RAILS, BOATS URGED TO PAY WHARFAGE

Privileges for Freight in Storage a Year Asked.

DOCK MEN MEET SEPT. 9

Recommendation Will Be Sent to Steamship Companies, Railroads and Dock Operators.

That rail and water carriers between them absorb wharfage charges at North Pacific ports and that the same privileges be accorded freight which is kept in storage at the port of entry for a year or less as is accorded that which is transferred directly from vessel to rail, is the recommendation prepared following a meeting of representatives of commercial bodies and public and private dock operators, held in Seattle on Septem-ber 2.

J. W. Ransom attended the Seattle meeting as the representative of the Portland Chamber of Commerce and has outlined the recommendations made at the meeting in a report filed with the local chamber. Importers who use the north Pacific coast ports are suffering from the fact that they are being called upon to meet wharf-age charges which are absorbed at the Atlantic ports and to prepare some plan for overcoming this feature was the main purpose of the meeting in Seattle. The main features of the report, pre-pared at the Seattle meeting to be sent as a petition to steamship companies, railroad companies and dock operators, are summarized closing statements of the report and are as follows:




