COUNTY SALARIES INCREASED.—The salaries of the municipal operators and emergency operators on the trans-Willamette river bridges were increased yesterday by the county commissioners on recommendation of W. B. Hatchel, supervisor of properties, with the understanding that the wages fixed at this time be the maximum for 1920. The foremen and operators will receive an increase of \$20 a month making their total salaries \$175 for foremen and \$160 for operators and the emergency operators will receive an increase of \$15 monthly or \$125 a month as the new sum.

CHURCH TO SELECT PASTOR.—Matters pertaining to the selection of a permanent pastor, the salary to be paid, the feasibility of employing a pastor's assistant and of a regular supply pastor, until a permanent man may be found, will be discussed at a meeting of the First Baptist church members at the White Temple this evening. Policies which will aid the committee on the selection of a permanent pastor will be brought before the membership at the same time. The White Temple has been without a pastor since the resignation of Dr. W. A. Waldo in June.

FINE OF \$100 ASSESSED.—Percy Ainge, who was charged with reckless driving and driving while drunk, as the result of an automobile accident which he had at Broadway and Stark street on July 21, was fined \$100 on the reckless driving charge in the municipal court yesterday. On recommendation of Deputy City Attorney Stadler Ainge was allowed to plead guilty to the reckless driving charge and the charge of driving while intoxicated was dropped. Ainge turned the corner at Broadway and Stark street and collided with a parked vehicle. He was arrested by Patrolman Levison.

BELTING REPORTED STOLEN.—The theft of three heavy belts from a thrashing machine near McMinnville, Or., was reported to Inspector Mallock at the police station yesterday by J. A. Jensen. The three belts, which were taken during the night, weighed several hundred pounds and the thief must have had an automobile or wagon to transport them away. One of the belts was 7 inches wide and 150 feet long. The other two were smaller. It is thought likely that the thief may bring them to Portland.

SHIPYARD WORKER ARRESTED.—J. E. Dalton, shipyard worker, was arrested at Sunnyvale, Or., yesterday by Patrolmen Perry and Abbott of the auto theft bureau, on a charge of larceny by bailment. The charges against Dalton involve an automobile which he is said to have been purchasing from the Lewis E. Obry Motors company on installments. According to the police he ceased paying his installments in January of this year and since that time has had the car concealed. Dalton's bail was placed at \$1000.

AGED CHINESE SENT TO JAIL.—Loy Hing, 84 years of age, who was arrested in an alleged hop den in Chinatown Tuesday night by Patrolmen Turley and Fair on a charge of having morphine and cocaine in his possession, was given six months in jail yesterday by Acting Municipal Judge Delch. George Enos, who was arrested in Hing's room with a hypodermic needle in his possession, drew a similar sentence. The police reported finding 13 packages of the drug.

COMMUNITY MAY INCORPORATE.—A petition signed by 130 residents of the district adjacent to the Gilbert and Foster roads, east of Lents, was presented to the county commissioners yesterday. The purpose of the incorporation is to obtain water for domestic purposes for residents of the district. The petitioners propose to form a water company of \$30,000 for installing the system.

DISTRICT TO VOTE ON WATER PLAN.—Residents of the Gilbert district, east of the city limits on the Foster road, will vote on September 18 on the plan of organizing a water district for the purpose of purchasing water from the city of Portland. If the district is organized, a bond issue of \$30,000 will be authorized in order to pay for the necessary water system within the district.

ANGELINE BERRY IS DEAD

RESIDENT OF PORTLAND SINCE 1886 PASSES AWAY.

Life Of Great Activity In Civic Work During Long Period of Usefulness.

Mrs. Angeline Berry, widow of the late F. W. Berry, died at the Good Samaritan hospital at 8 o'clock yesterday morning. Heart disease was the immediate cause of her death.

Mrs. Berry, who came to Portland with her husband in 1886, lived for many years at 609 East Oak street. She was born near Pittsburg 77 years ago, was educated in the Pittsburg schools and was principal of the Sterrett schools in that city for about 20 years.

She was always greatly interested in civic and community work and for many years was a worker in the Oregon Humane society, of which she was vice-president at the time of her death. She was member of the Grace Memorial church, of which she had donated the site and assisted in the erection of the church on East Seventeenth street. She was for many years one of the active supporters of the Y. W. C. A. and assisted with other friends and promoters of the Good Samaritan hospital here at the time of its erection.

Mrs. Berry was always greatly interested in helping young people, especially young girls, and she had raised and educated three girls. Her funeral services will be held at her late residence tomorrow at 2 o'clock. Dr. George B. Van Waters will officiate, following out the desire of Mrs. Berry.

SERVICES TO BE HELD
 Rim of Crater Lake to Be Scene of Special Meeting.

A special meeting will be held on the rim of Crater Lake Sunday night, August 8, at 8 o'clock, conducted by Rev. John W. Hoyt, Presbyterian Sunday-school missionary for southern Oregon. This is the third annual service of song and preaching conducted by Mr. Hoyt, and the meeting will be held at a special place in the large reception room of the lodge. It is possible that one of the prominent ministers of the valley will be present to assist in the service.

So far as possible Christian people are asked to make a special trip to the Crater Lake at this time, and all who can sing or play any musical instrument are invited to make themselves known to Mr. Hoyt before the service, that a choir may be organized to lead the singing.

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LICENSES REVOKED FOR LIQUOR SELLING

3 Soft Drink Establishments Come Under Ban.

ONE CASE IS DISMISSED

Progress Restaurant Only One to Go Free Following Hearing Before City Council.

Hard cider, Jamaica ginger, red wine and moonshine whisky figured prominently in cases of soft drink establishments heard before the city council, when three licenses were revoked, one case postponed, one case dismissed and one owner ordered to sell out.

In each case complaint has been registered with the council by Chief of Police Jenkins, following the hearing of cases in the municipal and federal courts.

The only dismissal came in the case of Joseph Viale, proprietor of the Progress restaurant, an Italian restaurant at First and Stark streets. Witnesses testified that this restaurant was one of the most famous on the Pacific coast.

It developed in the hearing of the case that police officers had discovered two gallons of wine in a room above the restaurant. A number of rooms had been fitted up for use in serving meals during the convention period in June. No evidence was presented that liquor had been sold in the establishment. Mr. Viale was ordered to close up the rooms on the second floor and confine his business to the main floor.

Hard cider brought grief to Yun Wo, whose license to operate a soft drink place at 94 North Fifth street was revoked. According to Yun Wo, sales of cider ran as high as 110 cases a day.

"Do you drink cider?" asked Mayor Baker.
 "Yes, not much. Some time a little drink. Too sweet."
 "You mean, too hard," suggested the mayor.

Alcohol Tests 4 Per Cent.
 Reports made by Fred Curry, city chemist showed the cider tested as high as four per cent alcohol. These tests had been made from month to month and it was upon the reports that the revocation of license was based. Before the council made its decision, several cider drinkers were placed on the stand, one of whom testified that he had imbibed of more than 100 glasses of Yun Wo's cider in one day without becoming intoxicated.

Steve Adrain, said by Chief Jenkins to operate the biggest bootlegging "joint" in Portland, lost his license in short order. His establishment is located at 256 Couch street and was charged with selling beer during the closed season and was fined \$25 and costs by Judge Bowman of Pineville.

Donald Fassel and Van Winkle were arrested Sunday by Craig and McDonald charged with spearing fish in Three-Mile creek, and were fined \$40 each by Judge Sawyer of Bend. F. W. Fordham, a California sportsman, was fined \$25 and costs for having undersized trout in his possession.

More stories are coming in about the trout fishing to be found in the north of Crater Lake. Deputy Game Warden Craig reports that he was fishing in the lake last week and caught several rainbow trout weighing from 10 to 12 pounds each.

The summary of causes issued by the traffic bureau made a total of 634 arrests during the month and fines levied as a result of those arrests amounted to an aggregate of \$3519.

Of the arrests 515 were made by the motorcycle officers operating under Lieutenant Ervin for various traffic violations. The arrests made by the motorcycle officers resulted in fines aggregating \$2716.80.

Captain Lewis shows that of the accidents, 594 were caused by carelessness and 180 to failure to give right of way. Nineteen were due to jaywalking, 17 to cutting corners, 15 to failure to signal, 9 to reckless driving, 9 to defective brakes, and only four to speeding.
