RUSSIANS MUST YIELD

ALLIED PREMIERS AGREE TO STAND BY TERMS. Peace With Poland Must Be Considered at Proposed International Convention.

BOULOGNE, July 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—Premiers Lloyd George and Millerand determined at their conference here today to stand by the original plan for a peace conference with the Russian soviet.

Mr. Lloyd George accepted in the main M. Millerand's views and it was decided that Great Britain should reply to the soviet demand for an international conference that it could not take place unless the bolsheviks renounced their demand for a conference with Poland and would agree to discuss the peace with Poland and that all qualified representatives of Russia and the border states should attend.

TOUCHING TRIBUTE PAID

Plea Against Lynch Law in Case Slayers Are Caught Startles Sheriff's Friends.

WHIPPED CAUSES ARREST

WITNESSES TELL OF SEEING VETERINARIAN BRANDED, Justice to Hold Public Hearing to Determine if Dairyman is to Be Prosecuted.

YANCOOVER, Wash., July 27.—(Special.)—Alvin Stegerwald, dairyman and member of the city council of Washington, and Homer Maulding, employed by Mr. Stegerwald, were arrested by Sheriff Johnson of Clarke county late today, charged with assault and battery on Dr. Walter Groth.

Mr. Stegerwald furnished \$500 bond for himself and Mr. Maulding following a preliminary hearing before Justice J. P. Thomas at Washougal. The case was continued until next Tuesday.

Washougal is divided over the arrest of the men, and a public hearing will be held by Justice Thomas to determine whether the dairyman and his employee should be prosecuted.

The arrests were made after a committee, which had been appointed to investigate the alleged attack reported in its findings.

Persons who were heard by the committee testified that they witnessed through the cracks in the Stegerwald barn the branding of Dr. Groth with a figure-eight iron.

Dr. Groth, it is said, accompanied Mrs. Stegerwald to her home recently after she had been visiting at the home of the physician. When Mr. Stegerwald and the doctor were in the meeting his wife told him that the doctor had attempted an attack upon her and that she had struck him with a vase.

Mr. Stegerwald loaded a shotgun, it was testified, and went to the barn to shoot the doctor. He was persuaded from shooting the alleged assailant by a nurse and the veterinarian's wife. He refrained, it is alleged, when the doctor promised that he would meet Mr. Stegerwald the next morning in the Stegerwald barn.

Dr. and Mrs. Groth have disappeared and various parties are endeavoring to locate them.

SPEEDERS GRAB GRIEF

Clackamas Officer Starts Campaign on Roads. OREGON CITY, Or., July 27.—(Special.)—County Speed Officer Long stated today that after August 1 he would start a crusade against traffic violators in regard to drivers' licenses and proper lighting.

Carnot Soener, Route 6, Oregon City, was arrested by Long for driving 45 miles per hour and fined \$25 by Justice of the Peace Stipp when he entered a plea of guilty.

The following were arrested by Long, arraigned before Justice of the Peace Parry of Milwaukie and each fined \$5 for driving 35 miles per hour: Salem state, E. Barrett, Roy Otty and Chester Adven, all of Portland, W. H. Smith of Oregon City was fined \$5 at Milwaukie for passing a streetcar at that city white taking on passengers.

A. J. Schie of Salem was arrested for speeding at 40 miles per hour and fined \$20 by Justice Stipp.

Fred Wright of Hubbard was arraigned in Justice Stipp's court Tuesday and fined \$10 for reckless driving and found not guilty.

FISHERMEN ARE ARRESTED

Pines Assessed in Justice's Court Following Guilty Plea. ASTORIA, Or., July 27.—(Special.)—Sunday afternoon the operators of 10 purse seine craft were arrested by Deputy Warden Larson of Oregon and District Attorney George C. Washington, for fishing in the Willapa harbor district, which extends from the mouth of Grays Harbor, without a license.

When arrested the craft were fishing in the ocean about half a mile off the Washington coast. They had licenses issued by the state of Washington permitting them to fish in Puget sound and Columbia river districts, but none for the Willapa harbor district.

Members of the launches Delaware, Fairplay, St. Mark and Argina were arraigned in the justice court at Ilwaco yesterday afternoon. They pleaded guilty and the master of each craft was fined \$55 and \$4.75 costs.

It was also reported by one of the posemen that discarded trousers, jumpers and a flashlight which had been found by Sheriff Warnick's bloodhounds, had been positively identified as the clothing which the Indians, Owens and Hart, had worn when they made their escape from jail.

At that time the posse and hounds were reported to be less than a mile behind the fleeing men.

A news of what appeared to be the impending capture of the leaders of the posse during the hours preceding their places of business out of respect to the memory of the slain sheriff during the hours preceding and following his funeral, donned old clothing, took down their rifles and hurried to the homes ready to go out on what many believed would be the final chase for the two Indians.

Nothing heard for two hours. Then for more than two hours nothing was heard from the Squaw creek or Meacham districts and because of the absence of any word, the excitement became intensified.

Shortly after 5 o'clock definite word was received from one of the older heads among the posemen that the clothing and flashlight belonged to two of the posemen who had been stationed in that district. Simultaneously it was learned that the hounds had not been seen on the Squaw

SMUGGLING NET SPREAD

\$40,000 DIAMOND PILOT CAUSES NUMBER OF ARRESTS.

Russian Soviet Clerk and Mysterious Woman Taken by Federal Operatives.

NEW YORK, July 27.—(Special.)—Anna Keinanen, the mysterious woman mentioned in the investigation of the smuggling of diamonds valued at from \$40,000 to \$50,000 from the steamship Stockholm, has been found outside the city by the federal authorities and is expected to appear here in a day or two to explain her connection with the alleged conspiracy.

Mitchell Safran of Brooklyn, clerk at the Russian soviet government bureau and close friend of Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, unrecognized soviet ambassador, furnished \$500 bail for being one of a group that inspired Nils Jacobsson, a sailor, to try to smuggle the diamonds from the steamship. Jacobsson has been released in custody of the customs authorities, whom he is aiding in the inquiry.

Anna Keinanen is said to have talked with Mrs. Senda Escola July 27 concerning diamonds and the conversation is said to have had a bearing on the plot.

The diamonds were taken from the ship July 27. Two days later, it is alleged, Safran visited a rooming house at West Eighty-second street. A reporter found this place is conducted by Mrs. Escola, a chauffeur employed by Thomas of Riverside Drive.

Escola told the reporter Safran called on his wife early this month at the Albany hotel.

Mrs. Escola denied knowing Jacobsson or Safran and insisted she had never known anything about the affair.

EMPEROR STILL RESTING

Sciatic Rheumatism Afflicts Ruler of Japanese People. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 27.—An official statement made at Tokyo on July 27, regarding the health of the Japanese emperor, was received here today by T. Ohta, Japanese consul-general. The statement read: "Because of the pressure of official duties during the last few years, his majesty has at times suffered severe exhaustion, and he has been afflicted with sciatic rheumatism."
