Society Holds Its Annual
Autumn Luncheon.

JUDGE GEORGE HERE IN '51

Pages of Time Flutter Back as
Pioneers Announce Date They
Came to State.

With eyes that sparkle with the
keenest interest in life and in the
events of the day, with heads
sprinkled with white and yet unbowed
by the passing of the years, the Lang
syne society members gathered yester-
day in the Tyrolean room of the
Benson hotel for their annual autumn
luncheon.

As the roll was called the pages
of time fluttered back for a few mo-
ments and the men stood and an-
nounced their names and the dates of
their arrival in this city or in Ore-
gon. C. B. Moore presided and in-
troduced the speakers. Vincent Cook
admitted he came to this state in '55
and Dr. Dav Rafferty, with pride, gave
his date as February, 1882.

Edith Hoot said something about
'64, R. J. Lyndon, '68, and J. S. Reed,
'69. Judge M. C. George was ap-
plauded when he announced his date
as October, '51, and T. B. McDevitt was
one of the boys of '56. J. J. Johnson,
Sol Blaumauer, J. F. Hisey and J. Y.
Masters were all lads of the early
'60s. Norris Cox, or Dr. Cox, as he is
called professionally, said he first
visited Portland and was a guest at
the old St. Charles hotel in 1861, and
Mr. Moore, the chairman, gave '52,
'71 and 1908 as the dates when he
had come here to live.

J. D. Lee boasted that he had been
born in Portland when Oregon was
under the old territorial government.
J. K. Gill recalled early days when
Portland was a much smaller place.
J. W. Hill and Frank Dayton were
mere youngsters, arriving here in the
latter '70s, while J. I. Thompson and
W. M. Gregory also were in the same
class.

"The Tailor" Also There.
One recognized Mr. Cooper, who
was known years ago as "the tailor."
Now Mr. Cooper has a place out on
the Columbia highway and there are
some famous falls named for him.
One saw George H. Himes, without
whom no historic event is complete.
F. E. Beach was there and General
Charles F. Beebe and ever so many
others who are among the founders
of the commercial, industrial and
social life of the community.

And with all these seemed to be
the same spirit of alertness, of clear
vision. The Lang Syne members are
not old. They are enterprising. They
are right up to the minute in their
discussions of the events of the day
and in their participation in affairs
of the city and state. Frank Dayton,
the secretary, had planned all the
details carefully and successfully.

When called upon by Chairman
Moore he read the list of the 17 who
have passed on since the last annual
meeting. For the most recent of
these, James Failing, there was a
vacant chair and flowers stood be-
fore where he would have sat and
his brothers rose for a minute of
more and stood with bowed heads to
pay tribute to his memory, his in-
tegrity and his brotherhood. Later,
on motion of General Beebe, resolu-
tions were adopted and the society
attended the Failing funeral in a body.

But to do credit to the present,
the society heard a most interesting
address by Dr. J. Hunter Wells, who
spoke on the Japanese and Korean
question. He advocated the registra-
tion of all persons just as it is car-
ried out in Japan. He urged the
studying of the Oriental languages
and stated that credits should be
given in universities for Chinese just
as they are for the dead Greek.

Dr. Wells stated that after 23 years
spent in the Orient he could offer in a
brief speech but few solutions, but
he believes in the understanding of
the languages, the application of some
of the Oriental laws here and in-
vestigation of the elemental things
before endeavoring to understand
the problem. He declared that Japa-
nese own a large number of the
hotels here; that in Japan, American
mining was frowned out by the Japa-
nese laws; that in the back of every
Japanese head is the thought of get-
ting back ultimately to his country.

"America is not their country.
Japan is, just as with us who go
there—America and the thought that
we shall get back to her some day
is ours," said Dr. Wells.

Mr. Moore spoke briefly of his trip
east and of how proud he is to be an
American, but especially an Ore-
gonian. Charles J. Schnabel gave some
highlights on the south and his recent
visit there and spoke the appreciation
of the Shriners and Grand Army
of the Republic veterans he met, for
the hospitality received at their con-
ventions here.
