

MISS AMERICA SETS NEW RECORD

70-Mile-an-Hour Speed Is Held 30 Minutes.

MISS DETROIT LOSES OUT

Ideal Weather Greets Power Boats and First Lap Sees Mark Smashed to Bits.

DETROIT, Sept. 14.—Establishing a new world's record of 71.43 miles an hour, Gar Wood, with his Miss America of the Detroit Yacht club, won the gold challenge cup of the American Power Boat association today, taking the 70-mile race in 57:33.5 seconds.

The record was made in the fifth five-mile lap which was covered in 4 minutes 12 seconds. Gar Wood's average speed for the 70-mile heat today was 70 miles an hour flat.

Second place in the race went to Miss Detroit V, with George Wood at the wheel, who finished third in today's heat.

Canadian Boat Second. Miss Toronto II of the Royal Canadian Yacht club, G. Erickson driving, took third place by finishing second today. The Toronto craft's actual running time was 29 minutes and 43 seconds, a fraction over 40 miles an hour.

H. B. Greening's Rainbow of the Royal Hamilton Yacht club, Hamilton, Ont., made a clean sweep of the Carl G. Fisher race for displacement boats by winning the third 30-mile heat today, going 27.7 miles an hour, the Hamilton boat finishing ahead of Spanghol of the Detroit Boat club. Her class time was 1:21.32.

The Scripps trophy race for cabin cruisers failed a contest when only one boat answered the gun. Conditions for the gold cup race were ideal. The world's speed record fell on Miss America's first time around, which was covered in 47:37 or at the rate of 68.2 miles an hour.

Miss Detroit V, piloted by Gar Wood's brother, held second place in today's heat until the fifth time around, when Miss Toronto II finished her on the dash down to the finish line.

The regatta closes tomorrow.

LINCOLN GETS 60 MEN OUT FOR FIRST PRACTICE.

Philbrook Chosen to Handle Benson Squad While Cadets Will Get Late Start.

Lincoln high school, the last of the local institutions to name its football coach for the 1920 season, announced yesterday through director of athletics Reynolds that Bill Jones, former University of Oregon football star, will handle the Reddies this season.

Philbrook was signed by E. Cleveland, principal of the school Monday and immediately the new coach put his charges to work.

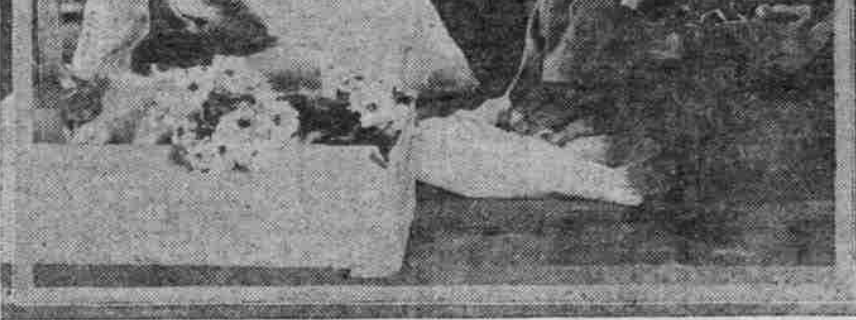

In his last battle against Benny Leonard several years ago Tillman knocked the champion down, and then Benny came back and floored him in a later round, evening up the score. Tillman is not an old man. He is still a youngster and has some good years ahead of him in the boxing game, if his past showings are any criterion of his class in the ring.

Trambitas Is Youngster. Alex Trambitas, coached and tutored by the fugitive sportsman, Jack Fabie, has, of course, the advantage of youth, is full of pep and punching like an old timer with both hands. Alex is a mighty aggressive youngster and knows how to take care of himself. He has been in some tough battles and has never been knocked out and up to date has always emerged from the fray with honors.

Frankie Murphy will be up against the cleverest man that has faced since he has been on the Pacific coast when he meets Frankie Jones of San Francisco tonight in the semi-wind-up of eight rounds at a pretty lively pace, however, and in not worrying over the boxing ability attributed to his opponent.

Johnny Fiske and Niel Zimmerman, two rugged 120-pounders, are down to meet in one of the six-round special while "Babe" Herman and Baby Blue will tangle in the other six-round match at 120 pounds. JOHNSON CASE AFFIRMED

NEGRO PUGLIST DRAWS YEAR IN LEAVENWORTH.

Violation of Mann Act Results In Fleeing Country and Loss of \$30,000 Bond.

CHICAGO, Sept. 14.—Jack Johnson, former world's heavyweight champion, was sentenced to one year and a day in Leavenworth penitentiary and fined \$1000 today by Federal Judge George A. Carpenter for violation of the Mann act. The sentence reaffirmed that passed on Johnson in 1915, when he was convicted of transporting a white girl from Pittsburg to Chicago for immoral purposes.

MAJORITY OF MAJOR LEADERS DROP THEIR GAMES.

Ruth Scores Twice and Equals Cobb's American League Record of 1911.

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—New York today gained first place in the American league pennant race with a six-point lead, while all five other contenders of both major leagues lost to second division clubs by one-sided scores.

The Brooklyn nationals suffered their first defeat in 11 games today when Chicago batted Cadore hard, but Cincinnati and New York failed to take advantage of the slip. The Reds had low score in Philadelphia and New York fell before St. Louis. The Yankees won their fifth consecutive game and made it three straight from Detroit. Cleveland and Chicago were shut out, the Indians being unable to hit. Hommel of Philadelphia, while the White Sox could do little with Acosta of Washington.

"Babe" Ruth added another mark to his credit today when he scored twice and brought his season's total of runs to 147, equalling the American league record set by Ty Cobb in 1911. The National league record is 136, made by Hamilton of Philadelphia in 1914.

LABOR LEADERS INDICTED

Teio Held Involved in Recent Riots in Denver.

DENVER, Sept. 13.—Three leaders in local union labor circles, one of them vice-president of the Colorado State Federation of Labor, were indicted today by the special grand jury investigating the rioting during the strike of street car men in which several persons were killed and much property damage done.

The three indicted were: William C. Thornton, vice-president of the Colorado State Federation of Labor; William J. O'Brien, former president of the Tramway Employees' union; Charles Ahlstrom, president of the Denver trades and labor assembly.

The report returned also included indictments against three other persons whose names were not divulged. Forty-six previously were indicted.
