MODERN EVE THROWS APPLE WITH DISASTROUS RESULTS

Speed and Unerring Accuracy Land Fruit With Spattering Effect on Masculine Friend's Head—Arrest and Jail Sentence Follow Suit.

WHEN EVE gave Adam an apple she handed it to him politely, as according to Biblical testimony, but that method was too old-fashioned for Iva Freed, police court character. Instead she threw an apple to a masculine friend at Second and Burnside streets Monday night with such speed and directness that she hit him in the head and splattered pieces of the fruit all over the scenery in the immediate vicinity.

Inspector Morack appeared at the same time and played the part of the avenging angel by arresting the woman on a charge of drunk and disorderly conduct. The detective had some trouble in taking his prisoner to jail, however, as she tried to use a bottle of cider, which she carried under her arm, to beat him over the head. When finally she was lodged in jail she cried and yelled and made so much noise that the firemen in the building adjoining had difficulty in snatching any sleep.

"I was drunk," she told Deputy City Attorney Lansing when he tried to question her about the event of the preceding night in municipal court yesterday. "I think we had better keep you in jail for four days," Judge Roseman told her.

When Municipal Judge Roseman sentenced Theodore Doyle, alleged "hop head," to 20 days in jail yesterday on a charge of vagrancy, Doyle appeared in court with a bottle of beer in his hand and a piece of paper in his hand, for he sprang from the prisoners' box and started "in high" out of the courtroom and down the street with police and court hangers-on streaming after him.

In making the break for liberty he had to run down the stairs and past the police information desk in the lobby of the police station. He showed such speed, however, that the police men behind the desk had no chance to head him off.

"Come over and see me," Sergeant Keegan, assistant to the chief of police, told Mr. Kimball on the telephone. He came over and then Sergeant Keegan broke the news to him that some "serious charges" had been filed as a result of his "escapade" at Vancouver.

Judge Roseman had been "wiped up" by the boys, and the "prisoner" was led into the courtroom and the session was on.

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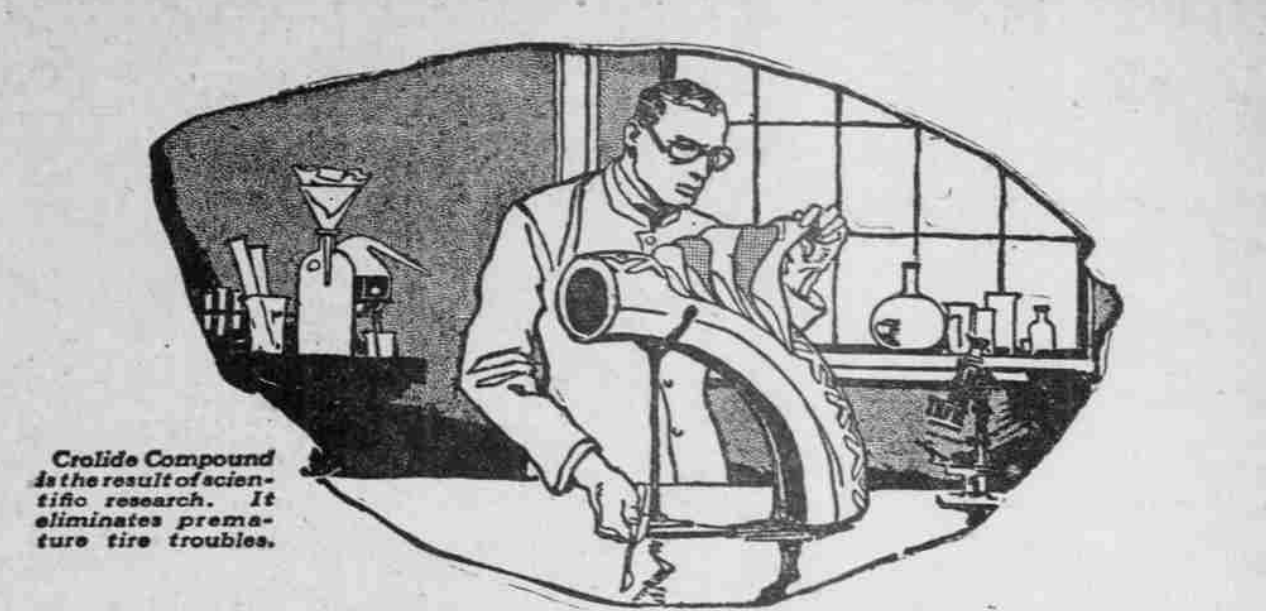
