Accomplice Believed to Have Told His Part in Killing but Officials Refuse to Talk.

An extended confession concerning the night of the murder of Harry Dubinsky, Portland chauffeur, was made by George Moore, who is being held in county jail with Russell Brake, charged with complicity in the slaying, before Dean Butler, deputy district attorney of Clackamas county, Sheriff Wilson of Clackamas county, Earl F. Bernard, deputy district attorney of Multnomah county, and Police Inspectors Hellyer and Leonard yesterday in the office of District Attorney Evans.

Relatives here are making an effort to learn definitely whether the Portland boy was aboard the vessel when it foundered, but so far have been unsuccessful.
