

CITY NEWS IN BRIEF

IRISH FAIR SET.—An Irish fair will be held in Hibernian hall at 240 Russell street on November 11 and 12, the proceeds go toward paying off the debt remaining against the hall. Products of Irish industries will be on exhibition and will be sold by the women's auxiliary, the articles to include crocheted and hand-woven linens, damask linen with monograms, hand-embroidered linens, Donegal homespun woolen auto robes and lounge covers, Irish helleck chimneys and other novelties. John Farrell is chairman and P. Mallon is secretary of the festival. A committee meeting has been called for next Tuesday night to complete arrangements. The fair will close with a dance on Saturday night.

COURT OF APPEALS TO CONVEY.—With but one case on appeal, the circuit court of the United States court of appeals will convene for the ninth circuit today in the old postoffice building. The courtroom of Judge Wolverton and Bean has been placed at the disposal of the court, which constitutes Circuit Judges Gilbert, Portland; Hunt, San Francisco and District Judge Wolverton.
