CLAIMS COMMITTEE TO MEET.—The first meeting of the auditorium claims committee has been scheduled in the city hall next Monday morning at 10 o'clock. The meeting will be held for the purpose of organizing and outlining the work of W. W. Masters, chairman of the committee and W. C. North and Richard Martin are the other members. The committee was appointed for the purpose of reviewing the case presented to the city by bondsmen of the auditorium contractor, who say that mortally the city is indebted to the bondsmen for a sum between \$50,000 and \$75,000.

JUNE VANDERBILT.—The city council yesterday refused to accept the verdict of a jury in the circuit court placing a valuation of \$71,000 on the property of the late Rose City park. The property in question is assessed at \$22,270, and the city offered the owners of the tract \$20,000 which was refused. Contemptions proceedings were instituted in the circuit court with the result of a verdict for valuation of \$37,500. Members of the council announced that in all cases where valuation verdicts were too high they would not be accepted.

POlice TO ESCORT GUESTS.—Visiting members of the Portland Northwest mounted police and the Vancouver, B. C., police band will be taken out over the Columbia river highway today as guests of the Portland police department. Luncheon at Crown Point will be a feature of the little excursion in honor of the policemen from the north. A number of the police automobiles and cars, loaned by friends of the department will be used in taking the men, 44 strong, on the trip.

The parked automobile was struck with such force that it was driven across the sidewalk into the plate-glass window.

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THIRD TERM DESIRE OF WILSON DENIED

Dr. Wise Says President Is Not Seeking Nomination.

PARTISANSHIP IS DECRIED

Close Personal Friend of Executive Says Minds of American People Impoisoned.

Dr. Stephen S. Wise, close personal friend of President Wilson, says that Mr. Wilson has no thought of a third-term nomination. Dr. Wise, formerly of Portland, but now of New York City, who has been one of the leaders of the Zionist cause since its founding, arrived in Portland yesterday and will be here for several days.

"I came upon an invitation to deliver a series of addresses before the colleges and normal schools of California, Oregon, Washington and Idaho," explained Dr. Wise. "I have come, in part, to do whatever I can for the Zionist cause, but my real object in coming is to see Oregon, to be back again on the native heath of our children, whom Mrs. Wise and I have brought with us, that they may see the most beautiful city in the greatest state of the union. It is fine to learn of 15,000 Shriners testifying to the glories that are Oregon's. But Oregon has outgrown the need of testimony."

Senators Declared Discredited.
When asked what he thought of the Chicago convention, Dr. Wise said he did not know there had been a convention of the republican party at Chicago, though he had heard some rumors to that effect.

"What happened at Chicago," said he, "was a half dozen United States senators, for the most part discredited, and altogether unworthy of the place of leadership in the councils of the United States, met together and decided that the time had come to have the overheated delegates cast their votes for Senator Harding. Senator Harding is as good a man as Senators Smoot, Jim Watson and Nelson Aldrich could have been expected to name. He represents them perfectly, with the difference that he is better informed and more honest. He is at Chicago made a gift of the presidency to the democratic party, unless the democratic party will be as courteous and hopelessly reactionary as was the platform framed, as is the candidate named at Chicago. The platform may straddle when read, but a candidate for the presidency cannot straddle from June to November. The political straddle from June to November would be a political torture and an unachievable feat."

Dr. Wise said the democrats in any Alexander Hamilton. McAdoo is no man's heir, and no man's plaything. He is untrammelled and unboomed and unboosable as was Theodore Roosevelt. He is a great executive; he is a financier of the highest gifts. Thanks to McAdoo, America faced no financial problems during the war, and whatever problems may now say he can deal with singular capacity throughout.

Wilson Programme Urged.
"As for the vice-presidency, if McAdoo is named, some mid-westerner or far-westerner should be named, but no man ought to be named for the presidency or vice-presidency who does not accept the Wilson programme of international peace, who is not prepared to stand or fall with the Wilson programme. I believe the president would, under no circumstances, accept a renomination. The president is not thinking of himself; he is thinking little of his party. He is thinking altogether of his country and of the way in which his country can honorably serve the world. If President Wilson had not been undermined and undone by contemptible partisanship in Paris and London during the peace conference and by the Druggists' physicians had been impoisoned against him and his programme by the Lodges and Borahs and the Johnsons, the world today would not only be at peace, but face the reality of abiding world peace."

FAMILY SURVEY PLANNED.
CHURCH WORKERS PREPARE FOR INTENSIVE DRIVE.

Questionnaire to Be Sent Out in District North of Washington Street on West Side.

During the past week workers of the various churches located north of Morrison and Washington streets on the west side have been making a preliminary block survey of that part of the city preparatory to an intensive family survey to be made next week.
A questionnaire has been devised to furnish the information which will be helpful to the various churches interested. From the questionnaire the following information will be obtained: Housing conditions; social conditions; strength of labor organizations; families who have recently moved into the community; members of local churches; members of outside churches; persons with no church connection; non-members who are connected with church activity; young people who are not members; children who do not attend Sunday school.
Besides the survey to find conditions in the community, there is to be an intensive survey of the activities of the various churches to find out what is being done to meet the needs of the community, and to discover the strong and weak points in the church programme.
A pamphlet will be published later giving the findings in tabular form.
