Kearns revealed he had an agreement with Fitzsimmons when the match was made that Dougherty was to referee. He would not consent to Day because he had never seen him officiate. When the match was in danger of being called off, Chairman Bigger, Promoter Fitzsimmons and other principals had a final conference at daylight at which Day agreed to withdraw in favor of Doughefty.
