

SUPPORT GIVEN COX FORNALLY DOWNS

Liquor Interests Open Democratic Campaign.

FOES OF SALOON AROUSED

Realization Is Dawning That National Anti-Liquor Act Is in Actual Jeopardy.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU Washington, Aug. 4.—The democratic campaign was formally opened yesterday with the announcement of Joseph H. Buckridge, secretary of the New Jersey federation of liquor interests, that an effort is to be made to line up all the "wet" of the state for Cox and Roosevelt.

Mr. Buckridge, who intends to see that there is no pussyfooting on the prohibition question, also announced that the liquor interests plan on the most active participation in the campaign. He said that this activity would not be confined alone to the election of Cox and Roosevelt but that it also will extend to the election of state legislatures as well as a national congress friendly to the rehabilitation of the liquor business.

Liquor Interests Back Ticket.
The liquor wholesalers and retailers of New Jersey have voted to continue their organization without any change of names. Both associations will exert their influence in behalf of the democratic national ticket, it is announced. While the liquor interests are getting to have Governor Cox put through the Ohio legislature an enforcement act to back up the popular vote of the state in favor of prohibition.

Cox Defies Drys.
Governor Cox declined to give support to the popular verdict and defied the opponents of the saloon to oppose his future presidential campaign. Dry leaders feel keenly the loss of former Governor J. Frank Hanly of Indiana, who was killed by train last Sunday. Governor Hanly, who was the prohibition nominee for president four years ago, was expected to take the stump for Harding and Coolidge as he had opposed the placing in the field of a prohibition ticket. Governor Hanly believed that the account of Senator Harding's having voted to submit the prohibition amendment and also to override the president's veto of the Volstead prohibition enforcement act, he was entitled to receive the support of all saloon prohibitionists. His view was that to withhold prohibition support from Harding was to withhold support from the prohibition cause.

Coolidge's Record Liked.
Furthermore, he liked the record of Governor Coolidge, the republican vice-presidential nominee, who had the courage to veto a 2.75 per cent beer bill in wet Massachusetts, stating frankly some very good reasons for doing it.

Only two weeks before the fatal accident the former Indiana governor called on Senator Harding at Marion and discussed the campaign, saying that he hoped to be elected to succeed the republican candidate. An announcement, it is said, would have been made before this time had not death intervened.

State Ticket Suggested
GOVERNOR SMITH IS OFFERED FOR RENOMINATION.

Democrats Fail to Mention League of Nations in Platform at Unofficial Meet.

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., Aug. 4.—A ticket of state officers, "suggested" for the guidance of the electors, was agreed upon by party leaders at the final session of the unofficial democratic state convention here today.

Among candidates suggested was Governor Alfred E. Smith for renomination.

The only serious objection to the program prepared by the leaders of Tammany hall and the up-state organization came from Mayor G. R. Lunn, Schenectady, who today sought vainly to eliminate from the platform a plank declaring for a modification of the Volstead prohibition enforcement act that would permit traffic in beer of 2.75 per cent alcoholic content. The vote was 403 to 34 against this proposal.

Mayor Lunn returned to the fight for an expression of sentiment regarding candidates on the ground such action violated the spirit of the direct primary law. Thomas F. Rogers charged that the ticket that would be proposed was the spirit of the direct primary law.

The platform adopted today does not mention the league of nations, although there was a blanket endorsement of the league in the platform adopted by the national convention at San Francisco which contains a plank declaring for the league favored by President Wilson.

Besides favoring a modification of the Volstead act the platform recommended "recognition without intervention in all cases where the people have been misled, have by free vote of the people set up a republic. It endorsed the Wilson and Smith administrations.

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WEALTHY TRUSTS CLIP IN OREGON ROMANCE

"Diamond Bill" Barrett Is Left by Second Wife.

MONEY CAUSE OF BREAK

Mrs. Alice Gordon Drexel Barrett, Heiress of Drexel Millions, Returning From Europe.

"Diamond Bill" Barrett, Hillsboro soldier of fortune and misfortune, once again is the central figure in the terminal romance which has made all New York sit up and take notice a year ago last June.

This time, according to press reports from Philadelphia and New York, his bride of a year, Mrs. Alice Gordon Drexel Barrett, heiress of the Drexel millions, has left him, and is now en route home from abroad with her 1-month-old child. Financial matters are said to have brought about the separation.

Captain Barrett—for he attained this rank in the air service during the recent war—is said to be in England at the present time. His wealthy bride, press reports say, is planning to start, or has started, a New York from Nice, minus her dashing husband. Details of the discord have not been revealed, but according to reports which New York friends of the bride have received, the separation occurred shortly before the birth of their baby.

Elopers Start Society.
Captain Barrett, a native of Hillsboro, Or., and son of the late W. N. Barrett, former state senator, started New York society on June 5 of last year when he eloped with Miss Alice Gordon Drexel, heiress of the Drexel millions, to a life of luxury.

This is the second elopement and shattering of love's young dream in which "Diamond Bill" Barrett has figured during recent years. It was in the early summer of 1911 that he eloped with a society belle of Tacoma. Their romance was of about the same duration as this later one. On September 23, 1915, the bride obtained a divorce in the courts at San Francisco.

But it was back in 1911 that William Nathan Barrett, just out of the naval academy at Annapolis, as a midshipman, first earned the sobriquet of "Diamond Bill" that sent him into seclusion for a brief duration.

He had resigned from the navy on December 13, 1910, and went to San Francisco, where he was at once received and welcomed into exclusive social circles.

Name Is Won.
In January, 1911, he went to the jewelry store of Shreve & Co. and the store of Radke & Co. and purchased two diamond rings on approval. At the first store he procured a ring containing three diamonds and costing \$2000. From the second store he got a ring valued at \$1200. He told the merchants he was getting them for his fiancée, a prominent society girl of San Francisco.

The next day he failed to return with either the rings or the money. Investigation by police detectives disclosed he had pawned the \$2000 ring with a pawnbroker and had secured for \$800, and had procured a loan of \$500 from the same man on the \$1200 pawn ticket. A day or two later he pawned the \$1200 ring for \$100. After the loan he paid Shreve & Co. \$500 on account. The pawnbroker's investigation had disclosed these various transactions. He was arrested and charged with grand larceny.

Homeless Traffic Slow.
It was this escapade which gave Barrett the appellation of "Diamond Bill." After he had escaped prosecution at San Francisco, Barrett returned home and began a new life in law in his father's office at Hillsboro. Delivery Wagon Thrown From

Three persons were hurt, two seriously as a result of an accident on the corner of Sixth and Columbia streets last night at 8:15 o'clock, when an automobile driven by Earl Connel of The Dalles collided with a delivery wagon driven by Mark Israhel, of 401 Sixth street. Mr. and Mrs. Merze J. Jerman of 528 1/2 Columbia street, who were in the car with Connel, were both thrown out of the car and seriously injured. Connel sustained severe cuts from broken glass.

The delivery wagon was proceeding south on Sixth when the car driven by Connel, travelling at 35 miles an hour, and seriously injured Connel, crashed into the wagon.

The steering-wheel of the car was torn off and the windshield and top were crushed. Two wheels of the delivery wagon were broken and it was piled up on the curb at the corner of the street. A large crowd had collected by the time the police arrived on the scene and took charge of the injured persons. Patrolman Fowler injured his hand while searching the delivery wagon for liquor.

At St. Vincent's hospital it was found the public service commission had severe injuries in the leg. The condition of Mrs. Jerman was undetermined, but it was thought that she was injured internally.

TELEPHONE RISE GRANTED

SERVICE SUPPLIED TO NEWBERG AND TERRITORY.

Rates Found to Be Inadequate to Meet Operating Expenses by Public Service Commission.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 4.—(Special).—Increased rates are allowed the Newberg Telephone company by an order of the public service commission today. The company provides service in Newberg and surrounding communities and direct connection is made with the Yamhill County Mutual, Scholls and St. Paul Telephone companies, but the latter-named companies are not parties to the increase.

The order dates as effective from August 1. Rates for long distance calls are increased from 15 cents to 20 cents. The commission finds inadequate to meet operating expenses.

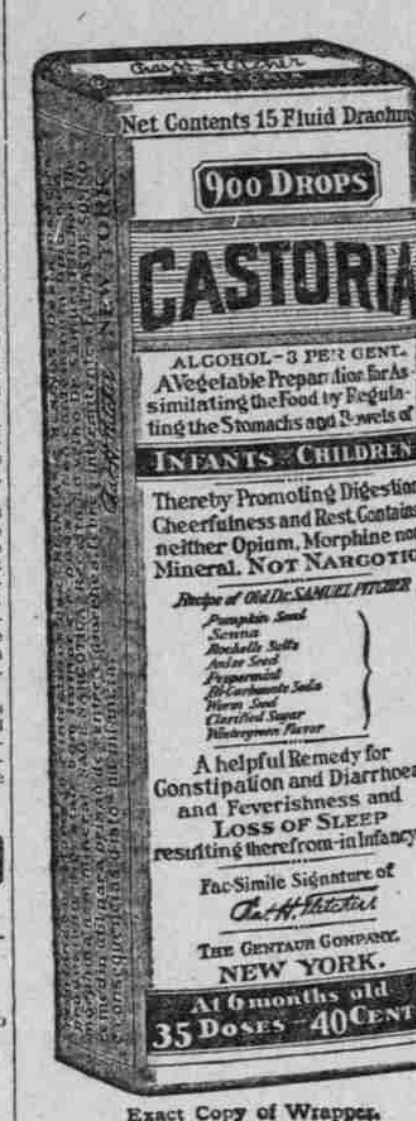

TWIN BROTHERS IN JAIL

BOTH MEN CHARGED WITH BOOTLEGGING ACTIVITIES.

Federal Officers Experience Difficulty in Distinguishing One From the Other.

Because Federal Judge Bean recently decided the internal revenue law inoperative so far as it pertains to the illegal manufacture of liquor, federal officials said yesterday they were undecided as to the disposition of criminal proceedings against L. A. Dusterhoft, alleged bootlegger and bootlegger, who was brought to Portland yesterday in custody of a deputy United States marshal. He is under indictment here for an alleged violation of the internal revenue law.

A brother, also named Dusterhoft, is now serving a sentence of six months in the county jail for bootlegging operations. The brothers are twins, and because they look so much alike, federal authorities have experienced considerable trouble in telling one from the other.

The brothers are alleged to have worked jointly in their bootlegging activities. If one was arrested, the other would be the other twin and the plea has worked often, both here and Seattle.

Now, however, both brothers are in jail and will be held here until complete investigation is made of L. A. Dusterhoft's activities. He has now completed a jail sentence in Seattle for bootlegging.

CLACKAMAS COUNTY SUES

Right of Way for Pacific Highway Sought From Railroads.

OREGON, CITY, Aug. 4.—(Special).—Clackamas county has filed suit against the Oregon & California Pacific railroad company and the Southern Pacific to condemn the right of way on a strip of land south of Canby to be used as the Pacific highway.

This strip of land is between Canby and the gravel pit and has been used as a road for the last 25 or 30 years, which the county claims makes it a highway by user. According to the complaint the county offered the railroad company \$2500 for the land but this was refused. The land is owned by the Oregon & California railroad company and is leased by the Southern Pacific.

District Attorney Gilbert L. Hodges filed the suit for the county.

BRIDE'S PARENTS ACCUSED

Fraud Charged in Connection With Wedding at Vancouver.

Report to fraud and coercion by the parents of the bride to induce Brunwick Mayer, a minor, to go to Vancouver, Wash., and marry Reba Mayer, is charged by Sadie Mayer, guardian for Brunwick, in a suit filed yesterday, seeking to have the marriage annulled.

The complaint asserts that at the time of the marriage, October 16, 1919, Brunwick was 19 years old and that his parents did not consent to the marriage, but that Reba's parents and Reba herself "conspired to defraud and coerce" Brunwick for the purpose of persuading and coercing Brunwick to go to Vancouver to marry Reba.

The complaint also charges that J. D. Wall made a false and fraudulent affidavit in the application for the marriage license.
