BOATHOUSE OWNERS ACCUSED.—Contributory negligence on the part of Mr. and Mrs. John Redding, proprietors of a boathouse at Whitewood court, near Linton, is charged in a demurrer filed yesterday by H. E. Bowles, who is suing for damages for the death of his son on March 22. The father alleged violation of a city ordinance forbidding renting boats to minors. His son, Richard, with another boy rented a boat at Redding's and while using it on the Willamette, young Bowles, who was 17, was drowned. The demurrer also states that the boy was partly responsible, as it is a misdemeanor for a person under 15 to rent a canoe.

HOLT WASTES NO TIME.—Ben Holt, president of the Holt Manufacturing company, believes time is money. Yesterday Mr. Holt was ready to take in the Sherman county fair at Morris, Or., and figured that the quickest way to get there was by airplane. He telephoned Mr. Vernon of the Oregon, Washington & Idaho Airplane company at 2:30 and was informed that a plane was ready for him. He took a taxi, was at the flying field at 2:50 and at 3 was in the air. Figuring that Morris is about 125 miles from here, Mr. Holt should have been on the fairgrounds at 4:30.

POISON VICTIM SAVED.—Charles Earl Rinehart, Philadelphia youth, who took mercurial poisoning over a period of four days, in an effort to end his life, was still in a critical condition at St. Vincent's hospital last night. Attending physicians said it was only a matter of a few days when he would die. An unfortunate love affair is believed to be responsible for the young man's rash act, as he intimated during a brief conscious moment that an affair with a woman had led to his determination to end his life.

WORTH ASKING TRIAL.—Arguments for a new trial are to be presented today before Circuit Judge Kavanaugh by attorneys for Charles White, sentenced to five years imprisonment for forgery. He has numerous alibis and a prison record in four states. He came to Portland and is alleged to have passed forged checks on the Brownsville Woolen Mills. When arrested he had what are said to be bogus Shiner credentials and a \$500 letter of credit, purporting to be on a Texas bank.

DAMAGES NOT ALLOWED.—Phoebe E. A. Weston yesterday secured a decree for \$2723 damages from the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, after a jury trial before Circuit Judge Stapleton. She had originally asked for \$10,000. The plaintiff was injured in a street-car accident on Holladay avenue, September 25, 1919. Several other people were hurt at the same time. The case was settled out of court. One more is yet to be given a trial.

FIRE TRUCK BUS REJECTED.—Bids submitted to the city for a fire truck were rejected yesterday upon recommendation of City Attorney LaRoche. Objection was raised to the recommendations of City Commissioner Bigelow on the ground that the specifications were amended after the bids had been called for on an 85-foot truck with a front wheel drive will be drawn at once.

WARREN COOPER PLANNED.—Stanley G. Jewett, predatory animal inspector, will be in Boise, Idaho, today to confer with officials there regarding starting a campaign against the coyotes in the Owyhee valley. JUDGE BEAN TO BE AWAY.—Federal Judge Bean, of the Portland district, announced yesterday that he will be temporarily absent from the local bench, probably for several weeks, while serving as substitute for Federal Judge Dooley of San Francisco, who is ill. Judge Wolverson will preside at all cases in federal court during the absence of Judge Bean.

DIXON GIVEN SIX YEARS.—Sentence of six years in the state penitentiary was yesterday imposed upon Michael Dixon, convicted jointly with Richard Brooks on statutory charges, by Circuit Judge Wilson. The trial was completed several days ago. Dixon was sent back to jail until the judge can learn more about the boy's past life and sentence will not be given him until next week.

WHITMAN TIMBER SOLD.—A sale of \$575,000 feet of timber on the Fish creek water shed on the Whitman national forest was awarded yesterday to the Adrian Investment company of Boise, Idaho. The timber was yellow pine, Douglas fir, western larch and white fir. The purchase prices were \$3.55 for the first three species and 75 cents for the fir.

JUDICIAL RECOVERY.—District Judge Bell has recovered from his recent illness, during which he was confined to a hospital much of the time, and will resume his court room Monday or Tuesday. In his absence his work has been divided between District Judges Jones and Hawkins.

PLANT EMPLOYEES HURT.—The right hand of Ray Rockwell, 25, was badly crushed when it became caught in a machine at the King-Fisher Mattress company plant yesterday morning. He was taken to Emanuel hospital. The injured man is single and lives at the Baxter hotel.

FRANK D. BISHOP MUST PAY ALL OF BACK ALIMONY.

Court intimates That Order May Be Modified After Original Decree Is Obedied.

Failure to pay \$50 a month alimony to his divorced wife resulted in Frank D. Bishop being taken before Presiding Judge Tawell and judged in contempt of court. While no penalty was imposed, Bishop will be required to pay up all the money he owes for six months to Mrs. Katherine C. Bishop. The court indicated that he might listen to a motion to modify the alimony order when the sum has been paid.

Bishop is more than 50 years of age and said he is turning over a large portion of his earnings to educate his two sons, the cost of which is about \$15 a month. He earns \$200 a month as superintendent of mill construction work. He declared that his ex-wife is receiving financial aid from her 15-year-old daughter and is keeping a boarder, who, he charged, had broken up the home. Mrs. Bishop said she has \$20 from the daughter and \$35 a month through the care of a small child, also paid by the daughter.

PORT CONSOLIDATION

Clause in Bond Issue Is Held Illegal, However.

REMEDY LATER IS URGED

Measure Would Be Step in Right Direction for Development of Harbor, Is Declaration.
