

BIRD BILL OPPOSED BY BUSINESS MEN

Willamette Valley Committee Visits Malheur Lake.

CAUTION URGED ON VOTERS

Land If Once Ceded to the Government Will Be Lost to State for Good, It Is Declared.

BURNS, Or., Sept. 28.—(Special.)—When a committee of Willamette valley business men was in Burns recently for the purpose of investigating the transportation problem of central Oregon, a trip was made to Malheur lake to obtain information pertaining to the proposed bird refuge bill which is to come before the voters at the general election in November.

High Growing Oats Seen. The committee members saw oats growing from five to six feet high, two and a half miles inside of the meander line.

County Agent McDaniels left Saturday morning for Salem to confer with county agents and took with him a sample of grain from that grown within the meander line of the lakes, and also samples of soil to be tested.

While here recently Senator Chamberlain had his attention called to the bill, and when apprised of conditions he issued a statement cautioning the voters of the state to think well before voting for the bill, for the land once ceded to the government is lost to the state.

According to the state maps of this section, Malheur lake is only 40 feet lower than the highest point of Harney county. It would be an easy matter, it is said, to pump water onto the higher ground and get the same results as have been obtained in Virginia valley, where 120 bushels of oats have been grown to the acre. This is the type of land the refuge bill, if passed, would keep in a primitive state and feed the birds and let the residents of Harney county keep on importing grain instead of exporting it, it is declared.

As to the transportation problem of this district, the committee will make a report to the Oregon state chamber of commerce. It is said the report will take the attitude that a railroad in necessary for the development of central Oregon. A feasible route is declared to be that of the Natron cut-off.

The committee members, who were guests of William Hanley while here, were L. E. Bean, George H. McMorran, J. B. Bell, Wallace Griffin and Frank Jenkins.

Central Oregon Visited.

EUGENE, Or., Sept. 28.—(Special.)—A party of Eugene business men that left here a week ago to make an automobile trip through central and eastern Oregon to arouse interest in better railway connections between those parts of the state and the Willamette valley, have returned, enthusiastic over the vast latent resources of the sections through which they traveled. The party drove to Bend, thence to Redmond and Prineville, to Burns, Madras, Vale and Hermiston, thence across the Idaho line to Fayette and Weiser, returning by way of La Grande and Pendleton.

RAIN THREATENS WHEAT

Grand Ronde Farmers Becoming Discouraged With Weather.

LA GRANDE, Sept. 28.—(Special.)—Grand Ronde valley farmers are becoming discouraged because of the rain which has been falling for several weeks. Although all of the fall grain has been taken care of, much of the spring grain was just being cut, that which is in sheaves is reported to be sprouting, as well as some which was cut and stacked. The rain has not damaged as badly as at first reported, but with the continued rains in fast bleaching, and will mean a much lower grade when graded for selling. There is probably one-third of the spring crop in Grand Ronde valley still uncut.

LOCAL FIRM GETS BONDS

Conference Called to Hasten Savings Rapids Dam Job.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Sept. 28.—(Special.)—Wilford Allen, secretary of the Grants Pass Irrigation district, has gone to Salem to register the \$400,000 issue of bonds of the district. They will then be delivered to the Ralph Schneeloch company of Portland, the successful bidder. Mr. Schneeloch was here Monday in consultation with the board of directors of the district. E. S. Shattuck, head of the Shattuck Construction company, which is building the irrigation project, was also in the city. A conference will be held later in the week to determine on means to hasten the construction of the Savage Rapids dam before the winter high waters.

AUTO ACCIDENTS EPIDEMIC

Grants Pass Scene of Many Recent Car Smashups.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Sept. 28.—(Special.)—A regular epidemic of automobile accidents has hit Grants Pass. There is scarcely a day that one or more accidents are not reported. There has been a number of narrow escapes from serious injuries, but so far no deaths have occurred. Monday three automobiles came together at one of the principal corners and the other two more cars crashed together. Sunday a collision at Merrill almost resulted fatally. Means are being taken by the chamber of commerce to check the accidents.

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CHURCHMEN IN SESSION

CONFERENCE OF METHODISTS ON AT McMinnville.

Pastors at Gathering Represent 150 Preaching Places in State.

To Hold Examinations.

McMINNVILLE, Or., Sept. 28.—(Special.)—Ministers of the Oregon conference of the Methodist Episcopal church began gathering in this city today for their 88th annual session.

Wednesday. The Oregon conference comprises the territory in Oregon west of the Cascade mountains and is divided into four districts. Bishop William O. Shepard, D. D., L. D., is president of the conference, and the district superintendents are as follows: Portland district, William W. Youngson, D. D.; Salem district, E. E. Gilbert, D. D.; Eugene district, James Moore, D. D.; and Klamath district, S. A. Danford, D. D. Approximately 150 preaching places will be represented by pastors.

Conference examinations were conducted yesterday by Chairman A. S. Hisey. A public reception for Bishop Shepard and members of the conference will be held tonight.

The regular session will open tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock with the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, followed by roll call and memorial services. The rest of the morning session will be taken up with the organization of the conference.

Strong programmes will be given during the week by the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary societies, the board of Sunday schools, board of conference elements and the centenary conservation and advance committee.

The Laymen's association will meet Friday and on Saturday will hold a joint meeting with the annual conference. The laymen will give a fellowship dinner at the Elberton hotel Friday evening.
