ROSEWAY WORK TO START

Celebration to Be Held on Sandy Boulevard Friday Afternoon.

First official action in connection with the establishment of Portland's roseway, Sandy boulevard from Sixteenth street to beyond Eighty-second street and Parkrose, will be taken Friday afternoon, when a celebration will occur at the Rose City Park fire station at Fifty-sixth and Sandy. The first slips of \$10,000 or more to be set out by the city for propagation this fall and planting in the parking strips of the boulevard next fall will be planted.

City officials and others who have been active in the roseway movement will participate in the program. Mayor Baker will speak, telling of the plans for the campaign of making the roseway one of the beauty spots of the city. The Washington high school band will furnish music and there will be community singing under Walter Jenkins of community service. Sixteen young girls, representing the various civic clubs interested in the movement, will participate in the planting. All interested in the roseway movement or in learning how to grow their own roses from slips are urged to attend.

50 STUDENTS IN DANGER

WHITMAN COLLEGE, Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 5.—(Special.)—Fire caused by a faulty fireplace, Monday morning, threatened to destroy Kirkman Hall, in which 50 students are sleeping. Ernest Johnson, a student was awakened about 4 o'clock by rattling flames. He jumped from his bed and ran for water, while Kelzel, a roommate, called the fire department.

Flooding the place with chemicals and opening up large holes in the floor the firemen succeeded in extinguishing the fire which had eaten its way underneath the flooring. Damage is estimated at \$500.
