LONDON, Aug. 23 .- While no official pronouncement is forthcoming regarding any treaty of alliance which would recognize Great Britine has been reached.

A violent anti-English agitation and a demand for freedom began among Egyptian extremists with the inauguration of a British protectorate during the war, and in recent months this has culminated in serious demonstrations and assassinations.


