TOURIST ASSOCIATION TO MEET.—The regular annual meeting of the Pacific Northwest Tourist association, called for the election of officers and formulation of a programme of work for the ensuing year, will be held at Tacoma Saturday, October 16, in the chamber of commerce rooms. The call to delegates has been issued by W. J. Hoffmann, secretary of this city. During the past year the work of the association has been widely commended and has caused other states to regard its policies as worthy of emulation.

DR. WILEY TO ADDRESS MEETING.—More than usual interest is manifested in the announcement that Dr. Harvey W. Wiley of Washington, D. C., former head of the federal food research and chemical department, is to speak next Monday at the noon luncheon of the members' forum, Chamber of Commerce rooms. Dr. Wiley is the most widely known American authority on the subject of food adulteration.

STEAMER ALASKA ADDED TO LINE.—Another steamer, the Alaska, will be added to the Portland-San Francisco service of the San Francisco & Portland Steamship company November 6, according to a schedule of current issue from the office of William McMurray, general passenger agent. The Alaska is said to be finely appointed and alternating with the steamer Rose City the company will be enabled to maintain a schedule of sailings every five days from each port. The Alaska will start her first voyage on the new run from San Francisco November 6, arriving at Astoria and Portland November 8, sailing from Portland November 11.

C. B. NETTLETON LEAVES \$27,800 ESTATE.—An estate valued at \$27,800 was left by the late C. B. Nettleton, who died in Portland October 1, according to petition for probate of will filed in the circuit court yesterday by John H. Nettleton, a son. Of the total \$21,000 is in personal property and the remainder in real estate. Heirs are the widow, Mary H. B. Nettleton, and the following children—Mary C. N. Tutison, Keisler Wash., Hope, H. N. Modrow, Castle Rock, Wash., and William Charles, R. E. and John H. Nettleton of Portland.

WAR VETERAN ADDRESSES CADETS.—Captain Walter de V. Bealey yesterday addressed cadets of Hill Military academy at the regular school assembly. He told of experiences in the royal flying corps, of which he was a member in the British army. He stated that out of seven British scouting airplanes in one raid engaged with a superior number of German only two returned and his plane was one of these. Captain Bealey is a former Portlander now residing here on his way to Mexico.

MINISTER OF MILK COMMISSION.—Rev. Oswald W. Taylor has been appointed a member of the municipal milk commission to succeed W. B. Fletcher, who resigned because of ill health. Announcement of the appointment was made yesterday by Mayor Baker. The milk commission was appointed by the mayor to aid in the solution of the controversy which has arisen between the milk producers and the distributors of Portland.

HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION SUE.—Damages of \$10,000 are sought from the National Hospital association by Henry Carrigan in a suit filed in the circuit court yesterday. It is asserted he was refused adequate treatment by Drs. Applewhite and Keiser, while his contract with the association still was in effect and that blood poison might have cost him his life had not been for the services of an emergency physician.

IMPROVEMENT PROCEEDINGS STOPPED.—All proceedings for the improvement of Portland boulevard from Interstate avenue to Union avenue were discontinued yesterday upon recommendation of Commissioner Hubbard. The improvement cost \$5.4 per cent of all the property owners within the proposed improvement district.

PORTLAND YOUTH DISAPPEARS.—Karl Reinke, 17, disappeared from home, 714 Interstate avenue, July 12, stating that he was going to sea. Any information concerning him would be appreciated by his anxious mother, Mrs. John Reinke. The lad's name does not appear on any of the crew lists at the office of the United States shipping commission.
