WASHINGTON, June 30 .- Business s passing through a period of readustment and in many instances of depression, the federal reserve board declared tonight in its June review o general business and financial conditions of the country.

"There is, however, every indication ULU hat this transition period will not last long-indeed, that the turn toward new conditions has already een taken," declared the board's who, taking the country as a whole, found considerable variation in busiess conditions
