

### COUPLE TAKEN HERE ON "SLAVE" CHARGE

#### Youth Accused of Stealing Californian's Wife.

### WOMAN WELL KNOWN

#### E. H. Huston, Declared Violator of Mann Act, and Mrs. Evilo Laddford Apprehended in Hotel.

Elopement with another man's wife is merely the assertion of his right to "the pursuit of happiness," declared E. H. Huston, 21, when apprehended yesterday morning in a downtown hotel by federal officers and held on a white slave charge. His companion was Mrs. Evilo Laddford of San Francisco.

"How come?" inquired William Bryson, of the department of justice, when he talked with Huston, an ex-service man, regarding his plight. "I guess every fellow has the right to liberty and the pursuit of happiness," responded Huston.

"Even to the extent of borrowing another man's wife, without settling the account with him?" insisted Mr. Bryson.

"That's the way I look at it answered the prisoner.

"Not done in Portland," was Mr. Bryson's firm word. "But it's the sort of thing that won't go in Portland."

Huston is held on a formal charge of having violated the Mann act, according to Deputy United States Attorney Reames, and will be returned to San Francisco for trial as soon as the federal grand jury in that city brings in an indictment. He is alleged to have lured Mrs. Laddford away from her husband in San Francisco and for some weeks the couple are said to have been touring the Pacific coast together. Mrs. Laddford is reported to be well known in the California metropolis, as the daughter of a prominent customs-house official of that port.

The couple were traced from San Francisco to Reno, thence to Sacramento and Seattle and a day or so ago to this city—where their romance suffered a blight when federal officers followed them to their room. Though Huston is defiant, Mrs. Laddford is said to be penitent and is persistently appealing to the authorities to send her home again.

### Holmes in Trouble.

Another white slave complaint was filed yesterday in federal court against Leo Anderson Holmes, now held in jail at Astoria. Holmes is alleged to have conveyed Mrs. Dora Peterson from Aberdeen, Wash., to Portland during the session of the Imperial Shrine and is said to have made full confession. The woman is held as a material witness for the prosecution.

Deputy United States District Attorney Reames says that in addition to the white slave charge, Holmes has confessed to draft evasion and having falsified his questionnaire. It is alleged that he failed to register in the first draft, though of the requisite age and that though he registered in the second draft he then made the false declaration that he was married, winning thereby a deferred classification.

### KNITTING YARNS LOWER

#### LOCAL FIRM ANNOUNCES CUT IN PRICES.

#### Large Manufacturer Gives Reduction in Cost of Raw Material Reason for Change.

Announcement of an important price reduction in hand knitting yarns has been made by the largest manufacturers of these goods in the United States.

Words of this reduction has just been received by Olds, Wortman & King, from S. B. & E. W. Fleisher, Inc., of Philadelphia, who manufacture more than 70 per cent of all the hand knitting yarns used in the United States. It is announced that the reduction will average between 20 and 30 per cent in price. S. B. & E. W. Fleisher, Inc., state in their announcement that while labor costs at present are higher than they have ever been, the reduction in price of knitting yarns is made possible by economy of production in their plants due to greatly increased capacity during the war, plus a recent decrease in the price of raw materials.

S. B. & E. W. Fleisher, Inc., is one of the oldest yarn manufacturers in the United States, having been established over 53 years. They were the first American concern to manufacture hand knitting yarns. Their immense mills cover over 16 acres of floor space and employ over 2000 people.

### STATES HELD HARDING'S

#### PORTLAND ATTORNEY PROBES SENTIMENT IN SOUTH.

#### Kentucky, Tennessee and North Carolina Declared Safely in Republican Column.

Three of the bulwark states of democracy—Kentucky, Tennessee and North Carolina—will go solid for Senator Harding in the coming election, according to the prediction of C. J. Schnabel, Portland attorney, who returned from a 30-day trip through the east and south Tuesday night.

Mr. Schnabel, accompanied by Mrs. Schnabel, visited several large east-

ern cities on his trip, including Chicago, Grand Rapids, Mich.; Pittsburg, Pa.; Bowling Green, Ky.; Memphis and Nashville, Tenn.; New Orleans, La., and San Antonio, Tex. He reports that a careful sounding of the sentiment of southern states reveals an overwhelming sentiment for Harding.

"The cotton growers of the south are in financial straits," said Mr. Schnabel, "due to the fact that their cotton has been produced at a maximum of expense and the present price of cotton to the growers is below the producing cost. They are hoping for better results through a change in the administration. All the taxpayers of the south are inwardly hoping and praying that Harding will be elected."

"This is a strong statement, but it is the truth—I haven't met a single man in the south who said he would vote for Cox. From all indications, it will be a landslide for the republican ticket."

### POACHER WITTY IN VAIN

#### BACK-DATED HUNTING LICENSE OF NO HELP.

#### Joe Orselli, Truck Gardener of Beaverton, Convicted and Fined for Poaching.

The quick wit of Joe Orselli, truck gardener of Beaverton, did not avail to save him from conviction yesterday of the charge of shooting without a license, when arraigned before Justice Smith of Hillsboro. And although Orselli is credited with no more so than is W. E. Peeg, deputy county clerk of Washington county, who has pledged his word to the state game warden's office that never again will he back-date a hunting license.

Orselli was arrested on October 11, while hunting pheasants near Beaverton, by Warden Craig on a charge of shooting, without a license. He protested volubly that he had the license at his home, and that he would procure it and prove his innocence. Released on his own recognizance, Orselli persuaded Deputy Clerk Peeg to issue a license to him, setting the date of the document back to October 9, or two days before the warden encountered him afield.

Wary from long dealing with several varieties of poaching, Warden Craig questioned the authenticity of the license, with respect to the time of issuance, and prevailed upon the deputy clerk who issued it to proceed to Portland and render an explanation. Peeg gave his testimony in the form of an affidavit, admitting that he had issued a license to Orselli and dated it back to October 9.

A fine of \$25 and costs was assessed against Orselli in the Hillsboro court. Peeg was reprimanded for having falsified the date in issuing a license, but was absolved from any suspicion of having attempted to aid Orselli in defeating the law.

### NEWSPAPER SALE DENIED

#### Owner of San Francisco Chronicle Says Report Without Foundation.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13.—M. H. De Young, owner of the San Francisco Chronicle, denied today that the Chronicle had been sold to Chester H. Hoover, who last week sold the Fresno Republican.

Mr. De Young said the reported sale of the Chronicle was "without foundation."

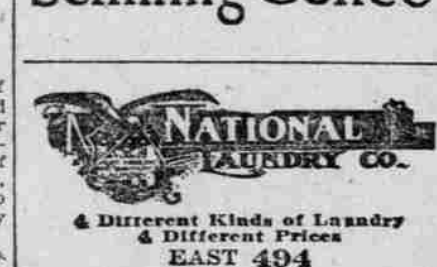
