Timberworker Turns Up With Tale of Wild Flight.

COURT ACTION SOUGHT

Susanville Marshal Declared Head of Gang Which Threatened Death to Organizer.

(Special.)-Scratched and torn from andering in the darkness through brush and barbed wire fences and ordering upon nervous collapse, S. H Wood of Everett, Wash., vice-presiand organizer of the interna-l union of timberworkers, today ade affidavit before an attorney her made affidavit before an attorney here that he was set upon in Susanville. Cal., blindfolded and threatened with hanging by a mob of about 20 men. taken 30 miles in an automobile and turned loose. This happened, he says, upon the night of October II.

Wood will leave tomorrow for California to place his charges before labor leaders in San Francisco and before Governor Stephens and the at-

Susanville, a lumbering center in Lasounty, as the leader of the mob. officer's name is unknown to His statement is that the marshal placed him under arrest about 5 o'clock Monday afternoon, charging him with being an L. W. W. Wood explained that he was an accredited organizer of the timberworkers' mion and American Federation of Labor, but the marshal refused to examine bis credentials and put him in jail. He promised to notify the prisoner's friends, it is said, but failed to do so. Through a passerby Wood managed to get word to friends, who

He took Wood a few blocks up the street, where the mob seized him, blindfolded him and put a rope around his neck. They told him they were going to hang him. They got into four automobiles and drove 20 miles into the country. They stopped and held a conference.
