

SPEAKING CAMPAIGN IN STATE PLANNED

Republicans to Penetrate Every Nook and Cranny.

MR. BROWN IS INDORSED

Executive Committee Backs Appointment to Justice of Supreme Court in Campaign for Office.

Plans for an active speaking campaign that would penetrate every nook and cranny in the state were perfected yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the executive committee of the republican state central committee, held at the state headquarters in the Morgan building. Reports were received from various parts of the state showing that republican spirit is strong for a complete victory. George M. Brown, former attorney-general, who was recently appointed supreme court justice, was endorsed for that office in the general election.

Republican Victory Indicated.
A general survey was made of the campaign in the state. Chairman Tongue reported that there was every indication of a complete republican victory. Harding and Coolidge were reported strong in every section of the state and the various county chairmen also reported that Stanford was procuring the united support of the entire state organization.

Two Are Indorsed.
Strong indorsements were made for Stanford and McArthur by W. P. O'Brien of Astoria, Dan W. Boyd of Enterprise and S. E. Nelson of Heppner.

At the meeting of the state executive committee of the republican state central committee it was decided to give a luncheon for republican men and women at the Portland hotel Monday noon, October 18, in honor of Mrs. Raymond Robins of Chicago, who speaks at the auditorium with Montavilla Flowers Monday night, and of Mrs. Katherine Phillips Edson, member of the national executive committee of the republican party, who is accompanying Mrs. Robins on her tour.

McARTHUR DEFENDS CONGRESS
Representative Reviews Long List of Constructive Measures.

In a campaign address at the Albina branch library last night, Representative McArthur defended the present republican congress from charges of those who have described it as a "do-nothing congress" and reviewed a long list of constructive measures that have been passed since May 19, 1919, the date upon which the present congress met in special session. He said in part:

"In addition to saving the taxpayers of the country \$2,700,000 by cutting appropriations below departmental estimates, the present republican congress has made a splendid record in the matter of constructive legislation. One of the first acts of this congress was the submission of the national woman suffrage amendment and it is worthy of note that 29 of the first 36 state legislatures which ratified the amendment were republican."

Mr. McArthur will address the Transportation club at noon today and at 2:30 P. M. will speak at a woman's republican meeting at the Central library. Tonight he is scheduled to address republican meetings at the Felling and Fulton schools in South Portland.

With the exception of Friday evening, when he will address a republican gathering in his native city of The Dalles, Mr. McArthur will carry on a speaking campaign in Multnomah county until the eve of election.

CLUB ADOPTS RESOLUTIONS
Harding-Stanford Labor Body Condemns Attack on Workers.

The Harding-Stanford labor club has adopted the following resolutions: "Whereas, under the blue pencil of the peace conference, the most elementary American labor principles were expounded by striking out the clause prohibiting human slavery, by striking out the right of free association, free speech and free press; and whereas, under the blue pencil of the peace conference, the vital principle of our seamen's act; and whereas, it nullified our hard-won Clayton law by altering the declaration that labor is not a commodity;

"Therefore, be it resolved, that we, the Harding-Stanford labor club, in meeting assembled, pledge our support to the candidates who are opposed to such vicious measures."

MRS. COLE LOSES APPEAL

REFUSAL OF ANNULLMENT OF MARRIAGE UPHOLD.

Testimony Indicates Wife Repents of Hasty Decision, Is Opinion of Chief Justice McBride.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 12.—(Special.)—Charges contained in the divorce action brought by Mrs. Lu Elsie Cole of Portland against Robert Cole were not confirmed by evidence, and there were no grounds upon which to base annulment of their marriage, according to an opinion written by Chief Justice McBride and handed down by the Oregon supreme court here today. The opinion of Justice McBride affirmed the decision of Judge C. E. Gantenbein of the Multnomah county circuit court.

It was charged by Mrs. Cole that on or about 10:30 o'clock the night of March 6, 1918, in Portland, the defendant approached the plaintiff and by force and threats of bodily injury compelled the latter to enter an automobile operated by the defendant, and immediately thereafter Mr. Cole drove to Oregon City. Failing to obtain a marriage license it was charged by Mrs. Cole that the defendant on the succeeding day compelled her to return with him to Portland, where they passed a night at a hotel. Cole charged that the defendant again forced her to accompany him to Oregon City, but that later they returned to Portland, where they obtained a license and were married. On the day after their marriage, Mrs. Cole alleged, the defendant resumed his threats and she was compelled to accompany him to Salem, then to Vancouver, Portland and to St. Helens. Here Mrs. Cole alleged that she succeeded in liberating herself and returned to her home in Portland. Mrs. Cole charged that she married the defendant for the sole purpose of saving her life. She also alleged that she was engaged to marry another man.

The defendant's answer denied that he ever made any threats against the plaintiff, and letters were introduced in the trial of the case in Multnomah county indicating that Mrs. Cole was deeply in love with her husband. "Whatever the facts may be, she has not made out her case by that outweighing of the testimony which the law requires," said Justice McBride in his opinion. "It rather appears to be a case in which she was in the first instance undecided as to which suitor to cast her lot with, and having made a hasty decision, afterward repented of it and began to long for the new house and fine furniture which she had forfeited by marrying the St. Helens mechanic. Her letters indicate that she is of a volatile, frivolous nature."

Other opinions handed down today follow: Frank M. Adams versus Albina Buehler, a divorce action, appeal from Multnomah county, action for damages for personal injury, opinion by Justice Dean, Judge W. N. Gatens affirmed. A. M. Logan and Fisher C. Logan, partners doing business under the firm name of Logan Brothers, versus R. B. Cox, a divorce action, appeal from Multnomah county, action for review and annulment, opinion by Justice Dean, Judge John S. Coke affirmed.

The president in his message congratulated the miners for their promptness in complying with the award of the anthracite commission. "The miners' leaders have informed the president that the men had returned to work but asked that a joint conference to adjust inequalities in the present agreement be called."

WAR DEAD BROUGHT HOME
Bodies of R. S. Anderson and W. P. Matthes Arrive Friday.

Bodies of two Portland soldiers who died in France will arrive here Friday for burial. The soldiers are Randall S. Anderson, sergeant, and Walter P. Matthes, corporal. In addition, the bodies of seven other northwest soldiers will arrive here en route to the final resting places. These are the bodies of Archie Hulet, private, Aberdeen, Wash.; Earl M. Robertson, private, Hood River; George W. Manning, private, McMinnville; James Storrs, private, Addy, Wash.; Elson James, private, Marysville, Wash.; and Frederick D. Graham, corporal, Eugene, Or.

LITHUANIA FACTS ASKED
League Head Requests Information to Stop Polish Insurgent.

PARIS, Oct. 12.—Leon Burgeois, as president, officer of the executive council of the league of nations, has telegraphed the head of the military mission sent to Lithuania, asking that information be forwarded from time to time regarding events in Vilna. This is asked with a view to such action as might be useful to put an end to the occupation of the city by general Pilsudski, the Polish insurgent commander.

509 Cars of Apples Shipped.
YAKIMA, Wash., Oct. 12.—(Special.)—Railroad figures show that 509 cars of apples were shipped out of the Yakima valley last week, the first time this season that the apple movement has gone above 500 cars a week. In the corresponding week last year the apple movement was 1116 cars. The total Yakima fruit movement this year so far has been 2808 cars, and at this time last year 1489 cars had been shipped.

Montana Ranchers Hold Stock.
MILES CITY, Mont., Oct. 12.—Reports in this section are that many ranchers have decided to hold their stock. Range and feed conditions are declared to be better and it is expected will continue so through the winter.

Asphyxiation Attempt Alleged.
HOQUIAM, Wash., Oct. 12.—(Special.)—Mrs. Albert M. Crummins, who filed suit for divorce Monday from Edward P. Crummins, charges him with having tried to asphyxiate her in a room in a Portland hotel. She also brings forward practically every other ground for divorce permitted under the Washington state law. They were married, she avers, in Centralia in 1915, and she alleges he has not yet started to support her.

Houston's Census Revised.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—The census figures of Houston, Tex., revised, show a population of 138,276, an increase of 200 over the figures previously announced.
