

AUTHOR OF HIGHWAY BOND BILL VISITOR

P. H. Carlyon Opposed to "Pay as You Go" Plan.

\$30,000,000 ISSUE IS UP

Voters of Washington to Decide Whether Roads Shall All Be Surfaced at Once.

P. H. Carlyon, author of the \$30,000,000 road bill which the voters of Washington will adopt or reject November 2, was in Portland yesterday. Mr. Carlyon is of the opinion that the people of Oregon are as interested in seeing Washington have a comprehensive highway system as they are in developing such a system in Oregon, for the more good roads that are offered to tourists the greater will be the attractions of the Pacific northwest to the motorist.

"The 'pay-as-you-go' system," declared Mr. Carlyon yesterday, "means detours, and everyone dislikes detours. On the 'pay-as-you-go' plan, only a little dab of work can be done each year. Instead of waiting a generation for a completed system of highways, we want to issue enough bonds to have the roads built now.

Only Surfacing Provided.
"If this \$30,000,000 road bill is approved by the Washington voters, the main highways of Washington can be surfaced. This bond issue is intended to provide for surfacing only. The grades will be provided by the state public highway fund. The bonds, like the road bonds in Oregon, will be paid for by the license fees of the automobile owners. This year Washington has received from these licenses \$2,700,000.

"When the bill was presented it was estimated that the \$30,000,000 would complete all of the highways at the prices then prevailing. Since then there has been an advance in the prices of labor and material and it may be necessary to use a little federal aid to complete the job.

1216 Miles Involved.
The bill is intended to surface 1216 miles of roads. Of this mileage there is now paved or under contract 281 miles. If the bill passes the Pacific highway will be completed in 1921, with the exception of a few spots which may be too soft to pave. There are 100 miles of the Pacific highway, north and south, yet to be paved. Oregon is expected to be aided in the completion of this road, for it connects with the Pacific highway in Oregon, which in turn, connects with the Pacific highway in California. There is a considerable territory in Washington, south of Seattle, which is tripartite between Portland and the Pacific highway.

"Under the provisions of the bill, which is known in Washington as referendum bill No. 1, a paved highway will run to every corner of the state and there will be highways east and west across the center. It is planned to start work paving several of these highways at the same time, thus road work will be in progress in the Spokane, Walla Walla, Yakima and Chelan sections simultaneously. Some day the highway on the Washington side of the Columbia will be pushed to completion, and it will be as scenic as the famous Columbia highway, but the latter will be an expensive enterprise, owing to the rock formation which must be dealt with.

Detours Are Disliked.
"What I am anxious to see, however, is a system of paved highways which will develop Washington. By following the 'pay as you go' principle, it will take years for an appreciable showing to be made, but under the bonding system the money will be available at once for the whole undertaking. The money can not be sold to net the buyer more than 5 per cent. The state can buy up quantities of the bonds and take advantage of the interest.
"Everyone is complaining about the detours, particularly on the Pacific highway. Well, the only way to get rid of the detours is to pave the highway, and the way to pave the highway is to provide finances through the \$30,000,000 bond issue."

GOAT GLANDS BENEFICIAL

GOVERNOR'S SECRETARY VISITS CALIFORNIA PRISON.

Don E. Uphohn Tells of Man of 75 Who, Following Operation, Becomes More Active.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 7.—(Special)—That the so-called gland operations which are being performed on prisoners in San Quentin penitentiary, in California, are a success and that the beneficial effects have not been exaggerated in newspaper headlines was the information brought here today by Don E. Uphohn, private secretary to Governor Olney, who passed the last two weeks in California inspecting the various state institutions and attending the annual convention of the National Traffic Association in San Francisco.

"I had a lengthy conversation with the physician in charge of performing these operations," said Mr. Uphohn, and later talked with a 75-year-old inmate of the prison who had undergone the unique operation. Before the operation this convict was hardly able to get about the grounds, while at the present time he is full of pep and has all the physical appearance of a youth. The first operation performed on this prisoner failed to result satisfactorily to the physician, and he later was subjected to a second operation.

"I received my information firsthand, from men who had undergone the strange operation and they told me that the effects of the gland administration had not only improved their physical being, but greatly stimulated their mental faculties. The prison doctors also are highly elated over the success of the operations and declare they will continue as the occasion demands."
Mr. Uphohn says a herd of goats are now on the prison farm at San Quentin, and these supply glands for the operations.

BRIDGE OWNER IS SUED

OFFER OF \$250 FOR FOUR ACRES IS REFUSED.

Autoists Pay \$1 Toll; State Highway Commission Wants Land for Road.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 7.—(Special)—When Malcolm Moody today refused to accept \$250 as full payment by the state for approximately four acres of land needed for a road to connect up the Columbia river highway with the new bridge over the Deschutes river, J. M. Devers, on behalf of the state highway commission, filed a suit in the Wasco county circuit court asking that the land in question be condemned.

The state highway commission some time ago designated the land involved in the suit as public property, and later requested the county court of Wasco county to obtain the rights of way necessary to connect up the present highway with the Deschutes bridge. This the court refused to do. Mr. Devers then submitted to Mr. Moody a proposal to buy the land at stipulated price of \$250, but this offer he refused.

At the present time travelers over the highway in eastern Oregon are compelled to pass over a private bridge owned by Mr. Moody, for which it is said automobiles are assessed \$1 each. When the new highway of less than a mile in length is constructed the toll bridge will be eliminated as a necessary means for travel.

Records in the office of the state highway commission show that as many as 50 automobiles have passed over the Moody bridge in a single day.

Labor Scarce at Salem.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 7.—(Special)—Calls received at the offices of City Judge Race indicate that there is not sufficient help in Marion county to fill the many jobs that are being offered. Yesterday a call came in for 20 berry pickers, but he was unable to supply more than half that number. Calls for labor in other lines also exceeded the number of men listed for service.
