

2 OFFICIALS SLAIN IN IRISH RIOTING

Lisburn Mobs Start to Burn Out Nationalists.

POLICE PATROL RAIDED

Constable Is Killed at Dundalk and Two Are Wounded. Throng Pray at Jail.

BELFAST, Aug. 22.—Rioting was in progress tonight at Lisburn as a result of the assassination today of Inspector Swaney. An attempt was made to wreck the shop of a Sinn Féin leader within 40 yards of the scene of the killing and only the intervention by Ulster volunteers prevented it.

The crowd then attacked the residence of a nationalist republican who fired from a window. His assailants returned the fire and wounded him.

The crowds started out to burn the house of every nationalist in Lisburn.

Police Patrol Is Ambushed. Boards were wrenched from windows and fire raiders entered buildings to complete their destruction.

A police patrol was ambushed at Dundalk. One constable was killed and two wounded.

Last night large crowds assembled outside the Cork jail and prayed for the hunger strikers there.

Inspector Swaney, against whom a verdict of wilful murder was given by a coroner's jury in connection with the assassination of Mayor MacCurran in March, was shot while en route to his home last night at Lisburn.

The assassin fired a bullet which struck in Woods' hand. He was not injured.

At the corner of Railway street three armed men with rifles confronted Swaney and fired on him in the presence of his wife and child.

Swaney fell, but the assassins discharged their weapons again into his body.

Commandant Makes Dash. Captain Woods, commandant of the Lisburn branch of the Ulster volunteers, made a dash for the assassins, although armed only with a stick.

The assassin fired a bullet which struck in Woods' hand. He was not injured.

The trio then fired at other persons, but without effect, and jumped into a waiting taxicab and, driving toward Belfast, escaped.

The verdict at the MacCurran inquest was that Premier Lloyd George, Viscount French, lord-lieutenant of Ireland and others including Swaney, were guilty of murder.

In some quarters the belief was expressed that the killing was an attempt to intimidate a nationalist leader in connection with the incarceration of Lord Mayor MacSwiney of Cork.

Police Sergeant James Craddock was shot dead in King street Saturday night. This was the third killing of a policeman Saturday.

LORD MAYOR MAY GO FREE

Cork Jail Physician Advises Hunger Striker's Release. The physician of the Cork jail has recommended the release of the man under arrest there who are on hunger strike.

It was reported here as probable that Lord Mayor MacSwiney of Cork, who was reported in a critical condition in Bristol, would be released if he were allowed to die in prison.

DRY STRATEGY CHANGED

NEW ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURE ADOPTED AT SEATTLE. Conspiracy Charges Will Be Filed Only in Exceptional Cases for Violations of Law.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—At a conference of Robert C. Saunders, United States attorney, and Donald A. McDonald, federal prohibition director for Washington, an agreement was reached as to procedure to be followed in enforcement of the Volstead act in this district, beginning next week.

As a first offense in violation of the Volstead act is a misdemeanor only, it was decided to file information direct in the federal court to expedite such cases.

Where, however, convenience does not permit of the information being filed direct as when agents are in distant part of the state, they will have the privilege of filing complaint with the United States commissioner.

In second or third violations of the Volstead act charges will be placed in the federal court, unless the commissioner can be considered by a federal grand jury.

Conspiracy charges, it was determined, will be filed only in exceptional and extreme cases for violations of the Volstead act, where the offense shows the operation of a wide ring. Only cases of importance will be brought into the federal court, it was decided, where charges against liquor court or state courts have been disposed of for the same act.

The practice of federal prohibition agents filing charges against liquor law violators under the internal revenue statutes will be discontinued.
