FOREST TOUR BOOK ISSUED.—The forest service has issued a road and recreation map of Oregon, which contains all the trunk highways, other automobile roads, secondary roads and proposed roads throughout the state. It also contains suggestions for use of public camp grounds, fire-prevention rules and descriptive information regarding the national forest as a whole, national forest roads, Siu-law resorts, Eagle creek camp ground and Columbia Grove park, Lehman and Hideaway springs, Anthony lake region, Magoon lake, Benson park, Lost lake, Rhododendron resorts, Crane prairie, Newberry crater, Odell, Crescent and Davis lakes, Crater Lake National park, Metolius river, Union creek, Recreation creek, Lake of the Woods, Dead Indian soda springs, Mackenzie bridge, Oregon caves, Upper Willamette, Clatsop springs and Wallawa lake region.

AUTO HANDS ON EDGE OF CLIFF.—After they had overturned their automobile on the edge of a 100-foot cliff to the bottom of which they narrowly escaped being thrown, Edward Kauffman, truck driver, and Andrew Heckman, chauffeur, of Hillsboro, Or., were arrested on the Germantown road early yesterday morning on charges of drunkenness by Motorcycle Patrolmen Wiles and Clays. The two men were released on their own recognizance and will have a hearing in the municipal court today. The policemen reported they found no liquor about the machine, which was hanging on the edge of the cliff.

LABORER HELD FOR SIX BURGLARIES.—W. S. Reese, laborer, who was arrested Saturday for burglary at First and Madison streets, has been implicated in no less than six burglaries committed during the Shrine convention as the result of goods found in his possession which have been identified. LOGGERS TO HAVE TRIAL FOR BATTERY.—Jack Manuel, logger, will have a hearing in the municipal court today following his arrest Saturday, charged with having assaulted and robbed Seymour Simons at 224 North Third street. A Nelson, laborer, who is said to have been implicated with Manuel in the assault and robbery, was sent to jail for 90 days by Municipal Judge Rossman Saturday. The two are said to have entered the room of Simons while he was still asleep and attacked him and took \$10 and a watch. Roomers in adjoining rooms called the police.

EAGLES' BAND RETURNS TO SEATTLE.—Fifty members of the Eagles' lodge band from aerle No. 1, Seattle, entertained a large crowd in the downtown park blocks Saturday with a concert. The musicians came down to attend the Washington state convention of the lodge, which closed Wednesday night. The officers were entertained in Portland by local lodge men. They returned yesterday to Seattle.

ROTARIANS TO HEAR REPORTS.—Reports of the convention of International Rotary will be heard from the members of the committee at the regular weekly luncheon meeting of the Rotary club at the Benson hotel at noon tomorrow. Beginning with this meeting records of attendance will be kept and a movement started to place the club in the forefront of the organization in activities. Visitors will include delegates from other clubs en route home from the convention.

RED CROSS IN PLATT BUILDING.—The American Red Cross headquarters has been moved from the Worcester building to room 321 Platt building, where the members in charge will continue in the work of helping service men who have unsettled claims against the government, such as disability and invalid claims. Delinquencies of government insurance and eligibility for vocational education will also be handled by the office.

INJURED MAN RECOVERING.—R. G. Drake, one-legged elevator operator in the Title Trust building, who received a fracture of the right arm and a compound fracture of the right leg, as the result of being caught between the elevator and the shaft in that building Saturday afternoon, was reported to be resting well at St. Vincent's hospital last night. It was announced that it will not be necessary to amputate his injured leg.

MAN HELD UP IN HOTEL.—E. E. Birmingham, an employee of the Twentieth Century grocery, reported to the police early yesterday morning that he had been held up and robbed of \$40 at his room in the Rowland hotel, Fifth and Salmon streets, by two men. Following the holdup he said that the men bound and gagged him. After he had managed to get loose from his bonds, he notified the police. Inspectors Leonard and Hellyer were put on the case and were making an effort yesterday to apprehend the robbers. One of the two hold-up men was masked and carried a revolver, Birmingham said. OREGON LUMBERMEN CONFER ON CAR JAM

Distribution of Carriers to Be Solved at Meeting.

ROAD JOINS IN PARLEY

Plan of Willamette Valley Association Results in Unsatisfactory Conditions.

Ways and means of providing fair distribution of cars to the lumber mills of western Oregon will be the topic under discussion at the conference between the officials of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association and the Southern Pacific company to be held at the office of the public service commission in the court house Tuesday afternoon.

The conference is an outgrowth of the unsatisfactory car situation which resulted from a plan undertaken by the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association whereby the association agreed to superintend the distribution of cars, allowing each mill a quota according to capacity output.

Mills Increase Demands.—Under this plan mills operating two shifts requested a double portion and when this was granted other mills immediately put on extra shifts and asked for more cars. This resulted in an unsatisfactory situation for both the railroad officials and the mill operators alike, according to Secretary Rasch of the public service commission.

Several months lumber mills in the Willamette valley have been receiving only 50 per cent of the normal car supply. A solution to the problem will be sought at Tuesday's meeting, which is scheduled to open at 1:30 P. M. George B. Winter, chairman of the interstate commerce commission terminal committee, will be present.

The report of 115 mills for the week ending June 19 shows a total production within 77 per cent of normal for the season. The output for the 115 mills for the week was 84,320,423 feet. New business accepted totaled 16,028,187 feet.

Auto Cars Held Up.—Total shipments for the week were 65,210,092 feet in export cargo. Unshipped transcontinental orders still on the books at the mills at the end of the week totaled 6484 cars.

West coast mills are still handicapped by the car shortage and their yards are congested with stocks. Many of the mills are finding it difficult to continue operations at capacity and are limiting their output to the amount of shipment handled.

About 7500 men have been laid off at the logging camps and several hundred are affected by the closing of lumber mills. The customary summer recess from lumber operations in the northwest will begin July 13. The period of idleness will probably be extended this year until the car supply will bring transcontinental shipments back to normal.
