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LUMBERMAN CHARGED WITH RECKLESS DRIVING.—After the automobile which he was driving had struck a telephone pole, ran down the sidewalk a short distance and tore up a rose garden belonging to C. E. Noulton, 348 Lovejoy street, C. H. Wheeler Jr. was arrested early yesterday morning by Patrolmen Wiles, Mathews and Wright and charged with reckless driving. The policeman reported that Wheeler was under the influence of liquor at the time of the accident. They reported that he had attempted to turn off the Cornell road into Lovejoy street and apparently lost control of his machine. Wheeler gave his occupation as lumberman and his age as 22. His case will come up for a hearing in the municipal court today.
