18 BOLSHEVIK CAVALRY REGI-MENTS BROKEN UP.

Poles Defeated on Long Line Greeks Sweep Turks From Large Area.

LONDON, July 6.—The British war office today gave out a message say-ing that the cayalry of General Wrangel, anti-bolshevik commander in southern Russia, had encircled a bol-shevik cavalry corps consisting of 18 regiments.

The message declares only 150 of the bolsheviki escaped, 1000 prisoners being taken and the battlefield left covered with dead. In addition 40 guns were captured.
