Portland Golfer Defeats California Champion.

WILHELM, WILLING STAY

Oregon Players Furnish Surprise of Northwest Tourney and Have Good Chance.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 7.—(Special.)—In the history of northwest golf no champion ever has repeated and tradition ran true to form today. Claire Griswold, winner of the Pacific northwest championship last year at Spokane, bowed before the superior skill of Dr. Paul Hunter of Annandale, Los Angeles, this afternoon and lost in the second round.

Champions Defeated.

Two other champions to bow to defeat were George Vonelm, champion of Washington, and William Wilhelm, Oregon state title-holder, eliminated Vonelm in the afternoon, 1 up with a par-star. Seattle, eliminated Dixie Flegler in the forenoon, 3 up and 2, but was put out after lunch by Dr. O. F. Willing of Portland, 1 up. Willing lost the first three holes of his match, but was square at the turn and won 2 to 1.

Portland Shows Well.

Portland golfers did themselves proud in the men's first and second round matches today. Of the eight stars who remain in the running for the men's championship out of approximately 27 entries, five do their voting in Oregon. The eight still left in the semi-finals are Dr. Paul Hunter, Los Angeles; Millard Rosenblatt, Tualatin club, Portland; Rudolph Wilhelm, Portland; Forest Watson, Waverley, Portland; Robert Bone, Vancouver; Carl Spier, Jefferson Park, Seattle; and Dr. O. 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New Athletic Director Is Portland Visitor.

FALL PLANS ARE MADE

Rathbun of Indiana to Arrive in Corvallis and Assume Staff Position.

E. B. Rutherford, director of men's physical education and intercollegiate athletics, and James J. Richardson, general manager of student activities at Oregon Agricultural college, were Portland visitors yesterday, purchasing additional football equipment for the coming gridiron season of the Oregon Aggies.

Rutherford was Nebraska's star halfback during the 1913-1914-1915 seasons. He was mentioned in the all-American team in 1914 and 1915. Rutherford is also a former light in Missouri Valley basketball circles.

Rutherford expressed himself as quite pleased with his berth at the Corvallis institution, but was loath to give out any dope on the prospects for the coming season.

While in Portland yesterday Rutherford announced the addition to the Aggie staff of G. L. Rathbun, assistant to "Jumbo" Stiench, at the University of Indiana, Seattle, who has developed some of the best athletes in the middle west. Rathbun is expected to arrive in Corvallis about August 1.

Aggies Prepare for Athletics.

The contractor are making rapid progress with the new swimming pool, which will be one of the largest in the Pacific coast, according to Rutherford. The work of excavation is well under way. The tank will be 50 by 100 and have accommodations for a large gallery.

Plans are being formulated for a new stadium to be built at Corvallis. A stand with a seating capacity of 5000 is Rutherford's ambition. A new running track with a 200-straightaway is also being worked out.

Football practice at Corvallis will start September 15. The Aggies lost to Reed and Walker by graduation, "Cack" Hubbard, all-Pacific coast end, is not eligible. The team will be coached by R. H. Egan, who is on his way to Boston to compete in the finals for the Olympic club and to coach the Olympic team. Swan was elected captain of the 1921 track team. A large number of southern California high school track stars will enter O. A. C. next fall, according to Mike Butler, track coach at Corvallis. Butler will have many stars in this year's freshmen aggregation, all of whom will return this fall.
