris island marine corps station. The cause of the accident had not been determined to night.

The plane was about 400 feet in the air when it was observed to be in trouble. An attempt was made to land and when within 100 feet of the ground the engine burst into flames and crashed to the earth.

BUTTE, MONT., June 25.—Fred "Dutch" Moltzen, killed today in a fall in an airplane at Paris island, was a former Montana university all-around athlete star and a member of the Mare Island marine football team of 1917. He will be buried in Butte.

RESOLUTE WINS AGAIN

LESS THAN TWO MINUTES IS VICTORY MARGIN.

20-Mile Cup Trial Results in Spirited Jockeying During Line Start.

NEWPORT, R. I., June 25.—The sloop Resolute added the seventh win to her string of victories in the America's cup defense eliminating series Thursday, defeating the Vanitie by 1 minute 7 seconds, corrected time.

This race, the eleventh of the series, was over a 20-mile course with windward and leeward legs.

The Resolute made a slow getaway after a false start, but when the Vanitie sailed to port and her rival to starboard. The boat to windward was a hard battle, the Resolute gaining a few seconds. On the return the Vanitie gained and led the Resolute by 1 second at the finish, losing the race on the time allowance of 1 minute 8 seconds. On the run to the finish the Vanitie was not used by either boat, as both ran to leeward.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 25.—More than 70 Pacific coast and Hawaiian island swimmers are in the San Francisco bay district tonight for the tryouts for the Olympic team swimming team, which will take place at Neptune beach at Alameda, Cal., tomorrow and Sunday.

The meet will be the best aquatic competition every held in the west, swimming authorities say.

Mermaids and mermen from Portland, Seattle and Los Angeles are here to take part in the trials, as well as others from all over the Pacific coast.

Duke Kahanamoku, famous Hawaiian swimmer, is said to be the most likely contender in the free style events for a place on the American team. Kahanamoku will swim against a field of eight in the 400-meter event tomorrow. Among those opposed to him will be Miti Kono of Seattle, Elmer Egan of San Diego, Warren and Pua Kealahou of Hawaii and Bill Harris of Honolulu.

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\$150,000 PAID FOR NEW TEMPLE SITE

West Park, Tenth, Main, Madison Block Bought.

12 BODIES TO BE HOUSED

Growth of Masonic Association Necessitates Larger Building; New Organization Planned.

The purchase of the block bounded by West Park, Tenth, Main and Madison streets was concluded yesterday by the representatives of the Masonic bodies included in the Masonic Temple association as the site for the new temple.

The north half of the block was the property of Henry L. Elliott and Hamilton S. Corbett and the south half was purchased from the Security Savings & Trust company, acting for Helen Ladd Corbett. The price paid was \$150,000.

The deal was originally negotiated by R. F. Bryan and the members of a committee on the site for the proposed new temple, composed of representatives of the masonic bodies included in the association.

The members of the association are: Al Kader temple, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine; Willamette lodge No. 2, Harmony lodge No. 13, Mount Taber lodge No. 42, Portland lodge No. 53, Oregon lodge No. 101, Hawthorne lodge No. 111, Columbia lodge No. 114, Imperial lodge No. 162, Imperial lodge No. 159, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons; Oregon commandery No. 1, Knights Templar and Portland chapter No. 2, Royal Arch Masons.

These 12 bodies will form a new association to replace the old, formerly known as the Masonic Temple of Portland.

The new association will be known as the Knights of Pythias temple, which was recently sold to that organization and rechristened the Knights of Pythias temple. Growth of the Masonic bodies necessitated acquiring a large site in order to erect a building of sufficient size to provide the requisite lodge rooms and facilities for ceremonies and special features of the order.

Lodge Desires Liquidation.
A secondary reason for disposal of the property was the desire of the Masonic grand lodge to liquidate its holdings in the association. With the sale also of the property owned at the corner of Third and Alder streets, the property interests were converted into cash.

Plans for the formation of the new association are in the hands of a committee representing the bodies. Definite plans for the new building have been made by that organization and it is the intention to improve the site with a structure that will rank with the finest Masonic temples of America and that will be of a type of architecture in keeping with the traditions of the order.

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NEAR RIOT IS QUELLED

Police Beat Off Mob Trying to Rescue Pair.

Alleged Leaders of Demonstration Taken Into Custody and Rest of Crowd Is Dispersed.

A near-riot marked the end of the Rose festival early this morning, when several hundred boys and men attempted to break through the police line and rescue a pair of prisoners who had been arrested by the police and were on the way to jail.

The police beat off the mob and arrested John O'Connor, 21, alleged to be the leader of the crowd. The rest of the crowd dispersed.

The prisoners were F. W. Thompson, 17, arrested in the downtown district on a charge of disorderly conduct, and Buford McKinnon, 29, arrested on a similar charge at Fourth and Oak streets. The police started for headquarters with them, followed by a constantly increasing crowd.

When the procession reached Second and Oak streets, the crowd pressed around the police and the prisoners. Someone shouted an order to take the prisoners away from the police.

Captain Harms rushed from the police station with a squad of reserves. Patrolman Stanton struck one of the crowd in the face with his billy club, breaking the bucket and injuring the face somewhat. Fussy policemen seized the boldest spirits among the crowd and pulled them out. Most of the prisoners asserted that they were mere spectators, and were allowed to go.

Lieutenant Maloney and Inspector Schuplus arrested O'Connor, who they said, was urging the crowd on, and took him to jail.

O'Connor was charged with disorderly conduct.

FACTORY PERMITS ASKED

American Can Company Would Erect \$1,000,000 Building.

The American Can company yesterday made formal application to the city building inspector for a permit to erect a factory at Twenty-sixth, Twenty-seventh and Wilson streets, in Vereteez addition, near the corner of Third and Alder streets, of the new Montgomery Ward building.

The tract comprises about five blocks and the factory building will be three stories, 118x497 feet, and of reinforced concrete. The estimated cost is between \$1,000,000 and \$1,500,000.

The plans for the building were brought to Portland by C. G. Price, chief engineer for the company, who has come from New York to supervise the construction of the building and made the application for the permit.

The building inspector will check the plan before issuing the authority. A street vacation will be asked from the city council to allow the building to exceed the actual property line.
