

INTEREST RUNS HIGH OVER MURDER TRIAL

New Sidelights Develop on
Slaying of Dubinsky.

CONFESSION AIDS BRAKE

Moore's Attempt to Shoulder Blame
Prepares Defense, But Police
Have Secret Information.

Although the trial will be held in Clackamas county because the crime was committed near Oregon City, local interest runs high in the prosecution of George Moore and Russell Brake, youths accused of the murder of Harry Dubinsky, Portland driver of a for hire car, about four weeks ago. Whether or not there will be an early hearing depends in part on the return of Gilbert Hedges, district attorney of Clackamas county, from an eastern trip.

Developments of the last two weeks have thrown some new light on the case and have helped Brake prepare a defense, although they have not changed, in any vital particular, the theory of the prosecution.

Moore admitted soon after his arrest to participation in the murder, described the spot where Dubinsky was thrown from the Oregon City bridge, and placed all blame for the actual killing on the shoulders of Brake, who maintained absolute silence. Later, in a second confession, Moore attempted to shoulder all responsibility for the crime, saying that he killed Dubinsky without aid from Brake and that Brake was in Portland the time of the slaying, so far as he knew.

Moore Believed Influenced.

While Tom Garland, attorney for Brake, placed much confidence in this confession, which he has not been permitted to see, believing that it will assist materially in clearing his client, investigators in the office of District Attorney Evans and District Attorney Hedges attribute the second story to the influence on Moore of the hardened criminals in the jail corridor where he was placed. These men, believe the authorities, forced Moore to a realization that as long as his confession to participation in the murder meant a life sentence for him, it was up to him to clear his pal of the crime if possible.

Brake has admitted to his attorney that he took a girl friend riding in the murder car, stained with blood though it was, after the murder, with the knowledge that a man had been slain in it not 24 hours before.

Culpability Is Admitted.

"There is no doubt but that Brake should have told the police of the crime when Moore confessed to him what he had done," commented Garland yesterday, "and the fact that he did not undoubtedly makes him an accessory after the crime though he was not guilty of participating in the actual murder."

If Brake's story is true, that he did not know of the crime until told about it by Moore, would it have been likely that he would have borrowed the automobile and taken his sweet-heart for a ride in the blood-stained machine? was the pointed inquiry of Earl E. Bernard, deputy district attorney of Multnomah county who received the second Moore confession, yesterday.

Other Information Secret.

"While you or I might not have told the police about a murder to which a pal had confessed," he continued, "we certainly would not have taken the blood-stained car and asked a girl to go riding with us." There is other evidence in the hands of investigators by which they believe both boys can be convicted of killing Dubinsky, say the officers, remarking that they are not at liberty to disclose it until the time of the trial.

HOUSE COMMITTEE DUE

The committee, composed of 20 congressmen and of which James W. Good is chairman, is making a tour of Pacific coast reclamation projects and national parks.

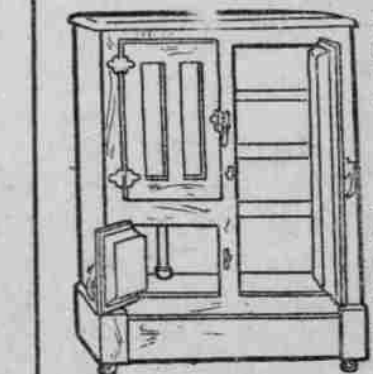

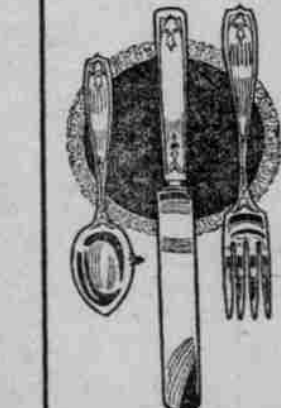
