

REPUBLICANS GIVE UP CAMPAIGN PRISING

Washington Committee Will
Hold No Meeting.

MAJORITY PLEA UNHEARD

Conclave Not Wanted Because
Leaders Fear Reorganization
Movement May Be Started.

SEATTLE, Aug. 15.—(Special).—Altogether informally, but with much finality as though the announcement had been made officially, it is declared there will be no meeting of the republican state committee to print down the list of gubernatorial or other candidates or to call a convention for that purpose.

This decision was reached in the face of a showing that a large number of prominent republicans, including county chairmen and state committeemen, were asking for it prior to the closing of the list of candidates yesterday. Inasmuch as no new filings were made to change the situation, the decision to keep the state committee hands off the contest will stand, members of the executive committee who are very close to State Chairman Sam A. Walker say.

The gubernatorial committee, by the way, were opposed to the plan of eliminating themselves and Walker did not feel like calling a conference that could not bind the candidates.

Reorganization Attempt Feared.
Some of the state chairman's close friends do not wish a state committee meeting called for another reason. They fear if the committee were to gather someone might wish to start a reorganization movement and as the primaries are only a month distant, Walker's friends do not wish the committee disturbed in any way.

With the closing of the filings the republican gubernatorial candidates settled down to the last month of the fight, expecting that the real drift of sentiment which will indicate the outcome of the contest will become apparent after the first of the month.

Governor Louis F. Hart has named Ed Clifford of Seattle in charge of his state fight and new campaign headquarters are to be opened in Seattle at once. Clifford, assigned as chairman of the Polo club to take over the campaign management and Thomas J. L. Kennedy has succeeded him.

Rail Men for Hartley.
According to a report from Auburn and Tacoma, the railroad employees' political organization of those towns have endorsed the gubernatorial candidacy of Colonel Roland H. Hartley and the resolutions that come from the railroad workers have an emphatic ring. It was said a few days ago in a dispatch from Leavenworth that the railroad men of that division point were considering a Hartley resolution.

The endorsement from the railroad men hits Colonel George B. Lamping a hard jolt, for it has been only ten days since Lamping was elected to the office by the Spokane council of the Railway Men's Welfare league and word came that the fact that this was intended as a signal to other railway organizations to get behind the Spokane council, which is claimed in railroad circles that emissaries of the west-side railroad groups may be sent to Spokane to switch sentiment of railroad workers from Lamping to Hartley.

It is stated the Tacoma council's action followed similar action in other parts of the state. There are 16 locals in the Auburn council and 26 in Tacoma council No. 5.

Rail Meeting Sunday.
The railway men plan a meeting in Seattle next Sunday when some of the members may bring up the gubernatorial fight again. Since the state executive committee met, H. Alvin Moore, former secretary of the organization, has filed for congress from the 1st district and his candidacy also will be endorsed.

Colonel Lamping, who returned from eastern Washington a few days ago, declared yesterday he had not received the letter L. C. Jessup, vice-chairman of the republican state committee, said he had mailed to him demanding a "yes or no" answer to the question as to whether Lamping was flirting with the non-partisan league or triple alliance. In the absence of the letter Lamping refused to outline his answer, although he said yesterday he would reply to it promptly.

Jessup's published statement followed the lines of previous criticism that Lamping was appealing for support of the political factions which once planned an invasion of the republican platform. He now claims to be preparing to organize a party of their own on primary day.

In discussing this charge today Lamping said he did not know any of the non-partisan league leaders and had held no conference with them. He said he might be receiving support from some non-partisans, but if so he was getting it without tying himself up to the league platform. He said that the endorsement given his candidacy by the railway men's welfare league in Spokane was unsolicited.

LEWIS RADICALS ARE QUIET
No Attempt Made to Invade Republican Ranks in Filings.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Aug. 15.—(Special).—Lewis county filings for yesterday did not reveal any attempt on the part of the triple alliance or non-partisan league membership to enter the republican primaries here. It is understood that the various organizations that are allied together will later get together and put up a complete ticket. Filings are as follows:

TWO MEN DROWN IN LAKE

Relatives on Shore See Swimmers Sink, but Cannot Aid.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 15.—Two men were drowned at different points in Lake Washington today, each in full view of relatives and friends. William S. Way, 23 years, a teacher at Forest, Ontario, while swimming at Palisade beach, suddenly disappeared from the view of his mother, Mrs. Ellen Bannister, who was watching him from the shore. His dead body was afterward recovered.

Peter Lesneth, aged 35, was drowned at Kenmore beach within a few rods of the place where his family was camped. His wife and two children witnessed the drowning.

COAL MEN REPLY TODAY

Demands of Miners to Be Answered by Operators.

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 15.—Bituminous coal operators of the central competitive field will reply to the supplemental wage demands of the union miners at a conference tomorrow. It was announced tonight.

The demands, presented last night by the miners, requested an increase of \$2 a day for all miners paid by the day or month; 10 cents a ton increase for all tonnage men, both pick and machine; abolition of the automatic penalty clause fining miners \$1 a day for illegal strikes and settlement of differentials by the districts affected.

LABOR CHAMPIONS REDS

Chicago Federation Urges Strike if U. S. Aids Poland.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—The Chicago Federation of Labor today adopted a resolution demanding a general strike of workers if the United States gives military aid to Poland.

The resolution recited that the allies were insisting that Poland fight the "soviet" which is government of and for the workers and declared that the United States was showing a decided leaning toward unfriendly action against the workers' government of Russia.

MODEL FIRE HOUSE BUILT

NEW CENTRAL STATION HAS MANY INNOVATIONS.

Two Downtown Companies Will Occupy Building at Fourth and Taylor Streets.

The new central fire station building at the corner of Fourth and Taylor streets is nearing completion and will be ready for occupancy in about ten days. It is a building of pleasing architectural lines, the exterior faced with white brick and constructed from plans prepared by Lee Holden, battalion chief. It includes a number of new ideas not heretofore employed, intended to serve for higher efficiency and greater convenience of the service.

The front doors of the engine, truck and hose wagon stalls fold inside instead of opening outwardly and obstructing the sidewalk. The building is of three stories, the ground floor being devoted to equipment and accommodations of the companies. The second floor is the quarters for the men and the third floor is designed to be utilized as a department school for educational work in the department, and for conferences and hearings conducted by the fire marshal or department heads.

The building will be the home of Engine company No. 1, and of Truck company No. 1. The construction work is being done by A. Guthrie & Co., and the cost will be about \$55,000. This is the first structure erected as a result of the bonds voted by the city for construction of new fire department buildings.

In order to avoid the usual drop at the entrance to stations, the pavement will be raised on Fourth street so that the roadway will be level with the curb at this point. A drinking fountain has been installed on the Taylor-street side of the building.

PONZI CASE IS WATCHED

EXACT PART IN BIG SWINDLE CAUSES CONJECTURE.

Developments Expected This Week as Result of Federal Probe. Hearing Is Tomorrow.

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 15.—Was Charles Ponzi head and front or only the "front" of the millions-overnight swindle that has bewildered and bewildered for eight months in Boston? This was the subject of open forums on Boston Common and wherever groups gathered today. Recent activities of federal and state authorities, coupled with various intimations have caused a general expectation of developments this week that will grow the query. The next step will be the hearing in the federal court Tuesday on petitions for receivers for the Ponzi company.

Edwin L. Fride, the federal auditor who has been going over Ponzi's accounts has said that he has now accounts still to be examined, he has found liabilities of \$5,000,000. The only clue to Ponzi's assets is his own estimate that they total about \$4,000,000. Ponzi will have a hearing Thursday on the charge of using the mails to defraud.

Charles Brightwell, Raymond Myers and Fred Myers held out state charges of larceny as a result of the collapse of the Old Colony Foreign Exchange company, which attracted investors with an offer of 300 per cent interest, were still in jail.

EDWARD D. GATCHETT DIES

Ex-Portland Resident Succumbs at Home in Seattle.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 15.—(Special).—Edward D. Gatchett, Seattle real estate man and building contractor and an ex-resident of Portland, Or., died today at his home from heart disease from which he had suffered for five years. He was born in Missouri and came to the northwest 30 years ago.

He was a building contractor in Portland for four years and then located in Port Angeles for four years. He resided in Seattle for 22 years, 12 of which he spent in contracting. He later engaged in the real estate business.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Gatchett, a daughter, Mrs. R. C. Smith, 321 Tenth avenue, and a son, U. E. Gatchett, 153 Terry avenue.

NEW HOSPITAL STARTED

Indian School at Tacoma to Be Transformed by Government.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 15.—(Special).—The Indian school, the government institution which was recently closed to transform it into a modern government hospital for the use of ex-service men.

The handling of tuberculosis patients of possible danger to the community and 150 beds will be installed for such use. At present the ex-service men who have contracted tuberculosis are in the Mountain View sanitarium, but they will be transferred to the new hospital as soon as it is completed.

46 MAZAMAS SCALE TO BAKER'S GUY PEAK

Record Number Stand on Summit at One Time.

CLIMB TAKES 12½ HOURS

Both Ascent and Descent Made Without Mishap of Any Kind. Outing Is Strenuous One.

GLACIER, Wash., Aug. 14.—(Special).—The Mazamas of Thursday established a new record in Pacific northwest mountain climbing when they scaled Mount Baker's snow and ice-ribbed summit 46 strong. This is the largest number of persons that has ever stood on the summit at one time.

A new record book and box was left on the peak with the name of all the climbers registered in it. Although a hazardous climb, owing to the great number of crevasses and snow bridges which had to be crossed, the ascent and descent were made without accident of any kind.

The trip required 12½ days of strenuous work. The climbers left Tacoma at 11 o'clock on Wednesday morning, camped at Camp Keeser at an elevation of 6700 feet, near Coleman peak on the north side of the mountain.

The return trip to permanent camp was made Friday by noon and the climbers were pleasantly surprised by having huckleberry pie cooked and served by the women members of the club who did not attempt the climb.

The ascent was in charge of John A. Lee and Roy W. Ayer, chairman of the outing committee, and E. C. Sammons, president of the club. Other company leaders were Mr. Ayer and Mr. Sammons, E. F. Peterson, Edgar E. Courson and A. J. Kale.

Breakfast Eaten at 2 A. M.
Breakfast was eaten at 2 A. M. and the ascent began at 3:30. It was a 12½-hour trip to the summit, which was reached at 3:40 in the afternoon. With the east side of the mountain in shadow, this descent after the ice fields was begun at 4 o'clock and temporary camp was reached by the slowest of the parties at 8:30, after 18 hours of the hardest kind of mountaineering.

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Outing Is Successful.
Probably never in the history of organized mountaineering has there been a more successful outing than that ending today at Camp Keeser. Two very hazardous and difficult climbs were made by the club where every member who attempted the climb reached the summit of the objective peak, Mount Skutumpah, which was reached by the Mazamas in 1908. On the fourth ascent of the mountain the first climb was made by the Mazamas in 1908. On the Baker climb, every person who started also reached the summit, due to the skillful mountaineering of the leaders.

The lowering of the American flag will be held tonight at sundown to be followed by initiation of the new members and presentation of badges to those entitled to them. This latter ceremony is always in the nature of a graduation ceremony. Richard W. Pendleton will deliver a baccalaureate sermon and President Sammons will present the Summit badges.

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Body Found in River.
Edward Smith, 60, an Old-Time Portlander, Believed Suicide.

The body of the man found early yesterday in the Willamette river near the foot of Salmon street was identified last night by acquaintances as that of Edward Smith, an old resident of the city and a familiar figure along the waterfront.

Smith was 60 years of age and lived at 342½ First street. He had no relatives in this part of the country, so far as known. He had been a resident of the city for a long time after coming here was engaged as a deckhand on river steamers and was well known along the waterfront. In later years he had been engaged in a building business. The man had been despondent, acquaintances told the police last night. He disappeared about a week ago and search had been made for him. It was believed by the authorities that death was the result of suicide.
