

BENNETT AIR TROPHY BEINGS TO FRANCE

Flier Does 169 Miles an Hour, Breaking All Records.

NATION VICTOR 3 TIMES

Best Man Won, Say Americans, Who Maintain Fastest Machine Probably Lost.

ETAMPES, Sept. 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—Sadi Lecointe, the famous French aviator, today won the international airplane race for the James Gordon Bennett trophy.

The Dayton-Wright monoplane and the Verille-Packard machines failed to complete the race.

Lecointe left all the James Gordon Bennett cup records far behind. He also lowered the world's record for the distance flown, averaging over 169 miles per hour.
