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EXTRADITION FIGHT WILL OPEN TODAY

Tacoma Detective Reaches New York for Miss Brainerd.

DECISION IS TELEGRAPHED

Papers Believed to Be Faulty Only in That Award of Child to Mother Was Not Clear.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—Captain of Detectives Strickland of Tacoma arrived in New York City today and set the wheels in motion for the extradition of Miss Betty Brainerd to this state for the alleged kidnapping of Bobby Stagg, 21 months old.

Within the next 24 hours big events in the kidnapping case will crystallize: for the extradition of the former Seattle society woman either will have been accomplished or will have failed, and the baby will be back in its mother's arms, according to Pierce county and King county officers.

Brainerd will be arraigned in the west side court of New York City tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, as a fugitive from justice. The matter of her extradition to this state then will be brought up.

'Decision Is Telegraphed.' Indication of the movements of Captain Strickland, who with Deputy Sheriff Herbert Beebe and Matt Starwick, of this county, has been prosecuting the search for the baby and his kidnappers, was given in a telegram he sent to his superior, Chief of Police Smith, shortly before noon today when he asked that an important detail in the case be immediately cleared up.

WOMAN CHEATED OF LOVE

ONE OF FAIR SEX PLAYS ROLE OF HUSBAND FIRST VENTURE.

Suit for Divorce Against Lawyer Spouse Now Charges Others Wrecked Home.

Ventures into matrimony have proved disastrous for Flora Huntman, a quiet little woman who took the witness stand yesterday before Presiding Judge Taxwell to testify that she had been deceived by her husband, who was a man and later discovered was a woman.

A story, unique in the annals of Multnomah county courts, was related when the plaintiff told of her first marriage with Ralph Clayton, whom she supposed to be a man and later discovered was a woman.

Sensational charges were made against the defendant. The attorney for the plaintiff said the defendant made practice of living with other women, despite the fact that she was married to Mrs. Huntman.

Fraud in bringing about this marriage is mentioned in the complaint. Katy Chapman, who was Ralph Clayton, last September visited the Huntmans' home and threatened to commit suicide, when he said that he went into another room and swallowed carbolic acid. She recovered and returned to her home.

Charles H. Glos appeared in behalf of Mrs. Huntman. No decree was granted, upon the instance of Deputy District Attorney Graham, who maintains that no legal action was necessary to annul the marriage because a woman cannot marry a woman.

SHERIFF SEEKS DAMAGE

CIRCULATION OF FRAUDULENT LETTER IS CHARGED.

George M. Johnson of Vancouver Alleges Attempt to Deprive Him of Public Confidence.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—George M. Johnson, sheriff, today filed suit in the superior court for \$10,000 damages against W. H. Sappington, district attorney, F. B. Cole and Perry E. Helton. In the complaint it is alleged that just before the election a fraudulent letter was circulated by the defendants, which was a forgery, and which was intended to deprive him of the public confidence.

Mr. Johnson alleges these copies were circulated by the defendants and that he knew them to be false and fraudulent, and that it was done with intent to deprive him of the public confidence.

Shortly after the primaries, Mr. Johnson filed suit against the four men, jointly and severally, but this case was dismissed and the new case against the defendant Sappington was filed today. Mr. Sappington was a candidate for sheriff opposing Mr. Johnson, and was defeated by the latter.

Mr. Johnson, who is the republican candidate for sheriff at the election November 2.

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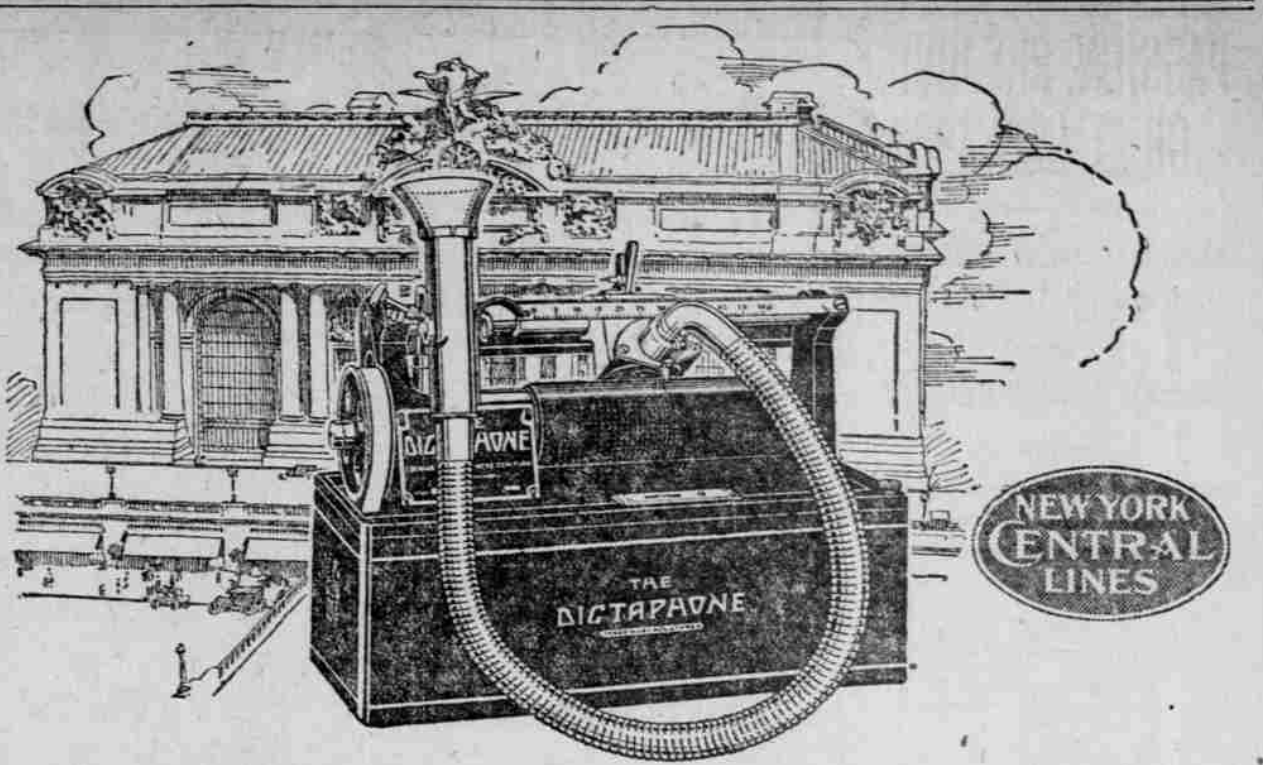
