Accord-ing to the Lick observatory on Mount Hamilton, the direction of the quake was from east to west. A heavy mark was made on the seismograph. No reports of damage had been received soon after the shock.

At Marina near Carrara, the earthquake shattered a church where mass was being celebrated by Father Friggotti, the pastor. The ceiling fell upon the congregation, kiling many and slightly injuring the pastor, who concluded the service before attending the injuries of those about him.
