Early Winter Threatens to Isolate Natives From All Aid Until Next June.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 10 .- (Speial.)-In a desperate dash to provide food for the 600 natives of the Pribiloff islands who are rapidly approaching the end of their supplies at a oment when an early winter threat ens to insolate them from all aid, the United States naval radio repair steamship Saturn will speed from Se attle for Bering sea next Thursday with 800 tons of provisions.

On her ability to fight her way to the islands and land the supplies depends the last hope of the natives of being saved from months of nearstarvation on a meager seal-meat diet. The relief expedition ranks as one of the most daring staged in northern waters for years. If the Saturn fails no other relief can be sent to the natives until next June. The Saturn arrived back at the
