WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 .- The population of the United States, exclusive of its outlying possessions, will be announced tomorrow at 4 P. M., the census bureau announced today. Alabama, South Carolina and Wyoming made substantial gains in popu-

ation during the last ten years, while union in point of population, became the third state to show a decrease. Wyoming, next to the least popu lous states, has a population of 194,-402, which is an increase of 48,437, or 23.2 per cent compared with the 13th GORE'S DEFEAT RECALLED census. The state showed its second largest numerical growth, but its per-

entage of increase was the lowest Nevada's population was announced as 77.407, a decrease of 4468, or 5.5 per cent.
