

## ROOSEVELT'S HONOR ELATES HOME TOWN

News of Vice-Presidential  
Choice Quietly Received.

### CAREER STARTS IN 1910

Senatorial Toga Won From New  
York and Doffed to Join  
Secretary of Navy.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., July 6.—The little village of Hyde Park, birthplace and summer residence of Franklin D. Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy and democratic candidate for the vice-presidency, received quietly, but with elation this evening the news that its favorite political son had been named as running mate to Governor James M. Cox.

The Associated Press carried the first news of his nomination to Mr. Roosevelt's residence. Mrs. James Roosevelt, his mother, said she had heard nothing from her son, but expected that he would return to Washington before coming to the family home in Hyde Park, in order to clean up the business which has accumulated at his desk in the navy department.

**Farmer Vote Correlated.**  
Mr. Roosevelt's first spring into political prominence in 1910 when he was drafted by the democrats of the 28th New York state senatorial district, in an effort to defeat Senator Schlosser of Beacon, who was a candidate for re-election. Roosevelt was successful, rolling up a majority of 356 in the democratic landslide which carried John A. Dix into the governor's chair. One of the stories still told of Mr. Roosevelt's first campaign by local politicians is that he carried the farmer vote by the use of a platform which advocated uniform apple barrels.

Mr. Roosevelt was re-elected in 1912, but resigned his seat on March 17, 1913, to accept the appointment of assistant secretary of the navy. His most famous exploit in the state senate was his leadership of the insurgents who opposed the election of William F. Sheehan to the United States senate.

After three months' deadlock, James A. O'Gorman was elected with Mr. Roosevelt's concurrence.

**Hyde Park Birthplace.**  
Mr. Roosevelt was born in Hyde Park, January 30, 1882, the son of James and Sara Delano Roosevelt. He is a distant relative of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt on his father's side and of the Astor family through his mother.

Mr. Roosevelt married Anna Eleanor Roosevelt, niece of the late Colonel Theodore Roosevelt and daughter of Eliot Roosevelt, March 17, 1905. They have five children.

Since Mr. Roosevelt's appointment to the navy department he has spent most of his time in Washington, returning during the summer months and on holiday trips to visit his mother. He has never relinquished his deep interest in Hyde Park, however, and is still one of its foremost citizens and one of the leading personalities of St. James' Episcopal church, which the Roosevelt family has attended for years. He is a frequent visitor in Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and active in county democratic councils.

He was graduated from Harvard in 1904 and the Columbia law school in 1907, being admitted to the New York bar in the same year.

Unlike Governor Cox, the presidential nominee, Franklin Delano Roosevelt has not been considered friendly to Tammany hall. Many politicians regard his selection for vice-president as an attempt to placate the democrats who are inclined to look askance at Cox because of the fact that the Tammany chiefs regarded the Ohio executive with favor.

In 1910, Roosevelt then 28, was a state senator from Dutchess county. He was admitted to the New York bar in 1907, practiced with Carter, Ledyard & Milburn in New York for three years and then went to the firm of Marvin, Hooker & Roosevelt in 1910 at the time of his election to the state senate.

**Naval Problems Studied.**  
Roosevelt had long been known as a student of naval history and a believer in the further maintenance of a strong and efficient American navy. He became an even closer student of naval affairs and delivered many addresses on the work of the United States navy during the war. He described anti-U boat activities of the American navy and went into details of the construction of submarines and seaplanes.

He is a Harvard man in the class of 1904 and a graduate of the Columbia university law school in 1907. He has been a member of many organizations, including the Hudson-Fulton celebration commission in 1909, and the national commission of the Panama-Pacific exposition in 1915. He is a trustee of the Laura Franklin free hospital for children and a member of the naval history society, the New York history society, the Holland society and Alpha Delta Phi. He is a member of the following clubs: Harvard, Knickerbocker, Racquet & Tennis of New York, Metropolitan and University (Washington).

### OFFICIALS TO GO NORTH

Secretaries Daniels and Payne Plan  
Alaskan Trip.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—Secretary Daniels of the navy, Secretary Payne of the interior department and Governor Riggs of Alaska will leave Seattle next Friday or Saturday on a destroyer to investigate coal and possibly oil lands in Alaska. Mr. Daniels is to leave here tomorrow on the battleship New Mexico and will be joined at Seattle by Secretary Payne and Alaska's governor.

"We have an appropriation of \$1,000,000 for development of the Matanuska coal fields for naval purposes," said Secretary Daniels, "and we also believe it possible that productive oil fields may be developed. The oil, however, is only a possibility, but we will look into it."

### EFFORT TO ROB CHARGED

Attempted Burglary Laid to Alleged Room Prowlers.

E. A. Appleman, 29, who was arrested Monday night after he was said to have attempted to ransack a room in the Huxford hotel yesterday was charged with attempted burglary.

## SELECTION OF ROOSEVELT SWALLOWED BY TAMMANY

Band Wagon Movement Gets Under Way Soon After Start of Last  
Day of Convention.

AUDITORIUM, San Francisco, July 6.—The vice-presidential nomination started in the direction of Franklin D. Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy, at today's session of the democratic national convention and Mr. Roosevelt's friendly considered his nomination as assured. Despite his political troubles with the Tammany organization, it finally developed that his nomination would draw no open opposition from that quarter.

Amid cheers, Governor Smith of New York seconded the nomination of Mr. Roosevelt.

Jowa passed when called and that seemed to assure that Secretary Meredith would not get an offer of the place.

**Idaho Ex-Governor Offered.**  
Senator Nugent of Idaho nominated ex-Governor James H. Hawley of Boise, Idaho, for the vice-presidency.

One of the plans of the friends of Franklin D. Roosevelt was to have Governor Smith of New York make a seconding speech for him.

Ex-Governor Dunne of Illinois took the platform, with the convention understanding that he was nominating James Hamilton Lewis of Chicago.

It turned out that he really withdrew Mr. Lewis' name. The governor said Mr. Lewis withdrew "with characteristic modesty."

E. P. Rosenberger of Montgomery, Mo., withdrew the name of David R. Francis, American ex-ambassador to Russia, from the list of vice-presidential nominations.

General Tyson of Tennessee personally made the platform and withdrew his name.

**W. T. Vaughn Is Offered.**  
When North Dakota was called, he seconded the nomination of Mr. Roosevelt.

Oklahoma was called and yielded to Washington.

Mrs. Elizabeth D. Christian of the Washington delegation seconded Mr. Roosevelt's nomination.

Mrs. Resnie Richards of Linnton, Ore., made a nominating speech for W. T. Vaughn of that state.

Texas seconded the nomination of Mr. Roosevelt also.

Vermont did likewise when the state was called.

Joseph E. Davies of Wisconsin, mentioned as one of the vice-presidential candidates, took the platform and withdrew his name. Mr. Davies seconded the nomination of Mr. Roosevelt.

**Governor Stewart Withdraws.**  
Governor Stewart took the platform to withdraw and seconded the nomination of Secretary Roosevelt.

The candidacy of E. L. Doheny also was withdrawn.

The band wagon movement for Mr. Roosevelt got under way very quickly soon after the convention assembled, and there was no doubt of Mr. Roosevelt's selection from the first.

The gossip about convention hall was that the Tammany organization with whom Mr. Roosevelt has not always been on good terms was disinclined to accept him at first, but in language of the politicians who were working for Roosevelt, "Tammany decided to swallow him."

Governor Smith of New York finally took the platform and told the convention he had been instructed by his delegation to second Mr. Roosevelt's nomination.

Some of the political managers recalled that today was the second time that political leaders of the state of New York had against their will accepted a man named Roosevelt on the national ticket. The late Thomas C. Platt was reluctant to accept Theodore Roosevelt for the vice-presidential place in 1904 and the Tammany organization was reported no more favorably inclined to accept Franklin D. Roosevelt today.

**Move Reaches Full Force.**  
After Governor Smith had seconded Mr. Roosevelt's nomination, the band wagon movement got into full force and one after another candidates who had been placed in nomination or those who had spoken for them took the platform and withdrew their names.

It was exactly 3:15 o'clock when the convention with loud cheers nominated Mr. Roosevelt with a loud shout and the first party cry, "Cox and Roosevelt," rang out.

Senator Robinson, permanent chairman of the convention, was appointed chairman of the committee to notify Governor Cox of his nomination and National Chairman Cummings, chairman of the committee, to notify Mr. Roosevelt.

At 3:30 o'clock Chairman Cummings stepped forward and was greeted with loud cheers.

## COX' BOYHOOD DAYS SPENT ON OLD FARM

Career of Democratic Nominee Inspiring One.

### RISE TO POWER RAPID

Political Career Begun With Purchase of Newspaper and Now  
He Is Owner of Two.

JAMES MIDDLETON COX, who was nominated for the presidency by the democratic convention at San Francisco yesterday, was three times governor of Ohio—an honor enjoyed by only one other Ohioan, Rutherford B. Hayes. He was born on a farm, educated in the public schools, a printer's devil, a school teacher, a newspaper reporter, a private secretary to a representative in congress, owner, manager and proprietor of two newspapers, member of congress for three years and three times governor of his state. Such is his record to date.

His boyhood days were spent on the farm and his early education acquired in the public schools near his home. After completing his high school course he had no opportunity to attend a college or university, but he took some work at a night school and taught in a public school for a time.

His ambition to enter the newspaper world soon led him to give up his teaching career, and he went to work for a printer, who was the proprietor of a small country weekly. Then he moved to Cincinnati, and after a long and unsuccessful hunt for a position finally became a reporter on the Cincinnati Enquirer. From then until 1893 he worked on the Enquirer in various capacities and finally as editor.

### Success Follows Venture.

In 1895 he bought the Dayton Daily News. From that time on his success in the newspaper field was rapid and spectacular. As proprietor of the News he was constantly at odds with corporations reported to be striving to force through programs prejudicial to the public welfare.

At one time a certain railroad corporation sued the News for \$425,000, alleging criminal libel, assuming that Cox, as the owner of the News, would be unable to give bonds for twice the amount of the suit, as required by the state criminal law then in force.

But Cox, with only a few hours of grace left, proved as resourceful in the field of business as in politics. Before the time was up when the bond was required or the News put out of the running, he mustered up the necessary sum through the help of his friends to put the News on the streets as usual.

In 1903 he expanded still farther in the newspaper field by purchasing the Springfield Press-Republican, and by forming the News League of Ohio. Thereafter his status as a journalist was assured.

### Political Career Begins.

His real political career commenced in 1899, when he was nominated as representative in congress from the third Ohio district and elected after a hard-fought campaign, serving the 51st and 52d congresses. In 1912 he was nominated as governor of Ohio on the democratic ticket and was elected by the record plurality of 165,823 votes. He was defeated for re-election. But his party really withdrew him in 1916 and he was re-elected in 1918, being the only democrat to win in Ohio.

Legislation for which Governor Cox is best known includes a workmen's compensation law and a child labor law. The Ohio school code also was enacted under Cox's direction.

With the influence of his own and affiliated papers behind him, Cox was able to rule the solons at Columbus with an iron hand and his power was felt at Washington through the democratic representatives sent to congress.

**Governor Twice Married.**  
Early in life Governor Cox was married but was divorced. He had three children by this union. One daughter, Mrs. Dan J. Mahoney, was in the press stand at the convention when her father finally was nominated. She is reported to have said when the nominations were over: "If women get the vote before election and dad is elected he will be the first woman suffrage president of the United States. We'll be proud of that in our family for many generations to come."

In 1917 Governor Cox married Margaret Blair of Chicago and they have one child. He recently purchased the farm near Jacksonburg where he was born and is making it into a modern farmhouse, where he expects to live on retirement from public office.

**COX' FATHER HAPPY MAN**  
"Jim Will Make Great President,"  
Predicts Nominee's Parent.
