FIRE CONFERENCE IS TODAY

The methods for enforcing the new fire prevention ordinance will be discussed this morning at a special meeting of Fire Marshal Grenfell, Commissioner Bigelow, Commissioner Barbur and Chief Building Inspector Plummer. The new ordinance provides that all stairways, elevator shafts, light wells and dumb waiters in hotels, lodging houses and apartments be inclosed to prevent the spread of fire. Alternatives were granted by the ordinance where it is found impracticable to inclose the stairways. The committee today will discuss the most efficient and systematic way of carrying on this inspection.

DEATH CALLS A. G. LONG

HEAD OF PORTLAND MUNICIPAL SUPPLY FIRM DIES.

Month's Illness Proves Fatal to Veteran Business Man. Funeral Today.

A. G. Long, resident of Portland the past 30 years, died early yesterday at Good Samaritan hospital following an illness of more than a month. He had been confined to the hospital for more than three weeks. The deceased was a native of Litchfield, Ill., where he was born December 12, 1858. His father, a Union soldier, was killed in the civil war. As a boy of 11, the son was obliged to assist his mother in caring for the younger children of the family. For several years Mr. Long was engaged in the steamboat business on the Mississippi river, and later became connected with the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad and the Great Northern. At one time he was contracting freight agent for the Great Northern at St. Paul. Coming to Portland in 1890, Mr. Long established a fire apparatus and municipal supply business, which he retained at the time of his death. During the recent war Mr. Long served as chairman of local board division No. 2, and gave much of his time to war work throughout the period of the conflict. Mr. Long is survived by six children. They are: Mrs. Mathew B. Evans, Seattle; Mrs. Lloyd Bates and Miss Mary Long, Portland; A. G. Long, Jr., Elmira, N. Y.; Walter Scott Long and Howard A. Long, Portland. His wife died in Portland in 1912. Mr. Long was a member of the Presbyterian church. He was a life member of Summit lodge No. 153, Masonic, St. Paul, and also a life member of the Scottish Rite and Al Kader temple, Portland, and a member of the Portland Elks lodge. The funeral services will be held at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon from the family residence, 447 Sixteenth street, Portland Heights. Burial will be in Riverview cemetery.

MONEY IS LEFT CHARITIES

Red Cross and Salvation Army Are Named in Will of A. G. Long.

Red Cross and Salvation Army relief funds of the David Campbell memorial will benefit through the will of the late Alexander Gotwald Long, who died Monday morning, leaving an estate running into many thousands of dollars. In addition to providing generously for all of his descendants, Mr. Long bequeathed the Armenian relief fund of the Red Cross \$500 and the Salvation Army \$100 for relief in this city. He gives to the memorial \$1000. Mr. Long was a firm believer in investment in public bonds, for he structured that nearly \$30,000 be placed in such certificates and be held in trust for his grandchildren. One daughter, Mary Pearl Long, is to have \$15,000 invested for her. His sister, Mrs. Olive E. Tolla receives \$2000, and a sister-in-law, Mrs. Edna S. Mosler, is to have \$2000. Mr. Margaret Scott of Portland receives \$1000. Rev. W. H. Gotwald of Washington, D. C., will have an income of \$25 a month from the estate during his life.
