CHILDREN ARE HARASSED

CHIEF JENKINS SAYS SCHOOLS ARE QUARRY OF PERVERTS.

Ad Club and Parents Are Urged to Help Police Run Down and Arrest Degenerates.

Portland is being overrun by degenerates operating in the vicinity of various schools and annoying children, according to announcement made yesterday by Chief of Police Jenkins in a talk before the Portland Ad club at the Benson hotel.

The chief urged that he and the police forces have the co-operation of the general public in apprehending these men.

"I have found it necessary to take police officers from regular beats and place them in the vicinity of each school," he said, "in the effort to put a stop to this. Some degenerates have been arrested and jailed, but there are others at large."

The chief said that a committee of parents from the Woodstock district had visited Mayor Baker and himself the preceding day and asked that something be done to put a stop to the annoying of children in that vicinity. He said that a survey of the district had been made by the police as a result.

Y.M.C.A. SHOWS INCREASE
 ENROLLMENT IN LOCAL INSTITUTIONS IS 5013.

Board of Directors Notes Added Facilities in Class, Shop and Laboratory.
 A substantial increase of facilities in class room, shop and laboratory during the past nine months was noted Tuesday night at a meeting of the board of directors of the Portland Y. M. C. A. It was pointed out that the association has had no financial campaign for buildings and equipment since 1906.

Enrollment of 526 new members and renewals in September, 1920, brought the total enrollment on October 1 to 5013. In Portland Y. M. C. A. membership is 193 per 1000 population, while the average throughout the United States for cities of 100,000 to 500,000 is 13.3 per 1000. It was shown.
 The advisory and employment department reported that 2350 calls for men had been received in the first nine months of 1920, and that positions filled numbered 853. Labor supply was much more plentiful in September, 1919, than this fall. There were 229 calls for men in September, 1919, and 158 positions were filled. During the year ending Sept. 30, 1920, a total of 627 calls in September of this year only 94 jobs were taken.

Trained men are as scarce as ever," continued the report. "It is also noticed that there are fewer changes in the better positions. Our greatest demand at present is for young fellows willing to start at from \$60 to \$80 who are willing to 'stick.' For the reason that young men have been getting considerably more than this in shipyards and factories, it is difficult to get them."
