

ROOSEVELT ATTACKS HARDING'S ATTITUDE

Bourbon Says Chicago Platform "Clear as Mud."

CANDIDATE USES SARCASTIC

Tennessee Senate's Action in Ratifying Suffrage Pleasing. Avers Nominée.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Aug. 13.—(Special.)—The republican candidate for president, Franklin D. Roosevelt, tonight expressed his attitude toward the republican attitude on these and every other public question, possibly maintain business confidence.

His address tonight followed a noon address in Minneapolis, where he declared Senator Harding was "trying to syndicate the presidency," a condition under which he said, "a few of the old guard crowd would get in on the ground floor."

Mr. Roosevelt tonight referred to Senator Harding's position on the suffrage question as indicating the republican presidential candidate "apparently is careful to wait until the last moment before committing himself to any definite policy" on an issue.

Tennessee Action Pleases Candidate.
Referring to divergent interpretations "two great republican dailies in New York" placed on Mr. Harding's attitude toward the league of nations, Mr. Roosevelt said, "We need definite action, clear policies. It is only through these that the business of the country can remain stabilized."

In his address tonight Mr. Roosevelt said:

"I am particularly pleased with news of the ratification of the woman's suffrage amendment by the Tennessee senate."

"This seems a peculiarly appropriate moment to call attention to the suffrage record of the republican nominee. This record is typical of his record on almost every other important piece of legislation in his whole public career."

"In his reply to the delegation of suffragists who interviewed him June 14, 1915, he gave this illuminating answer: 'Believing as I do in political parties and government through political parties, I had much rather that the party to which I belong should in its conference make a declaration than to assume a leadership or take an individual position on the question.'

Harding is Ridiculed.
"Later he again told the suffragists that it would be presumptuous for him to dictate to the party."

"I want to emphasize that it was not until the final successful ballot was taken in the state June 4, 1915, that Senator Harding finally climbed on the band wagon and voted 'yes.'"

"A record of this kind speaks for itself."

"I want to refer to the needs of a class of labor which has been grossly and inexcusably overlooked. I refer particularly to the pay of school teachers. We cannot expect education to be up to American standards unless those who impart that education are paid and live according to the highest American standard."

NATIONAL FOOD DEAL FAVORED
Roosevelt Says Tariff Issue Has Been Taken Out of Politics.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 13.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, entering the campaign today on his campaign trip to the Pacific coast, urged that the food supply of the country be supplied on a national or international basis.

Mr. Roosevelt promised that if a democratic administration is returned to power, "we shall view these problems in the large."

Referring to remarks attributed to Senator Harding that the tariff issue is a "prominent feature of his campaign," Mr. Roosevelt declared:

"The tariff issue was taken out of politics seven or eight years ago. 'To every body's satisfaction.'"

"We have not scratched the surface of successful national government. We can never go back, for instance, to the days of a billion-dollar congress," he declared. "Problems that once were local and could be handled locally today have become national and international."

"Twenty-five years ago what you were doing in the northwest with your crops, and in the east with your not of very great importance to people in the east or to people in other lands."

"Today the national government must exert itself more and more, in this problem of food production and distribution," he continued.

"My plea," Mr. Roosevelt continued, "is that in these matters we become more national in our thinking. The war has shown us that this piecemeal, bit-or-miss method must end."

STATE TO BE COVERED
Schedule of Towns Arranged for Roosevelt to Speak.

SPOKANE, Aug. 13.—According to a revised schedule the candidate received today by local democratic headquarters from National Committee A. E. Tillow at Tacoma, Franklin D. Roosevelt, democratic candidate for vice-president, will make a one-day speaking trip across this state, following a night speech here August 19.

He will make rare platform speeches August 21 at Pasco, Milton, Cle Elum, Kennewick, Prosser, Tri-Cities, Yakima, Ellensburg, Auburn, Kent and Seattle. He will not speak at Walla Walla or northwestern Washington points as previously stated. It was declared.

August 11, he was scheduled to speak at Hoquiam, Aberdeen, Montesano, Elma, Olympia, Tacoma, Centralia, Chehalis, Kelso and Kalama, reaching Portland at 7:30 P. M.

WOMAN IS HEAT VICTIM

In places and houses the shade trees along the residential streets in quest of relief from the intolerable heat indoors. Days like yesterday and Thursday brought home the fact that Portland is peculiarly blessed in the possession of miles and miles of full-leaved shade trees along the residential streets unequalled in any other coast city.

Parks Prove Popular.
Portlanders who were fortunate enough to live close to city parks took advantage of them to the limit. Especially the children, who flocked to the swimming tanks and wading pools literally by the thousand. The Sellwood park pool and the Peninsula

park pool both registered more than 1000 swimmers each day during the past three days of the heat wave. It was a gala day at Peninsula Park for the women and girls. The pool is used on alternate days for boys and girls. Thursday the number of boys who splashed in the cool tank was well over the thousand mark and yesterday the girls crowded the bathing facilities there to the limit. At 3 o'clock in the afternoon hundreds of girls, old and young, big and little, were in the tank, from wet toddlers of 5 to matrons of 50, all engaged in beating the weather man at his own game.

Children Also Wade.
In the wading pools in Peninsula Park the little boys and girls in various stages of undress waded and splashed and rolled in the shallow water while the mothers enjoyed the scene from the shady shade of the park benches, wielding fans in a winning battle against the heat.

Officials of the Oregon Humane society reported that many thoughtless persons who left in a hurry for the beach resorts or out-of-town picnics have left cats locked up in the empty houses without access to water or food. Two instances of dogs left tied up in deserted houses and suffering from lack of water were reported. Even goats have been left staked out in pastures while their owners were making all speed to get away from the heat. Humane society officials state that strenuous measures will be taken against careless owners who leave their pets behind them to suffer in this manner.

Although the weather man does not promise relief from the heat during the next 24 hours it is believed that the west and northwest winds will relieve the situation to a certain extent.

THE DALLIES SUFFERS IN 107
Hoodoo Day Is Hottest in Many Years and City Suffers.

THE DALLIES, Or., Aug. 13.—(Special.)—Today was the hottest this section has experienced for many years, the temperature at 4 o'clock registering 107 degrees.

Thus, Friday, the thirteenth, may lay claim to having a distinction other than being "unlucky," as by a strange coincidence the hottest day in this section previously occurred on August 13, 1914, when the mercury reached 106 degrees.

The thermometer thus far this month was August 4, 100; August 7, 101; August 12, 101, and today, 107. In fact the 13th day of the month has been hotter than the whole 30 days of most Augusts, the average daily temperature being 86 degrees, though August 1914 averaged 82 degrees.

The coolest day was when the mercury on August 8, 1914, fell to 78 degrees. The warmest day of the month to date were: August 1, 95; 2, 87; 3, 89; 4, 100; 5, 94; 6, 93; 7, 101; 8, 107.

HEBO FIRES UNDER CONTROL
Green Timber Damaged in Tillamook District, Is Report.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 13.—(Special.)—A telephone message to the headquarters of the Tillamook forest in this city from the Mount Hebo district in Tillamook county yesterday stated that two fires of considerable size have been burning in that locality lately but late reports indicate that they are under control. One of the fires covers an area of nine acres or more and has damaged some green timber, says the report, while the other is only one acre in extent.

It is announced at the office of the forest that all permits for burning slashings inside the forest have been revoked as long as the extremely dry weather lasts.

FOREST FIRES ARE RAGING
Situation in Northern California Considered Serious.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 13.—Northern California's forest-fire situation was described by United States forest service headquarters here today as being "as serious as at any time in the last three or four years."

Telegrams received at headquarters today from northern counties said one fire fighter was drowned, and deaths of four were reported. The fires were burning uncontrolled.

Three of the uncontrolled fires were reported near Lassen peak. The fourth was sweeping 5000 acres on Canadian creek in Trinity county. A fifth fire was reported 12 miles long in Modoc county.

Vancouver Has 95.
VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 13.—(Special.)—While many thought today was hotter than yesterday, the thermometer registered 95, two degrees cooler than Thursday, according to a Quabberts, forecast.

Weather observer here. The hot spell has driven many from the city to the beaches. A Quabberts, number going earlier than they had expected.

Albany Suffers in 99.
ALBANY, Or., Aug. 13.—(Special.)—This section of the state sweltered again today with the government maximum temperature of 99 degrees. This is one degree less than the official maximum yesterday, when the highest mark of the year was established.

Hood River Mark 102.
HOOD RIVER, Or., Aug. 13.—(Special.)—Four degrees higher than yesterday was the maximum temperature registered by local thermometers which showed a maximum temperature of 102 degrees today. A welcome breeze from the west brought relief tonight and indications point to a break in the hot spell.

GOODS ROT IN JAPAN
American Merchandise Lying on Wharves Uncollected by Consignees.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13.—(Special.)—Millions of dollars' worth of American merchandise is rotting and rusting upon the wharves and freight boats of Japan, because consignees have either refused or neglected to accept their shipments, according to H. C. Guild, who returned from Japan today, after an unsuccessful attempt to establish an automobile factory in that country.

Guild says that the Japanese merchants are "like children" and that they will order thousands of dollars' worth of goods from American consignment stores, but they will not accept them with any intention of accepting and for which they are entirely unable to pay.

Prince Carol Due Today.
According to messages received in Portland yesterday from San Francisco, one of them coming to the passenger depot, the prince of the Pacific railroad, Crown Prince Carol of Roumania left the Bay City last night for Portland. There was nothing in the messages to indicate how long a time the distinguished visitor may spend in the city, though it is expected he will be here through the night on his way east. He is expected here early tomorrow morning.

Prince Carol arrived in San Francisco on an oriental steamer Thursday.

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The president's message was a personal one, confident hope that Tennessee, through its other great legislative body, will make good the pledge of the democratic national platform, thus enfranchising the women of America.

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The house adjourned until Monday at 2 o'clock without reference to suffrage, but it was stated that the committee to which the resolution was referred would meet Monday night to consider it.

Senate Galleries Packed.
An hour before the senate convened the galleries were packed with spectators. Speaker Todd had little difficulty in silencing the onlookers throughout the two hours' debate during which there were numerous demonstrations. But when the 17th of this session previously occurred, the suffrage cohorts went beyond restraint and forced a temporary suspension of the roll call. The suffragists redoubled their cheers when the clerk shouted the total above the rostrum.

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While leaders of the suffrage group in the senate were confident of ultimate victory in their chamber, they said frankly that no such ratio of affirmative votes as was recorded in committee could be maintained on the final roll call.

Anti-suffragists claim defeat of any ratification measure in the house, 63 of the 120 members of which are suffrage opponents. The suffrage group in the house probably will come Tuesday.

Declaring that women should have the first right to speak when the issue is "whether or not the world shall henceforth be ruled by reason and righteousness or by blood and iron," Governor Bickett, in a special message today called upon the North Carolina legislature to accept "the inevitable and ratify the federal woman's suffrage amendment."

The governor warned his democratic friends that the most they would be able to do by defeating the ratification would be to delay "for six months a movement you are powerless to stop."

He said, "The big question that is going to be settled in the next six months is whether this nation shall enter an alliance with 29 of the most powerful nations on earth for the purpose of forever delivering humankind from the burdens and horrors of war. On that question the women have a secret right to be heard for when cannot roar the women furnish the fodder."

Discussing the possible effect of the suffrage amendment on the race relations, Governor Bickett said:

"For 35 years after the civil war all political energies of our people were absorbed in the struggle to maintain in our border a white government. I greatly fear that woman's suffrage will be brought up, and anyone interested has been invited to attend the meeting."

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
