The purpose of the tour, part of which will be under the guidance of United States forestry officials, is to acquaint all the officials with the problems to be met in looping the mountain with a highway.

BENSON TO BE HONORED.—Hood River celebration will be big one.

HOOD RIVER CELEBRATION WILL BE BIG ONE.

Apple District Citizens to Express Gratitude Over Completion of Great Highway.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Aug. 16.—(Special.)—Hood River county has never made more elaborate preparations for any event than for "Benson day" on Labor day, September 6, when Simon Benson, chairman of the state highway commission, will be honored at a general expression of gratitude of apple valley residents over completion of the Columbia river highway between here and Portland. Mosier orchard district folk will join the Hood River population in the celebration.

Every community of Hood River county has promised to send a full delegation to the celebration. It is expected that more than 5000 people will participate in a big basket picnic at Chautauqua park, the feast to be followed by addresses by prominent Oregon citizens. Other features of the programme in honor of Mr. Benson have not been worked out in detail by the committee.

Invitations have been sent to all members of the state highway commission, Governor Olcott, Senators Chamberlain and McNary, Representatives Stannett and McArthur, prominent representatives of the Portland press and Multnomah county citizens who were instrumental in construction of the Multnomah county end of the highway. J. H. Fredrick, vice-president of the Hood River commercial club, has been appointed general chairman of the committee to arrange for the event. He will be assisted by Miss May Davidson and C. A. Bell.

LONDON IS BOUND OVER.

ALLEGED WHITE SLAYER HELD TO GRAND JURY.

Wife of Man Accused by 16-Year-Old Girl Falls in Attempt to Follow Mate to Jail.

George Landon, charged with violation of the Mann white slave act, was bound over to the federal grand jury yesterday, following a hearing before United States Commissioner Drake, and was remanded to the county jail in default of \$2500 bail. Efforts of Mrs. Landon to follow her husband into confinement proved unavailing, in spite of the fact that the woman's attorney asked the commissioner that she be committed. Mrs. Landon had refused to testify at the hearing, and the commissioner Drake refused to order her held as a witness.

Landon was arrested recently at Salem, while he was on a tour of the state in a roadster. He was charged with transporting 16-year-old Clara Berger from Portland to Seattle and back to Portland for immoral purposes.

The girl testified that she had been working since she was 9 years old, and that she had entered the employ of Mr. and Mrs. Landon to care for a sick baby. She had been grossly mistreated by Landon, the attorney charged. Landon is about 45 years of age and is a cook. Mrs. Landon was turned over to the women's protective bureau.

FUGITIVE IS CAUGHT IN EXCITING CHASE

Civilians, Police, Detectives Join in Noon-Hour Race.

CHECK FORGERY ALLEGED

George A. Muir Charged With Attempting to Pass Bad Paper at First National Bank.

George A. Muir, mechanical engineer and alleged forger, declared to have been intercepted in the act of trying to pass two forged checks for an aggregate of \$250 in the First National bank, was arrested yesterday by A. W. Smith, plainclothes patrolman, and a Burns operative after a chase of several blocks through the downtown streets which was joined in by bank clerks, civilians and police.

The alleged attempt to pass the checks took place during the noon hour when there were hundreds of persons on the streets. Large numbers of them joined in the chase.

The chase led down Stark street to Fourth, up Fourth to Washington and then to the McKay building, where Muir tried to shake off his pursuers by running up the stairway to the fourth floor. There he climbed through a window and came down the fire escape. As he slid off the awning to the street he was knocked by a blow from a Burns operative and immediately was placed under arrest.

According to the Burns agency and the police, Muir has passed a number of smaller checks at various grocery stores about the city, using in each case the name of Alexander P. Dudley of 1240 East Thirtieth street north, who has an account at the First National bank. The result was that the bank attaches, detectives and police were on the lookout for him.

When he entered the bank yesterday at 1:30, Muir was met by a group of checks, one for \$250 drawn on the First National bank and another for \$100 drawn on the Hibernia Savings bank, the clerk "told" him and began checking up. The result was that Muir apparently became frightened and started out of the bank.

Efforts to head off his escape proved futile. He darted down the steps and out the lunch hour, gathered to witness the pursuit and capture of the fugitive.

Police and the Burns agency are making an investigation for the purpose of checking up on Muir's activities. It is thought that had checks for which he is responsible may be discovered.

Muir is 27 years old. He carried a card which gave his address as Portland, R. F. D. No. 1, Box 351.

Forgery is Charged.

Muir was charged with forgery in a complaint filed by Chief Clerk Reuten of the municipal court by A. O. Jones, vice-president of the First National bank. Police declare Muir had passed four checks for \$191.63, \$59, \$41.95 and \$10. Two of these checks were passed in grocery stores and two in the First National bank.

Muir had been living at East Thirtieth street with Chief Clerk Reuten, the police say. He is married.
