

GERMAN AND ALLIED SPA SESSIONS OPEN

Teuton Chancellor Keeps Premiers Waiting.

ADJOURNMENT IS TAKEN

Absence of Central Power Officials Causes Delay in Discussion of Disarmament.

SPA, Belgium, July 5.—Allied and German delegates to the conference to be held here this week met this morning for their first session which lasted only 30 minutes. Adjournment was then taken until 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Konstantin Fehrenbach, German chancellor and head of that country's delegation, kept the allied premiers waiting for ten minutes, being late reaching Villa Fraineuse. Premier Millerand of France, was first to arrive. Count Sforza, Italian organization minister, was next, being followed by Viscount Chinda, Japanese ambassador to Great Britain. Premier Lloyd George was the last of the allied representatives to reach the villa. He wore a shining silk hat, but Premier Millerand appeared wearing the democratic felt hat familiar to those who know him.

Eyes Are On German. When Herr Fehrenbach's car rode up the winding hill road to the villa, all the allied delegates were assembled, three from each delegation, and an army of photographers awaited. When the German chancellor alighted from the car he consented to be photographed and then entered the villa with alert steps. He was followed by two of his colleagues, after which the session was declared open. The German chancellor declared he had come to the conference with the intention of executing the treaty of Versailles. He said that the German premier who presided, then referred to the notes regarding disarmament presented by the allies. He then asked what reply the Germans had to make.

Session Is Suspended. Herr Fehrenbach said that the war minister and Major-General von Seeckt, chief of the German general staff, who were expected to attend the conference, had not yet arrived. He suggested that in their absence Dr. Walter Simons, the foreign minister, be permitted to make some observations on the subject. Premiers Millerand, Lloyd George and Delacroix retired for a private conference. In the meantime, after which Mr. Lloyd George said the allies saw no object in discussing disarmament with anyone excepting those who were responsible. He proposed that the conference adjourn until these two delegates should arrive and it was decided to suspend the session until 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

SCHOOLS MAY CONTINUE

Three Districts at Present Time Have 90 Pupils.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., July 4.—(Special.)—Miller Hill, Summers and Midland school districts, with a combined enrollment of 90 pupils, are considering a proposal to consolidate the districts, and build a central school building large enough to accommodate the elementary grades and two classes in high school work. The question will be decided at a special election to be held, probably next spring.

J. B. Sears, head of the department of education of Stanford University, Palo Alto, Cal., energetically advocated the consolidation plan at a meeting of the residents of the three districts, in the first address of the campaign. Dr. Sears declared that there have been fewer improvements in educational lines in the last 50 years than in almost anything else that affects rural life.
