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INSPECTORS ARREST SECOND-HAND DEALER

Rosenkrant Charged With Receiving Stolen Property.

POLICE GET SILVERWARE Harrow, Special Policeman During Shrine Week, Is Given 90 Days in Jail.

As the climax to the investigation of the operations of an alleged gang of burglars operating in Portland during the shrine convention and the Rose Festival, H. Rosenkrant, second-hand dealer at 185 Front street, was arrested yesterday afternoon by inspectors Russell, Van Dusen, Wright and Gordon on a charge of receiving stolen property.

The inspectors reported the recovery of 25 pieces of silverware stolen from Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Hilton, Marine apartments, East Seventh and Taylor streets, on the night of June 21. The inspectors reported that Rosenkrant failed to make a record of the purchase of the silverware, for which he paid \$12, and that he took it home afterward.

Rosenkrant was arrested yesterday after Jack Andrews, alias James E. Main, one of the three arrested for the robbery of the Hilton apartment, had told the inspectors that he sold the silverware at that place.

Special Policeman Sentenced.—Main was given six months in jail yesterday by Municipal Judge Rowman on a charge of larceny from a building.

Clyde E. Harrow, special policeman during Shrine week, another member of the gang, was given 90 days in jail by Judge Rosenkrant. Harrow, according to the inspectors, admitted standing guard outside while his two companions robbed the Hilton apartment.

James E. Lutwig, said to be the third member of the gang, will have a hearing in the municipal court, on a charge of larceny from a building today.

At the time of the arrest of the trio by inspectors Gordon and Wright, a large quantity of jewelry and other goods was found in their possession. The inspectors believe this was taken in other robberies about the city, although as yet none of it has been identified.

The inspectors were unable to learn definitely yesterday if Rosenkrant had purchased other goods from the gang of burglars. They announced, however, that a thorough investigation would be made.

John May, laborer, 24 years of age, who was arrested late Tuesday night by inspectors Mallett and Price at East Thirteenth street and Linn avenue, has been identified as a man seen prowling around in the home of Elsie W. Schaller, 497 Sherrett avenue, according to Miss Schaller.

Burglars entered the room of H. J. Johnson, American hotel, and took a suit of clothes and a watch. The room of Sam Dahl in the same hotel was also entered and a suit, land, bag and watch and chain taken.

The theft of a check protector and a draughting outfit from the establish ment of the Columbia Wire & Iron Works, East Eighth and Market streets, was reported yesterday. This is said to be the second time this establishment has been entered within the past few days.

Some money and keys were taken previously from Mrs. Ida Streeter of the Larrabee hotel reported the theft of 33 tools.

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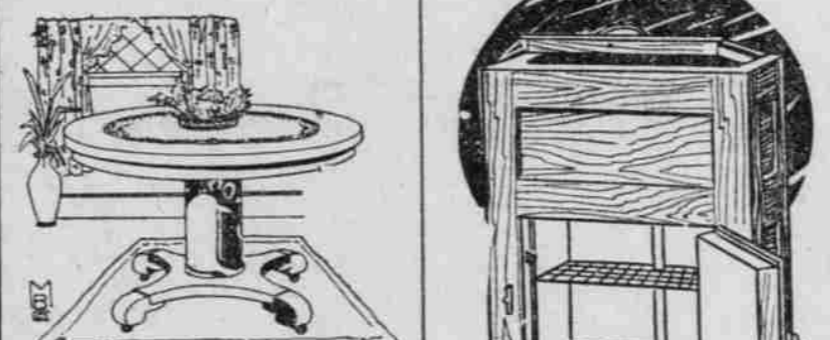
