

EX-RACER BEWAILS ARREST WITH JUNK

George De Long Fined for
Using 1919 License Tag.

TRAFFIC CLASS STARTED

Judge Sends Ignorant Driver to
Jail With Copy of Laws to
Study While Serving.

"To think that I have driven some of the best speed cars in the United States and here I am pinched with this pile of junk!" said George De Long, former transcontinental autoist and speed driver, who appeared in municipal court yesterday to answer to a charge of using a 1919 license tag on his machine. He had been arrested the preceding night at Sixth and Hoyt streets by Patrolmen Taylor and Farnley.

DeLong recently left the race track and came to Portland to take a job as mechanic with the Warren Construction company. He purchased a second-hand car at Hillsboro and told the judge he hadn't had time to procure a license for it. Judge Rossman continued the case for sentence.

Municipal Judge Rossman started a class in traffic laws yesterday with Fred Biggs, 722 Sherman street, driver for the Tru Blu Buscuit company, as his star pupil. The judge announced that after Biggs had studied the traffic laws for a day in jail he would have an oral examination.

Biggs was arrested by Investigator Tully of the traffic bureau, after he had attempted to pass a machine driven by A. L. Purlington, 54 East Eighty-second street, South, at the intersection of East Oak and Grand avenue, causing a collision which wrecked both machines. In addition to the day in jail the judge fined Biggs \$40.

Balliff Carr was asked by the court to furnish Biggs with a copy of the traffic laws so that he could improve his time while in jail.

"We were just having a meeting among the boys," explained Sam Frost and William Hill, who appeared in municipal court yesterday after they had participated in a free-for-all fight in which billiard cues and balls were the principal weapons of assault in an establishment at First and Yamhill streets.

"What do you call your organization, the highlanders?" asked Deputy City Attorney Lansing. Frost and Hill were declared to have been leaders in the battle which resulted in a window and several heads being broken.

Frost, who had a half pint of moonshine, was fined \$25 for violating the prohibition law. Hill was fined a like amount for being drunk.

"I don't mind the jail sentence so much," explained Margaret Gallagher, who had just been sentenced with Patrick Donahue to two days in jail following arrest on charge of drunk and disorderly conduct at 320 Second street, addressing Municipal Judge Rossman yesterday morning.

"But this is the trouble. I have a lot of meat and butter and other provisions at home which will spoil while I am in jail."

Judge Rossman told her to go home and take care of her provisions and then return to serve her sentence. At 10:30 o'clock she returned to the courtroom and announced that she was ready to begin her sentence.

ULTIMATUM GIVEN WASCO

REASONABLE TIME ALLOWED
FOR GETTING RIGHT OF WAY.

Unless Way Is Obtained to Connect
Road With Bridge, Land
Will Be Condemned.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—Unless the county court of Wasco county obtains within a reasonable time rights of way for a highway approximately one mile of road necessary to connect with the Columbia river highway with the state bridge across the Deschutes river, J. M. Devers, attorney for the state highway department, will institute legal proceedings to condemn the land necessary for the success of the project.

This announcement was made here today by Mr. Devers following a conference with members of the state highway commission in Portland yesterday.

Under present conditions it is alleged that many travelers wishing to reach eastern Oregon points are compelled to cross over the private bridge owned by Malcolm Moody, for which a charge of \$1 is assessed against each automobile. Records in the hands of Mr. Devers indicate that as many as 50 machines pass over this bridge daily.

Recently the highway commission made an order declaring the road needed to connect with the state bridge a state highway and later the Wasco county officials were requested to obtain the rights of way. As yet the court has taken no definite action, according to Mr. Devers.

Reports have reached Mr. Devers that the Moody bridge is unsafe and for this reason the state is intensely interested in getting the state road open and under construction.

3431 ACRES BEARING HOPS

MARION COUNTY EXPECTS FIVE
BALES AVERAGE YIELD.

Pre-Harvest Offers Indicate Yards
Will Pay 70 Cents Box; Some
Bid \$1.60 for 100 Pounds.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—Based on a careful survey by experienced growers there is in Marion county at the present time approximately 3431 acres of bearing hops while 991 acres of the product recently planted will come into bearing next year. From every acre of hops the growers expect an average yield of five bales.

Actual picking of buggies will start tomorrow, according to the growers, while harvesting of the later variety will start on September 4. Based on previous years it will require approximately 200 pickers to the acre, and the operations will continue for at least 31 days. Pre-harvesting offers indicate that some of the yards will pay the pickers 70 cents a box, while

others will pay as high as \$1.60 per hundred pounds. Operators of the yards declare that the difference in the prices of picking is not material because the average box does not contain quite 50 pounds. None of the growers attempted to estimate the crop. Some believe that it will be about 70 per cent normal. Others said the yield would exceed that percentage.

T. A. Lively & Co. are the largest yard operators in Marion county, but as yet they fear no trouble in securing plenty of pickers. Other yards also are said to have received many applications.

Word was received by local dealers today that the Columbia-Pacific Steamship company had established direct communication between Portland and foreign ports, and it was said that this would greatly decrease the work of handling the outgoing product.

Prices quoted for the hops at the present time are between 50 and 65 cents a pound, although some of the yards previously contracted at a figure as low as 25 cents a pound.

JAP OUTLAWS INCREASE

28 DESERTIONS AT SEATTLE
JUMP TOTAL TO 389.

Oriental Reach U. S. as Sailors
on Shipping Board Vessels
and Fail to Reship.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—With 18 desertions from the Japanese crews of the shipping board vessel Eastern Temple and ten from the Eastern Temple, the total of Japanese entering the United States in this manner since June 30, 1919, was swelled to 389, it was announced by immigration authorities Wednesday morning.

The Eastern Temple arrived in Seattle harbor July 30, and the Eastern Leader August 2. Both were built in Japan for the United States shipping board and were brought over for delivery to the government.

Under the existing seamen's act, such vessels are to be manned by Japanese crews which are to re-ship for their native country after their boats have been formally turned over to representatives of the shipping board. Both the Eastern Temple and Eastern Leader were delivered, and representatives here of the Japanese steamship company quartered the two crews in hotels, and employed guards to watch them until they could be reshipped for Japan. Wednesday morning these representatives reported to the immigration officials that the crews had been sent back—minus the 28 who they alleged deserted.

Ostrander Canning Team Wins.
KELSO, Wash., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—The Ostrander canning team, consisting of Edith and Elsie Ray, won the annual Cowlitz county canning contest at Woodland and will represent this county at the Southwest Washington fair contest next Friday. Others who will represent this county at the Southwest Washington fair are Mabel Searls, Silver Lake, sewing; John Ferguson, Clover Valley, rabbits; and Richard Kingsbury, Carrolls, gardening.

Cowlitz School Census Completed.
KELSO, Wash., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—The Kelso school district has more than one-fourth of the total school population of Cowlitz county, according to the census recently completed, and has almost as great a population as the Castle Rock, Kalama and Woodland school districts combined. The total school census is 323. That of Kelso is 1001, Castle Rock 350, Kalama 358, Woodland 288 and Silver Lake 119.

Cowlitz River Channel Dredged.
KELSO, Wash., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—Deepening of the channel of the Cowlitz river between Kelso and the mouth of the river was begun yesterday by the United States dredge Marcellino, which, with the tender Woodland, moved into the river Monday.

Capital, Nelson De Lude is in charge of operations. The dredge began deepening the channel over the Hill bar and will later shift to the Huntington bar.

Power Service Investigated.
CENTRALIA, Wash., Aug. 25.—(Special.)—Following numerous complaints filed with the public service commission, E. E. Clark, a representative of the commission, was in Centralia today investigating interruptions in the service of the North Coast Power company to Centralia. Local industries have been considerably hampered by the power service during the past ten days.

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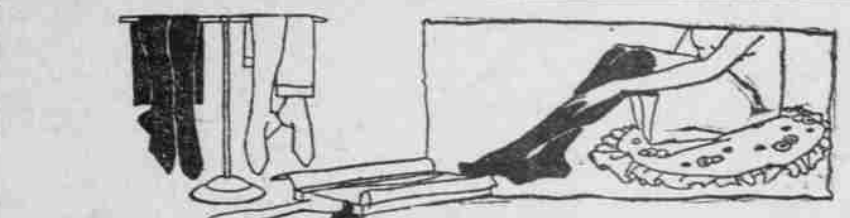
