BIG HAY CONTRACT MADE

500 Tons for 60,000 Cows to Cost Around \$1,125,000. YAKIMA, Wash., Sept. 5.—(Special.)—The reorganized association of Yakima hay growers has closed a contract with the United Dairy association of Washington to supply hay this winter for 60,000 dairy cows. It was announced yesterday by a representative of the hay growers. A minimum of 5000 tons of hay will be required to fill the contract, which involves a consideration of around \$1,125,000.

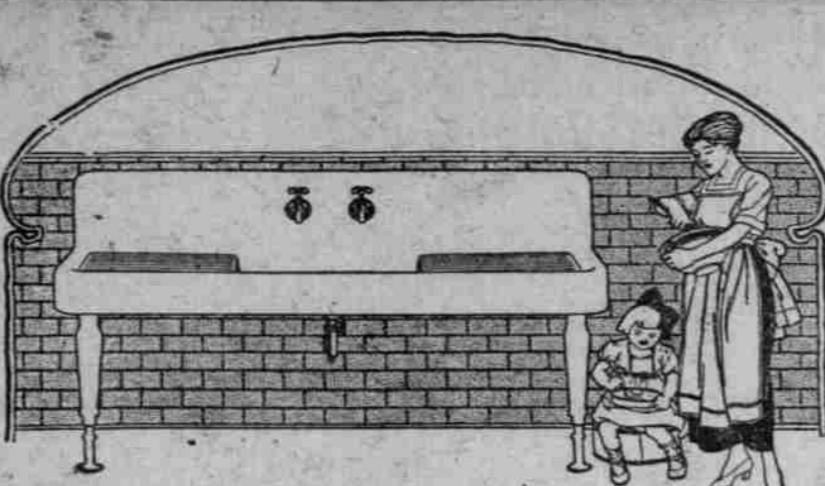
